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Relating to an investigation of Attorney General Chris Koster.

	WHEREAS, At	torney General C	Chris Koster	is required	to comply with	various	conflict
2	of interest provisions in M	lissouri law; and					

WHEREAS, media reports in October 2014 suggested that campaign contributions may have influenced Attorney General Chris Koster's decisions in certain cases; and

WHEREAS, news sources indicated that Attorney General Chris Koster ordered his staff to drop an investigation into the company 5-Hour Energy after being notified of the investigation by a company attorney whose law firm had donated moneys to his campaign; and

WHEREAS, reports also described a settlement in a case involving Pfizer, represented by a law firm whose attorneys donated to Attorney General Chris Koster's campaigns, that occurred outside of a multistate settlement negotiation and resulted in Missouri receiving less moneys than it would have received had it participated in the multistate settlement; and

WHEREAS, according to news sources, Attorney General Chris Koster accepted an invitation to speak at a Pfizer-sponsored breakfast during the settlement negotiations in the case involving Pfizer; and

WHEREAS, the media also reported that Attorney General Chris Koster received moneys from The Simmons Firm, which received a settlement in a class-action lawsuit against Republic Services, months after he filed a lawsuit against Republic Services; and

WHEREAS, Attorney General Chris Koster is prohibited by Section 105.452, RSMo, from "[a]ct[ing] or refrain[ing] from acting in any capacity in which he is lawfully empowered to act as such an official or employee by reason of any payment, . . . including any gift or campaign contribution, made or received in relationship to or as a condition of the performance of an official act, other than compensation to be paid by the state or political subdivision"; and

WHEREAS, article VII, section 1 of the Constitution of Missouri states that "[a]ll elective executive officials of the state, and judges of the supreme court, courts of appeals and circuit courts shall be liable for impeachment for crimes, misconduct, habitual drunkenness,

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33	willful neglect of duty, corruption in office, incompetency, or any offense involving moral
34	turpitude or oppression in office"; and
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36	WHEREAS, article VII, section 2 of the Constitution of Missouri vests the sole power
37	of impeachment in the House of Representatives:
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39	NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the House of Representatives of the
40	Ninety-eighth General Assembly, Second Regular Session, requests that a House legislative

41 committee be formed to investigate whether campaign contributions have influenced Attorney

42 General Chris Koster's actions in office, which may constitute impeachable offenses.
