	WHEREAS, America has a dark history of lynching African Americans; and

3	WHEREAS, lynchings were carried out without repercussions and were used to terrorize
4	the black community; and
5	
6	WHEREAS, recognizing moral shortcomings in our past is as important as celebrating
7	past virtues to be able to fully understand our present; and
8	
9	WHEREAS, for those affected by past violence, acknowledging the event is essential
10	for the victims as well as for the perpetrators and bystanders to process it; and
11	
12	WHEREAS, many communities in America where lynchings occurred have erected
13	monuments recognizing the Civil War, the Confederacy, and white Southerners' violent retaking
14 15	of local power after Reconstruction, and very few monuments or memorials address the history and legacy of lynching; and
16	
17	WHEREAS, most victims of lynching have never been publicly acknowledged; and

	WHEDEAS the Found Insting Initiation's Historical Markon Duriest quarter normation
19 20	WHEREAS, the Equal Justice Initiative's Historical Marker Project erects narrative markers in public locations describing the devastating violence that once took place in those
21	locations and that is widely unknown today; and

WHEREAS, these markers invite the community in which they are placed to use truth to hear silenced voices and expose troubled histories; and

WHEREAS, the Equal Justice Initiative has documented sixty lynchings that occurred in Missouri; and

WHEREAS, these lynchings were in the counties of Barry, Bates, Boone, Buchanan,
Butler, Callaway, Cape Girardeau, Clay, Clinton, Franklin, Greene, Howard, Jackson, Jasper,
Iron, Lafayette, Lawrence, Macon, Mississippi, New Madrid, Nodaway, Pemiscot, Pike, Platte,
Ralls, Ray, Randolph, Reynolds, Saline, Scott, St. Louis, and Wayne:

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the members of the House of Representatives of the One Hundred First General Assembly, First Regular Session, the Senate concurring therein, hereby urge the governing bodies of the counties named above to partner with the Equal Justice Initiative to erect historical markers that memorialize lynchings; and
