16	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

18	Section 1. Section 10-3-103, MCA, is amended to read:		
19	"10-3-103. Definitions. As used in parts 1 through 4 of this chapter, the following definitions apply:		
20	(1) "All-hazard incident management assistance team" means a team that includes any		
21	combination of personnel representing local, state, or tribal entities that has been established by the state		
22	emergency response commission provided for in 10-3-1204 division for the purpose of local incident		
23	management intended to mitigate the impacts of an incident prior to a disaster or emergency declaration.		
24	(2) "Civil defense" means the nuclear preparedness functions and responsibilities of disaster and		
25	emergency services.		
26	(3) "Department" means the department of military affairs.		
27	(4) "Disaster" means the occurrence or imminent threat of widespread or severe damage, injury, or		
28	loss of life or property resulting from any natural or artificial cause, including tornadoes, windstorms,		



snowstorms, wind-driven water, high water, floods, wave action, earthquakes, landslides, mudslides, volcanic
 action, fires, explosions, air or water contamination requiring emergency action to avert danger or damage,
 blight, droughts, infestations, riots, sabotage, hostile military or paramilitary action, disruption of state services,
 accidents involving radiation byproducts or other hazardous materials, outbreak of disease, bioterrorism, or
 incidents involving weapons of mass destruction.

6 (5) "Disaster and emergency services" means the preparation for and the carrying out of disaster 7 and emergency functions and responsibilities, other than those for which military forces or other state or federal 8 agencies are primarily responsible, to mitigate, prepare for, respond to, and recover from injury and damage 9 resulting from emergencies or disasters.

10 (6) "Disaster medicine" means the provision of patient care by a health care provider during a 11 disaster or emergency when the number of patients exceeds the capacity of normal medical resources, 12 facilities, and personnel. Disaster medicine may include implementing patient care guidelines that depart from 13 recognized nondisaster triage and standard treatment patient care guidelines determining the order of 14 evacuation and treatment of persons needing care.

15 (7) "Division" means the division of disaster and emergency services of the department.

(8) "Emergency" means the imminent threat of a disaster causing immediate peril to life or property
 that timely action can avert or minimize.

(9) (a) "Incident" means an event or occurrence, caused by either an individual or by natural
phenomena, requiring action by disaster and emergency services personnel to prevent or minimize loss of life
or damage to property or natural resources. The term includes the imminent threat of an emergency.

(b) The term does not include a state of emergency or disaster declared by the governor pursuant
to 10-3-303.

(10) "Political subdivision" means any county, city, town, or other legally constituted unit of local
government in this state.

(11) "Principal executive officer" means the mayor, presiding officer of the county commissioners, or
other chief executive officer of a political subdivision.

27 (12) "Religious organization" means:

28 (a) a house of worship, including but not limited to churches, mosques, shrines, synagogues, and



1 temples; or 2 a religious group, association, educational institution, ministry, order, society, or similar entity, (b) 3 regardless of whether it is integrated or affiliated with a house of worship. 4 (13) "Religious services" means a meeting, gathering, or assembly of multiple persons organized by 5 a religious organization for the purpose of worship, teaching, training, providing educational services, 6 conducting religious rituals, or other activities that involve the exercise of religion. 7 (14) "Temporary housing" means unoccupied habitable dwellings, suitable rental housing, mobile 8 homes, or other readily fabricated dwellings. 9 "Tribal government" means the government of a federally recognized Indian tribe within the (15)10 state of Montana. 11 (16)"Volunteer professional" means an individual with an active, unrestricted license to practice a 12 profession under the provisions of Title 37, Title 50, or the laws of another state." 13 14 Section 2. Section 10-3-105, MCA, is amended to read: 15 "10-3-105. Division of disaster and emergency services -- duties. (1) A division of disaster and 16 emergency services is established in the department. The division must have an administrator and other 17 professional, technical, secretarial, and clerical employees as necessary for the performance of its functions. 18 (2) The department through the division of disaster and emergency services is responsible to the 19 governor for carrying out the planning and program for disaster and emergency services of this state. 20 The division shall prepare and maintain a comprehensive plan and program for disaster and (3) 21 emergency services of this state. The plan and program must be coordinated with the disaster and emergency 22 plans and programs of the federal government, other states, political subdivisions, tribal governments, and 23 Canada to the fullest extent possible. 24 (4) The division shall: coordinate the preparation of the plan and program for disaster and emergency services with 25 (a) 26 the political subdivisions of this state; 27 (b) coordinate disaster and emergency prevention and preparation activities of all departments, 28 agencies, and organizations within the state;

7 are necessary to carry out the purposes of parts 1 through 4 of this chapter;

8 (f) periodically review local and interjurisdictional plans and programs for disaster and emergency
9 services;

(g) develop or assist in the development of mutual aid plans and agreements between the federal
 government, other states, tribal governments, and Canada and among the political subdivisions of this state;

(h) plan and make arrangements for the availability and use of any private facilities, services, and
 property and, if necessary and if in fact used, provide for payment for use under terms and conditions agreed

14 upon;

(i) institute training and public information programs and take all other preparatory steps, including
 the partial or full mobilization of disaster and emergency services organizations in advance of an actual
 incident, emergency, or disaster, to ensure the availability of adequately trained and equipped personnel in time

18 of an incident, emergency, or disaster;

19 (j) direct emergency response and disaster preparation activities as authorized by the governor;

20 (k) direct disaster response and recovery activities as authorized by the governor;

(I) prepare, for issuance by the governor, executive orders or proclamations as necessary or
 appropriate in coping with incidents, emergencies, and disasters;

23 (m) maintain liaison with and cooperate with disaster and emergency services agencies and

24 organizations of the federal government, other states, and Canada in achieving any purpose of parts 1 through

4 of this chapter and in implementing programs for disaster prevention, preparation, response, and recovery;

27 (n) assume any additional authority, duties, and responsibilities authorized by parts 1 through 4 of
28 this chapter as may be prescribed by the governor:
