- 1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of
- 2 public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf, and the North Dakota vision
- 3 services school for the blind; and to provide an exemption.

#### 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

5	SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds
6	as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state
7	treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and
8	other income, to the department of public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf,
9	and North Dakota vision services - school for the blind for the purpose of defraying the
10	expenses of those agencies, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30,
11	2023, as follows:

SECTION 4. ESTIMATED INCOME - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND. The estimated income line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$110,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund for integrated formula payments.

SECTION 5. INTEGRATED FORMULA PAYMENTS AND SPECIAL EDUCATION **CONTRACTS EXPENDITURE AUTHORITY.** The superintendent of public instruction may expend funds included in the integrated formula payments and grants - special education contracts line items in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act for paying grants for educational services that were due in the 2019-21 biennium but which were not filed, claimed, or properly supported by the education provider until after June 30, 2021. To be reimbursed under this

- 1 section, claims must be properly supported and filed with the superintendent of public
- 2 instruction by June 30, 2022.

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# 3 SECTION 6. GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAM - MEDICAID MATCHING FUNDING - 4 DISTRIBUTION.

- 1. The sum of \$800,000, included in the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, must be distributed to reimburse school districts or special education units for gifted and talented programs upon the submission of an application that is approved in accordance with guidelines adopted by the superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent of public instruction shall encourage cooperative efforts for gifted and talented programs among school districts and special education units.
- 2. State school aid payments for special education must be reduced by the amount of matching funds required to be paid by school districts or special education units for students participating in the Medicaid program. Special education funds equal to the amount of the matching funds required to be paid by the school district or special education unit must be paid by the superintendent of public instruction to the department of human services on behalf of the school district or unit.

#### **SECTION 7. TRANSPORTATION GRANTS - DISTRIBUTION.**

- During each year of the 2021-23 biennium, the superintendent of public instruction shall calculate the payment to which each school district is entitled based on the state transportation formula as it existed on June 30, 2001, except that the superintendent shall provide reimbursement at the rate of:
  - One dollar and eleven cents per mile for schoolbuses having a capacity of ten or more passengers;
  - Fifty-two cents per mile for vehicles having a capacity of nine or fewer passengers;
  - c. Fifty cents per mile, provided:
    - The student being transported is a student with a disability, as defined in chapter 15.1-32;

PASSTHROUGH GRANTS - APPLICATION - DISTRIBUTION -12 **REPORTING.** The grants - passthrough grants line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act 13 includes \$2,863,764 for passthrough grants. The superintendent of public instruction shall 14 determine the manner in which each passthrough grant is distributed, but no more than one-half 15 of the funding may be provided each year of the biennium. Annually grantees, as a condition of 16 receiving the grant, must establish performance measures to be reviewed by the superintendent 17 of public instruction. Grantees shall report annually to the superintendent of public instruction 18 regarding performance based on the measures. The superintendent may not distribute the grant 19 payment for the second year of the biennium until the grantee submits the annual report for the 20 first year of the biennium. The superintendent of public instruction shall report to the 21 appropriations committees of the sixty-eighth legislative assembly regarding funds granted, 22 performance measures established for each grantee, and whether grantees met performance 23 expectations. 24 SECTION 10. REGIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATIONS - GRANTS - DISTRIBUTION. 25 The integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes 26
  - \$500,000 from the general fund for the purpose of providing annual grants to regional education associations for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. An annual grant of \$35,714 is provided to each regional education association that exists as of July 1,
- 29 2021. Regional education associations that merge during the 2021-23 biennium are entitled to
- 30 the annual grants that would have been paid to each of the member associations.

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1 SECTION 11. EXEMPTION - INDIRECT COST ALLOCATION. Notwithstanding section 2 54-44.1-15, the department of public instruction may deposit indirect cost recoveries in its 3 operating account. 4 SECTION 12. STATE AID TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES. The grants line item in subdivision 2 of 5 section 1 of this Act includes \$1,737,528 for aid to public libraries, of which no more than 6 one-half may be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022. 7 SECTION 13. EXEMPTION - SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF - HIGHER EDUCATION 8 INTERPRETER GRANT PROGRAM DISTRIBUTION. The grants line item in subdivision 3 of 9 section 1 of this Act is for the purpose of providing grants to assist institutions under the control 10 of the state board of higher education with the cost of interpreters and real-time captioning for 11 students who are deaf or hard of hearing, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending 12 June 30, 2023. Moneys appropriated for this program are not subject to section 54-44.1-11. 13 Funds must be distributed pursuant to the provisions of this section: 14 The school for the deaf shall develop a formula to determine the grant amount for 15 which an institution is eligible. The formula must be based on a uniform hourly 16 reimbursement. 17 2. To obtain a grant under this section, an institution shall submit to the school for the 18 deaf, at the time and in the manner directed by the school, invoices showing the 19 amount expended for interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf 20 or hard of hearing. 21 3. The school for the deaf may not distribute more than fifty percent of the amount 22 appropriated during the first year of the biennium. 23 4. If any grant moneys remain undistributed at the end of the biennium, the school for the 24 deaf shall provide additional prorated grants to institutions that incurred, during the 25 biennium, hourly expenses in excess of the formula reimbursement level. 26 At the request of an institution under the control of the state board of higher education, 5.
