2	WHEREAS, the United States currently has over 6,000 nuclear weapons, all of which are more destructive than those dropped during World War II; and

4 5	WHEREAS , the United States will spend \$1.7 trillion on nuclear weapons systems over the next thirty years; and
6	
7 8	WHEREAS , those taxpayer dollars could be used to fund job creation, health care, and education programs; and
9	
10 11	WHEREAS, Missouri taxpayers are paying \$322.51 million for nuclear weapons and associated costs; and
12	
13 14	WHEREAS , the National Priorities Project estimates that amount of Missouri's tax revenue could:
15	(1) Create 1,088 clean energy jobs;
16 17	(2) Provide United States Department of Veterans Affairs medical care for 8,484 military veterans;
18	(3) Award 2,465 four-year university scholarships;
19	(4) Send 8,926 children to Head Start for one year; and
20	(5) Still have \$52,601 remaining; and

22	WHEREAS, the sole purpose of nuclear weapons is to deter other actors from launching
23 24	a nuclear attack first, and there is no reason to launch a preemptive nuclear attack against another country; and
25	
26 27	WHEREAS, a deterrent effect can be achieved with only a small number of nuclear weapons; and
28	
29 30 31	WHEREAS , the President of the United States has the sole discretion and authority to launch nuclear weapons without a system to check and balance the decision, and this increases the possibility of an unwarranted nuclear launch; and

33 34 35	WHEREAS , the United States currently has the right to launch a nuclear attack or Russia, China, or North Korea in response to a nonnuclear attack, which action could escalate into full nuclear war; and

37 38 39	WHEREAS , a blast radius projection by Assistant Professor Alex Wellerstein of the Stevens Institute of Technology in New Jersey projects that the largest nuclear bomb ever tested would result in:
40	(1) 13,020 fatalities and 167,550 injuries if targeted to Columbia;
41	(2) 21,310 fatalities and 102,600 injuries if targeted to Kansas City; and
42	(3) 883,980 fatalities and 779,280 injuries if targeted to Saint Louis; and

44 45	WHEREAS , the citizens of Missouri and Americans as a whole deserve the right to live a life free of threat from nuclear weapons:

47 48 49	NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the members of the House of Representatives of the One Hundredth General Assembly, Second Regular Session, the Senate concurring therein, hereby urge United States Congress to establish a system of checks and

50 balances for launching a nonretaliatory nuclear strike so that the President of the United States

will not have the sole discretion to launch preemptive nuclear attacks; and
