	WHEREAS, pornography is creating a public health crisis and perpetuates a sexually
2	toxic environment; and
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4	WHEREAS, efforts to prevent pornography exposure and addiction, to educate
5	individuals and families concerning its harms, and to develop recovery programs must be
6	addressed systematically; and
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8	WHEREAS, due to advances in technology and the universal availability of the internet,
9	young children are exposed to pornography at an alarming rate, with 27% of millennials ages 25
10	to 30 reporting that they first viewed pornography before puberty, based on a 2016 Barna Group
11	study; and
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13	WHEREAS, this early exposure can lead to low self-esteem and body image disorders,
14	an increase in problematic sexual activity at younger ages, and an increased desire among
15	adolescents to engage in risky sexual behavior; and
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17	WHEREAS, exposure to pornography often serves as a child's and a teen's sex education
18	and shapes their sexual understanding, and because pornography treats women and children as
19	objects and commodities for the viewer's use, it teaches girls that they are to be used and teaches
20	boys to be users; and
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22	WHEREAS, pornography normalizes violence and abuse against women and children
23	by treating women and children as objects and often depicts rape and abuse as if they are
24	harmless. Moreover, pornography equates violence towards women and children with sex and
25	equates pain with pleasure, which increases child sexual abuse, child pornography, and the
26	demand for sex trafficking and prostitution, according to a 2012 study published in the The
27	Protection Project Journal of Human Rights and Civil Society; and
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29	WHEREAS, the potential detrimental effects on viewers of pornography can impact

WHEREAS, the potential detrimental effects on viewers of pornography can impact brain development and functioning, contribute to emotional and medical illnesses, shape deviant

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31 sexual arousal as well as problematic or harmful sexual behaviors and addiction, and lead to 32 difficulty in forming or maintaining intimate relationships; and 33 34 WHEREAS, recent research indicates that pornography is potentially biologically 35 addictive, which means the user requires more mental stimulation, often in the form of more 36 shocking material, in order to be satisfied. This biological addiction often leads to increasing 37 themes of risky sexual behaviors, extreme degradation, violence, and child sexual abuse images 38 and child pornography; and 39 40 WHEREAS, pornography use is linked to a lessened desire in young men and women to marry, dissatisfaction in marriage, and infidelity, which has a detrimental effect on the family 41 42 unit; and 43 44 WHEREAS, pornography has contributed to a rise in the occurrence of erectile 45 dysfunction in young men; and 46 47 WHEREAS, overcoming pornography's harms is extremely difficult for the afflicted 48 individual to address alone: 49 50 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the members of the House of 51 Representatives of the One Hundredth General Assembly, First Regular Session, the Senate 52 concurring therein, hereby recognize that pornography is a public health hazard that leads to a 53 broad spectrum of individual and public health impacts and societal harms; and 54 55 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that we recognize the need for additional education, prevention, research, and policy change at the community and the societal level, and we urge this 57 chamber and other governing bodies to take appropriate steps to ensure progress is made; and 58 59 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Secretary of State shall send an enrolled copy of this resolution to the Missouri Attorney General, the Missouri State Highway Patrol, the Missouri Department of Health & Senior Services, the Missouri Library Association, the 61 62 Missouri Association of Prosecuting Attorneys, the Missouri Sheriffs' Association, the Missouri Police Chiefs' Association, the Missouri Association of County Clerks and Election Authorities, 63 the Missouri Association for Court Administration, the Missouri Municipal League, the County

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Commissioners Association of Missouri, and the American Family Association of Kansas and

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Missouri.
