	WHEREAS, feral swine are not Missouri wildlife but are an invasive and destructive
2	species that threatens natural areas of the state and inflicts immense destruction on agriculture;

5	WHEREAS, the Missouri department of conservation estimates that a group of ten feral

swine can destroy ten to twenty acres overnight, obliterating entire fields of crops, and the United
States Department of Agriculture (USDA) estimates that feral swine cause approximately \$1.5

billion in damages each year; and

**WHEREAS**, since feral swine are extremely prolific with generally two litters per year of up to ten piglets per litter, and the piglet survival rate is nearly one hundred percent because feral swine have hardly any natural predators, the feral swine population has increased dramatically and established habitats in approximately 37 southern and central Missouri counties; and

**WHEREAS**, many of the counties plagued by copious feral swine populations also contain considerable portions of the Mark Twain National Forest, an area encompassing approximately 1.5 million acres of this state and adjacent to several million acres of private property on which feral swine reside and forage; and

WHEREAS, in spite of the majority of over 1,000 public comments opposing a ban on feral swine hunting on all national forest lands on the Mark Twain National Forest, on December 7, 2019, the USDA Forest Service executed an order prohibiting nearly all hunting of feral swine in the forest, almost completely excluding one method of eradicating feral swine; and

**WHEREAS**, since eliminating feral swine is of paramount importance to the state and the hunters and farmers of the state, all methods of eradicating feral swine should be pursued to completely eliminate the feral swine population in Missouri; and

**WHEREAS**, the prohibition on hunting feral swine in the Mark Twain National Forest also creates unnecessary federal criminal charges against Missourians who have participated in feral swine management efforts on national forest property for generations for the lawful purposes of conservation and recreation; and

**WHEREAS**, the Missouri General Assembly believes that feral swine hunting is an integral part of the efforts to manage the feral swine population in the state and that the closure of public land to feral swine hunting will result in exponential growth of the state's feral swine population:

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the members of the House of Representatives of the One Hundredth General Assembly, Second Regular Session, the Senate concurring therein, hereby urge the USDA Forest Service to rescind the December 7, 2019, order and allow hunters to continue the grand tradition of protecting agriculture and the natural areas of the state by hunting feral swine on national forest lands on the Mark Twain National Forest; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Chief Clerk of the Missouri House of Representatives be instructed to prepare a properly inscribed copy of this resolution for the Secretary of the USDA, the Chief of the USDA Forest Service, and each member of the Missouri Congressional delegation.
