AN ACT

To repeal section 170.011, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof two new sections relating to the civics education initiative.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 170.011, RSMo, is repealed and two new sections enacted in lieu 2 thereof, to be known as sections 170.011 and 170.345, to read as follows:

170.011. 1. Regular courses of instruction in the Constitution of the United States and of the state of Missouri and in American history and institutions shall be given in all public and 2 3 private schools in the state of Missouri, except privately operated trade schools, and shall begin not later than the seventh grade and continue in high school to an extent determined by the state 4 commissioner of education, and shall continue in college and university courses to an extent 5 determined by the state commissioner of higher education. In the 1990-91 school year and each 6 year thereafter, local school districts maintaining high schools shall comply with the provisions 7 of this section by offering in grade nine, ten, eleven, or twelve a course of instruction in the 8 institutions, branches and functions of the government of the state of Missouri, including local 9 10 governments, and of the government of the United States, and in the electoral process. A local 11 school district maintaining such a high school shall require that prior to the completion of the twelfth grade each pupil who receives a high school diploma or certificate of graduation on or 12 after January 1, 1994, shall satisfactorily complete such a course of study. Such course shall be 13 14 of at least one semester in length and may be two semesters in length. The department of elementary and secondary education may provide assistance in developing such a course if the 15 16 district requests assistance. A school district may elect to waive the requirements of this subsection for any student who transfers from outside the state to a Missouri high school if the 17

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student can furnish documentation deemed acceptable by the school district of the student's 18 19 successful completion in any year from the ninth through the twelfth grade of a course of 20 instruction in the institutions, branches, and functions of state government, including local 21 governments, and of the government of the United States, and in the electoral process.

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2. American history courses at the elementary and secondary levels shall include in their 23 proper time-line sequence specific referrals to the details and events of the racial equality 24 movement that have caused major changes in United States and Missouri laws and attitudes.

25 3. [No pupil shall receive a certificate of graduation from any public or private school 26 other than private trade schools unless he has satisfactorily passed an examination on the 27 provisions and principles of the Constitution of the United States and of the state of Missouri, 28 and in American history and American institutions. A school district may elect to waive the 29 requirements of this subsection for any student who transfers from outside the state to a Missouri high school if the student can furnish documentation deemed acceptable by the school district 30 31 of the student's successful completion in any year from the ninth through the twelfth grade of a 32 course of instruction in the institutions, branches, and functions of state government, including 33 local governments, and of the government of the United States, and in the electoral process.] A 34 student of a college or university, who, after having completed a course of instruction prescribed in this section and successfully passed an examination on the United States Constitution, and in 35 36 American history and American institutions required hereby, transfers to another college or 37 university, is not required to complete another such course or pass another such examination as 38 a condition precedent to his graduation from the college or university.

39 4. In the 1990-91 school year and each year thereafter, each school district maintaining 40 a high school may annually nominate to the state board of education a student who has 41 demonstrated knowledge of the principles of government and citizenship through academic 42 achievement, participation in extracurricular activities, and service to the community. Annually, the state board of education shall select fifteen students from those nominated by the local school 43 44 districts and shall recognize and award them for their academic achievement, participation and 45 service.

46 5. The provisions of this section shall not apply to students from foreign countries who are enrolled in public or private high schools in Missouri, if such students are foreign exchange 47 48 students sponsored by a national organization recognized by the department of elementary and 49 secondary education.

170.345. 1. This section shall be known as the "Missouri Civics Education Initiative". 2

3 2. Beginning January 1, 2016, every high school student attending any public, 4 charter, or private school, except private trade schools, or a student seeking to complete

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5 a general education development (GED) equivalency shall, as a condition of high school

- 6 graduation or its equivalent, take and receive a passing grade on a basic civics test similar
- 7 to the United States Citizenship Civics Test, produced by the United States Citizenship and

8 Immigration Services (USCIS).

- 9 3. The test required under subsection 2 of this section shall use the same one 10 hundred questions used by the USCIS and administered to all applicants for United States 11 citizenship. In order to receive a passing score on the test, the student shall answer at least 12 sixty of the one hundred questions correctly.
- 4. Any student may take the test as many times as necessary for passage but shall
 receive a passing score prior to receiving a certificate of high school graduation or a GED
 equivalency.
- 16 5. Every public, charter, or private school, except private trade schools, and the 17 department shall certify that a student has taken and received a passing grade on the test 18 in a way it deems as adequate to ensure it is in compliance with the requirements of this 19 section.
- 6. Should any section or portion of this section be declared invalid or ruled unconstitutional, any remaining portions of this section shall remain in full force and effect.
