DESIGNED TO ELICIT A RESPONSE OR FOR A STUDY, SURVEY, MARKETING,

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:				
SECTION 1. Article 20 of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes is amended by adding				
a new section to read:

(a) <u>Definitions. – The following definitions apply in this section:</u>				
(1) Electronic means. – Includes an electronic mail account, text or instant

15	<u>(2)</u>	Impersonate Engages in a credible portrayal of an actual person such that

 (3) Imposter. Any person who knowingly and without consent impersonates another person for purposes of harming, intimidating, threatening, or defrauding.
- 21 (4) <u>Misrepresented person. A person who is impersonated by an imposter.</u>

(b) Offense and Punishment. – Any person who knowingly and without consent
 impersonates another person through or on a website or by other electronic means for purposes
 of harming, intimidating, threatening, or defrauding another person, including the misrepresented
 person, is guilty of a Class H felony.

(c) <u>Civil Action. – A misrepresented person or another person who is harmed,</u>
 intimidated, threatened, or defrauded by an imposter through or on a website or by other
 electronic means has a civil cause of action against the imposter and is entitled to recover the
 following from the imposter:

- 30(1)Actual damages, but not less than liquidated damages, computed at the rate of
one thousand dollars (\$1,000) a day for each day of the violation or ten
thousand dollars (\$10,000), whichever is higher.
- 33 <u>(2)</u> <u>Punitive damages.</u>
- 34(3)Reasonable attorneys' fees and other reasonably incurred litigation costs of the
