6 **SECTION 3.(a)** Part 2 of Article 8 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes is 7 amended by adding a new section to read:

#### 8 "<u>§ 115C-84.3. Remote instruction.</u>

9 Remote instruction means instruction delivered to students in a remote location (a) outside of the school facility, whether synchronously or asynchronously. Instructional days or 10 11 hours provided through any of the following shall not be considered remote instruction: 12 North Carolina Virtual Public School courses. (1)13 E-learning courses that meet the requirements of G.S. 115C-238.85. (2)14 Institution of higher education courses, as provided in Article 16 of this (3) 15 Chapter or G.S. 115D-20(4). Homebound instruction required for a student by an individualized education 16 (4) program, as defined in G.S. 115C-106.3(8), or a section 504 (29 U.S.C. § 794) 17 18 plan. 19 Instruction provided to a student during a short- or long-term suspension. (5)20 A public school unit in a county that has received a good cause waiver, as provided (b) 21 in G.S. 115C-84.2(d), for the school year may use up to fifteen remote instruction days or 90 remote instruction hours when schools are unable to open due to severe weather conditions, 22 23 energy shortages, power failures, or other emergency situations, and may use that time towards 24 the required instructional days or hours for the school calendar. All other public school units may 25 use up to five remote instruction days or 30 remote instruction hours when schools are unable to open due to severe weather conditions, energy shortages, power failures, or other emergency 26 situations, and may use that time towards the required instructional days or hours for the school 27 28 calendar. 29 Except as provided in subsection (b) of this section, a public school unit shall not use (c) remote instruction to satisfy the minimum required number of instructional days or hours for the 30

17	<u>(4)</u>	Establishment of staff roles and expectations for remote instruction days,	
18		including teacher workdays, teacher accessibility, and noncertified staff	
19		workdays and responsibilities.	
20	<u>(5)</u>	Communication of learning targets to students on each remote instruction day	
21		and development of measures to ensure that remote instruction time, practice,	
22		and application components support learning growth that continues towards	
23		mastery of the standard course of study.	
24	<u>(6)</u>	Development of remote instruction options appropriate for teachers and	
25		students with limited connectivity capability, including the opportunity for	
26		students to download remote instruction materials in advance when	
27		practicable.	
28	<u>(7)</u>	Provision of remote instruction for students with disabilities in a manner	
29		consistent with each student's individualized education program (IEP), as	
30		defined in G.S. 115C-106.3, or section 504 (29 U.S.C. § 794) plan. Remote	
31		instruction supports shall be considered and included, as appropriate for the	
32		student, when an IEP or 504 plan is initially developed or at any subsequent	
33		review or revision of an IEP or 504 plan.

4	"(-)	<b>SECTION 3.(b)</b> G.S. 115C-84.2(a) reads as rewritten:
5	"(a)	School Calendar. – Each local board of education shall adopt a school calendar
6		of 215 days all of which shall fall within the fiscal year. A school calendar shall include
7	the follow	
8		(1) A minimum of 185 days or 1,025 hours of instruction covering at least nine
9		calendar months. The local board shall designate when the instructional days
10		shall occur. The number of instructional hours in an instructional day may
11		vary according to local board policy and does not have to be uniform among
12		the schools in the administrative unit. Local boards may approve school
13		improvement plans that include days with varying amounts of instructional
14		time. If school is closed early due to inclement weather, the day and the
15		scheduled amount of instructional hours may count towards the required
16		minimum to the extent allowed by State Board policy. The school calendar
17		shall include a plan for making up days and instructional hours missed when
18		schools are not opened due to inclement weather, weather, and may include the use of numeric instruction in accordence with $C = 115C$ 84.2

16	PART IIIA. REMOTE INSTRUCTION FOR COVID-19 EMERGENCIES.		
17	SECTION 3A. Notwithstanding G.S. 115C-84.3, as enacted by this act, a public		
18	school unit shall have the authority to make day-to-day decisions for the 2021-2022 school year		
19	concerning whether shifting individual schools or individual classrooms that are providing		
20	in-person instruction to temporary remote instruction is necessary due to COVID-19 exposures		
21	that result in insufficient school personnel or required student quarantines. A public school unit		
22	shall report any shift by a school or classroom from in-person to temporary remote instruction as		
23	provided in this subsection to the Department of Public Instruction within 72 hours of the shift		
24	and shall return to in-person instruction as soon as personnel are available or the required		
25	quarantines are complete.

27	PART IIIB. PLANNED VIRTUAL INSTRUCTION.		
28	<b>SECTION 3B.</b> Notwithstanding G.S. 115C-84.3, as enacted by this act, public school		
29	units shall be authorized to provide virtual instruction during the 2021-2022 school year to a		
30	student with the consent of that student's parent or legal guardian in accordance with a virtual		
31	instruction plan providing the information required by this subsection, if submitted by the		
32	governing board to the Department of Public Instruction by June 1, 2021. The Department of		
33	Public Instruction shall make available a copy of each governing board's remote instruction plan		
34	to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee and the Working Group on Virtual		
35	Academies, as enacted by Section 3C of this act, by July 1, 2021. The virtual instruction plan		
36	shall include the following:		
37 38	(1) The range of grades for which virtual instruction will be offered. The plan should note throughout the differences in delivery of virtual instruction for		
38 39	elementary, middle and high school students.

4	(4)	The estimated numbers of students to be served with virtual instruction.	
5	(5)	A means for identifying students participating in remote instruction that will	
6		allow assessment of that subgroup's performance and EVAAS scores for	
7		students receiving virtual instruction in a school that does not exclusively	
8		provide virtual instruction.	
9	(6)	Participation requirements, including student eligibility and agreements for	
10		participation from students and parents.	
11	(7)	The methods by which enrollment, daily attendance, course credit accrual,	
12		progress toward graduation, and course completion will be monitored for	
13		students receiving virtual instruction.	
14	(8)	Identification of the resources that will be used to facilitate virtual instruction.	
15	(9)	The methods for communication with and training opportunities for teachers,	
16		administrators, instructional support staff, parents, and students engaged in	
17		virtual instruction.	
18	(10)	Establishment of staff roles and expectations when providing virtual	
19		instruction, including teacher accessibility.	
20	(11)	The measures used to ensure that both synchronous and asynchronous virtual	
21		instruction time, practice, and application components support learning	
22		growth that continues towards mastery of the standard course of study.	
23	(12)	Any unique infrastructure necessary to support virtual instruction.	
24	(13)	The methods for ensuring that virtual instruction for students with disabilities	
25		is delivered in a manner consistent with each student's individualized	
26		education program (IEP), as defined in G.S. 115C-106.3, or section 504 (29	
27		U.S.C. § 794) plan. Remote instruction supports shall be considered and	
28		included, as appropriate for the student, when an IEP or 504 plan is initially	
29		developed or at any subsequent review or revision of an IEP or 504 plan.
