- (3) The leader of the minority party in the House of Representatives, or the leader's designee, and one public member appointed by the minority party leader.
- (4) The leader of the minority party in the Senate, or the leader's designee, and one public member appointed by the minority party leader.
- (5) Two members of the public appointed by the Governor.

SECTION 3. The Commission shall have two cochairs from among its membership, one designated by the Speaker of the House of Representatives and one designated by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate. The Commission shall meet upon the joint call of the cochairs, and the cochairs shall convene the first meeting as soon as practicable after appointments have been made.

SECTION 4. The Legislative Services Commission (LSC) shall grant adequate meeting space to the Commission in the State Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building. The LSC shall allocate from a portion of the funds appropriated to the General Assembly sufficient funds for the operation of the Commission. The LSC, through the Legislative Services Officer, shall assign professional staff to assist the Commission in its work. The Directors of Legislative Assistants for the House of Representatives and the Senate shall assign clerical staff to the Commission, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Commission. The Commission may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02. Members of the Commission shall receive subsistence and travel expenses at the rates provided in G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate.

SECTION 5. The Commission shall submit a final report on the results of its study, including any proposed legislation, to the General Assembly on or before May 1, 2020, by filing a copy of the report with the Offices of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate. The Commission shall terminate on May 1, 2020, or upon the filing of the final report, whichever occurs first.

SECTION 6. This act is effective when it becomes law.
