AN ACT

To repeal section 171.031, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof one new section relating to four-day school weeks.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 171.031, RSMo, is repealed and one new section enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 171.031, to read as follows:

thereof, to be known as section 1/1.031, to read as follows:

171.031. 1. Each school board shall prepare annually a calendar for the school term,

- 2 specifying the opening date, days of planned attendance, and providing a minimum term of at
- 3 least one hundred seventy-four days for schools with a five-day school week or one hundred
- 4 forty-two days for schools with a four-day school week, and one thousand forty-four hours of
- 5 actual pupil attendance. In school year 2019-20 and subsequent years, one thousand forty-
- 6 four hours of actual pupil attendance shall be required for the school term with no minimum
- 7 number of school days. In addition, such calendar shall include six make-up days for possible
- 8 loss of attendance due to inclement weather as defined in subsection 1 of section 171.033. In
- 9 school year 2019-20 and subsequent years, such calendar shall include thirty-six make-up
- 10 hours for possible loss of attendance due to inclement weather, as defined in subsection 1 of
- 11 section 171.033, with no minimum number of make-up days.
 - 2. Each local school district may set its opening date each year, which date shall be no
- earlier than fourteen calendar days prior to the first Monday in September. No public school
- 14 district shall select an earlier start date unless, for calendars for school years before school
- 15 year 2020-21, the district follows the procedure set forth in subsection 3 of this section. The
- 16 procedure set forth in subsection 3 of this section shall be unavailable to school districts in
- 17 preparing their calendars for school year 2020-21 and for subsequent years.

EXPLANATION — Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted from the law. Matter in **bold-face** type in the above bill is proposed language.

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3. For calendars for school years before school year 2020-21, a district may set an 18 19 opening date that is more than fourteen calendar days prior to the first Monday in September 20 only if the local school board first gives public notice of a public meeting to discuss the proposal of opening school on a date more than fourteen days prior to the first Monday in 21 22 September, and the local school board holds said meeting and, at the same public meeting, a 23 majority of the board votes to allow an earlier opening date. If all of the previous conditions 24 are met, the district may set its opening date more than fourteen calendar days prior to the first 25 Monday in September. The condition provided in this subsection must be satisfied by the 26 local school board each year that the board proposes an opening date more than fourteen days 27 before the first Monday in September.

- 4. If any local district violates the provisions of this section, the department of elementary and secondary education shall withhold an amount equal to one quarter of the state funding the district generated under section 163.031 for each date the district was in violation of this section.
- 5. The provisions of subsections 2 to 4 of this section shall not apply to school districts in which school is in session for twelve months of each calendar year.
- 6. The state board of education may grant an exemption from this section to a school district that demonstrates highly unusual and extenuating circumstances justifying exemption from the provisions of subsections 2 to 4 of this section. Any exemption granted by the state board of education shall be valid for one academic year only.
- 7. (1) For the 2024-25 school year and all subsequent school years, before a school board implements a four-day school week for the school year, such school board shall vote on a resolution addressing the proposal of whether to adopt a four-day school week. Such resolution shall state the reasons for adopting a four-day school week and shall contain information demonstrating that adopting a four-day school week is in the best interest of the pupils of the school district. Upon the approval of the resolution by at least four members of the school board, the school board shall notify the election authority of the county in which the school district is located. Upon receiving such notification, the election authority shall submit the question of whether to adopt a fourday school week to the registered voters of the school district on the next available day for any municipal election. If a majority of the registered voters of the school district approve the adoption of a four-day school week, the school board shall begin implementing a four-day school week as provided in this subsection. If a majority of the registered voters of the school district reject the adoption of a four-day school week, no change from a five-day school week to a four-day school week shall occur until a new resolution to adopt a four-day school week is approved by the school board and a

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question is submitted to and approved by the registered voters of the school district as provided in subdivision (4) of this subsection.

- (2) Upon the approval by a majority of the registered voters of the school district of adopting a four-day school week, such school board may implement such four-day school week beginning with the school year following the school year in which such question is approved by such voters.
- (3) A school board that has adopted a four-day school week to be implemented in the 2024-25 school year shall submit the question of whether to adopt a four-day school week to the registered voters of the school district as required under subdivision (1) of this subsection and the question shall have been approved by a majority of such voters before the school board implements such four-day school week.
- (4) After a rejection of the adoption of a four-day school week by the registered voters of a school district, no new resolution to adopt a four-day school week in the school district shall be proposed or adopted as provided in subdivision (1) of this subsection sooner than one year after the rejection by the voters of adopting a four-day school week.

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
