AN ACT

To repeal section 160.530, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof one new section relating to the allocation of moneys to school district professional development committees.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 160.530, RSMo, is repealed and one new section 2 enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 160.530, to read as follows:

160.530. 1. Beginning with fiscal year 1994 and for all fiscal years thereafter, in order to be eligible for state aid distributed pursuant to section 2 163.031, a school district shall allocate one percent of moneys received pursuant 3 to section 163.031, exclusive of categorical add-ons, to the professional 4 development committee of the district as established in subdivision (1) of 5subsection 4 of section 168.400, provided that in any fiscal year in which 6 7 the amount appropriated and expended to the public schools under section 163.161 for the transportation of pupils is less than twenty-five 8 percent of the allowable costs of providing pupil transportation under 9 10 said section, a school district may, by majority vote of its board, 11 allocate an amount less than one percent of the moneys received 12pursuant to section 163.031, exclusive of categorical add-ons, to the 13 professional development committee of the district but in no instance 14 shall the district allocate less than one-half of one percent of the moneys received pursuant to section 163.031, exclusive of categorical 1516 add-ons, to the professional development committee of the district. Of 17the moneys allocated to the professional development committee in any fiscal year as specified by this subsection, seventy-five percent of such funds shall be spent 18

19 in the same fiscal year for purposes determined by the professional development 20 committee after consultation with the administrators of the school district and 21 approved by the local board of education as meeting the objectives of a school 22 improvement plan of the district that has been developed by the local 23 board. Moneys expended for staff training pursuant to any provisions of [this] 24 **the outstanding schools** act shall not be considered in determining the 25 requirements for school districts imposed by this subsection.

262. Beginning with fiscal year 1994 and for all fiscal years thereafter, 27eighteen million dollars shall be distributed by the commissioner of education to address statewide areas of critical need for learning and development, provided 2829that such disbursements are approved by the joint committee on education as 30 provided in subsection 5 of this section, and as determined by rule and regulation 31of the state board of education with the advice of the advisory council provided 32by subsection 1 of section 168.015. The moneys described in this subsection may 33 be distributed by the commissioner of education to colleges, universities, private associations, professional education associations, statewide associations organized 34 35 for the benefit of members of boards of education, public elementary and 36 secondary schools, and other associations and organizations that provide professional development opportunities for teachers, administrators, family 37 38 literacy personnel and boards of education for the purpose of addressing 39 statewide areas of critical need, provided that subdivisions (1), (2) and (3) of this subsection shall constitute priority uses for such moneys. "Statewide areas of 40critical need for learning and development" shall include: 41

42 (1) Funding the operation of state management teams in districts with
43 academically deficient schools and providing resources specified by the
44 management team as needed in such districts;

45 (2) Funding for grants to districts, upon application to the department of
46 elementary and secondary education, for resources identified as necessary by the
47 district, for those districts which are failing to achieve assessment standards;

48 (3) Funding for family literacy programs;

49 (4) Ensuring that all children, especially children at risk, children with50 special needs, and gifted students are successful in school;

51 (5) Increasing parental involvement in the education of their children;

52 (6) Providing information which will assist public school administrators 53 and teachers in understanding the process of site-based decision making;

54 (7) Implementing recommended curriculum frameworks as outlined in

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55 section 160.514;

(8) Training in new assessment techniques for students;

57 (9) Cooperating with law enforcement authorities to expand successful 58 antidrug programs for students;

59 (10) Strengthening existing curricula of local school districts to stress60 drug and alcohol prevention;

61 (11) Implementing and promoting programs to combat gang activity in62 urban areas of the state;

63 (12) Establishing family schools, whereby such schools adopt proven64 models of one-stop state services for children and families;

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(13) Expanding adult literacy services; and

(14) Training of members of boards of education in the areas deemed
important for the training of effective board members as determined by the state
board of education.

69 3. Beginning with fiscal year 1994 and for all fiscal years thereafter, two 70million dollars of the moneys appropriated to the department of elementary and 71secondary education otherwise distributed to the public schools of the state pursuant to the provisions of section 163.031, exclusive of categorical add-ons, 7273 shall be distributed in grant awards by the state board of education, by rule and regulation, for the "Success Leads to Success" grant program, which is hereby 7475created. The purpose of the success leads to success grant program shall be to recognize, disseminate and exchange information about the best professional 7677teaching practices and programs in the state that address student needs, and to 78encourage the staffs of schools with these practices and programs to develop 79 school-to-school networks to share these practices and programs.

4. The department shall include a listing of all expenditures under this
section in the annual budget documentation presented to the governor and
general assembly.

83 5. Prior to distributing any funds under subsection 2 of this section, the commissioner of education shall appear before the joint committee on education 84 and present a proposed delineation of the programs to be funded under the 85 86 provisions of subsection 2 of this section. The joint committee shall review all 87 proposed spending under subsection 2 of this section and shall affirm, by a 88 majority vote of all members serving on the committee, the spending proposal of 89 the commissioner prior to any disbursement of funds under subsection 2 of this 90 section.

6. If any provision of subdivision (11) of subsection 4 of section 160.254 or any provision of subsection 2 or 5 of this section regarding approval of disbursements by the joint committee on education is held to be invalid for any reason, then such decision shall invalidate subsection 2 of this section in its entirety.

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
