## ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1013

Introduced by

Appropriations Committee

1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of  
2 public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf, and the North Dakota vision  
3 services - school for the blind; to amend and reenact sections 15.1-02-02, 15.1-02-16,  
4 15.1-06-19, and 15.1-27-16 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the salary of the  
5 superintendent of public instruction, credentialing, school counselors, and administrative cost-  
6 sharing for cooperating districts; to provide for a transfer; to provide an exemption; to provide for  
7 a legislative management study; to provide for reports; and to provide an expiration date.

8 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:**

9 **SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION.** The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds  
10 as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state  
11 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and  
12 other income, to the department of public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf,  
13 and North Dakota vision services - school for the blind for the purpose of defraying the  
14 expenses of those agencies, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30,  
15 2023, as follows:

1 The 2021-23 biennium one-time funding amounts are not part of the entity's base budget for  
2 the 2023-25 biennium. The department of public instruction, school for the deaf, and North  
3 Dakota vision services - school for the blind shall report to the appropriations committees of the  
4 sixty-eighth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning  
5 July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

6 **SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - TUITION APPORTIONMENT.** The sum of \$433,020,000,  
7 included in the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, is  
8 from the state tuition fund in the state treasury. Any additional amount in the state tuition fund  
9 that becomes available for distribution to public schools is appropriated to the department of  
10 public instruction for that purpose for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30,  
11 2023.

12 **SECTION 4. ESTIMATED INCOME - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND.** The  
13 estimated income line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes the sum of  
14 \$110,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund for integrated formula payments.

15 **SECTION 5. INTEGRATED FORMULA PAYMENTS AND SPECIAL EDUCATION**  
16 **CONTRACTS EXPENDITURE AUTHORITY.** The superintendent of public instruction may  
17 expend funds included in the integrated formula payments and grants - special education  
18 contracts line items in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act for paying grants for educational  
19 services that were due in the 2019-21 biennium but which were not filed, claimed, or properly  
20 supported by the education provider until after June 30, 2021. To be reimbursed under this  
21 section, claims must be properly supported and filed with the superintendent of public  
22 instruction by June 30, 2022.

23 **SECTION 6. GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAM - MEDICAID MATCHING FUNDING -**  
24 **DISTRIBUTION.**

25 1. The sum of \$800,000, included in the integrated formula payments line item in  
26 subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, must be distributed to reimburse school districts  
27 or special education units for gifted and talented programs upon the submission of an  
28 application that is approved in accordance with guidelines adopted by the  
29 superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent of public instruction shall  
30 encourage cooperative efforts for gifted and talented programs among school districts  
31 and special education units.

- 1           2.    State school aid payments for special education must be reduced by the amount of  
2                    matching funds required to be paid by school districts or special education units for  
3                    students participating in the Medicaid program. Special education funds equal to the  
4                    amount of the matching funds required to be paid by the school district or special  
5                    education unit must be paid by the superintendent of public instruction to the  
6                    department of human services on behalf of the school district or unit.

7           **SECTION 7. TRANSPORTATION GRANTS - DISTRIBUTION.**

- 8           1.    During each year of the 2021-23 biennium, the superintendent of public instruction  
9                    shall calculate the payment to which each school district is entitled based on the state  
10                   transportation formula as it existed on June 30, 2001, except that the superintendent  
11                   shall provide reimbursement at the rate of:
- 12           a.    One dollar and eleven cents per mile for schoolbuses having a capacity of ten or  
13                    more passengers;
  - 14           b.    Fifty-two cents per mile for vehicles having a capacity of nine or fewer  
15                    passengers;
  - 16           c.    Fifty cents per mile, provided:
    - 17                   (1)   The student being transported is a student with a disability, as defined in  
18                        chapter 15.1-32;
    - 19                   (2)   The student's individualized education program plan requires that the  
20                        student attend a public or a nonpublic school located outside the student's  
21                        school district of residence;
    - 22                   (3)   The student is transported by an adult member of the student's family;
    - 23                   (4)   The student is transported in a vehicle furnished by the student's parents;
    - 24                   (5)   The student's transportation is paid for by the student's parents; and
    - 25                   (6)   The reimbursement does not exceed two round trips daily between the  
26                        student's home and school.
  - 27           d.    Fifty cents per mile, one way, provided:
    - 28                   (1)   The student being transported resides more than two miles from the public  
29                        school that the student attends;
    - 30                   (2)   The student is transported by an adult member of the student's family;

1                   (3) The student is transported in a vehicle furnished by the student's parents;  
2                   and

3                   (4) The student's transportation is paid for by the student's parents.  
4                   e. Thirty cents per student for each one-way trip.

5                   2. The superintendent of public instruction shall use the latest available student  
6                   enrollment count in each school district in applying the provisions of subsection 1.

7                   3. This section does not authorize the reimbursement of any costs incurred in providing  
8                   transportation for student attendance at extracurricular activities or events.

9                   **SECTION 8. CONDITION ON APPROPRIATION FOR GRANTS - PROGRAM AND**

10 **PASSTHROUGH LINE ITEM.** The appropriation in the grants - program and passthrough line  
11 item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act is conditioned on the superintendent of public  
12 instruction not using federal funds to defray the expenses of the following programs for which  
13 state funding is provided in this line item for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending  
14 June 30, 2023:

- 15                   1. Adult education matching grants;  
16                   2. School food services matching grants;  
17                   3. Program grant pool; and  
18                   4. Mentoring program.

19                   **SECTION 9. REGIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATIONS - GRANTS - DISTRIBUTION.** The

20 integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes \$500,000  
21 from the general fund for the purpose of providing annual grants to regional education  
22 associations for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. An annual  
23 grant of \$35,714 is provided to each regional education association that exists as of July 1,  
24 2021. Regional education associations that merge during the 2021-23 biennium are entitled to  
25 the annual grants that would have been paid to each of the member associations.

26                   **SECTION 10. EXEMPTION - INDIRECT COST ALLOCATION.** Notwithstanding section

27 54-44.1-15, the department of public instruction may deposit indirect cost recoveries in its  
28 operating account.

29                   **SECTION 11. EXEMPTION - GENERAL EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT FEES AND**

30 **DISPLACED HOMEMAKER DEPOSITS.** Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-15, any moneys  
31 collected by the department of public instruction for general educational development fees and

1 displaced homemakers deposits, must be deposited in the public instruction fund in the state  
2 treasury and may be spent subject to appropriation by the legislative assembly.

3 **SECTION 12. EXEMPTION - TRANSFER - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND.**

4 Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-11, if, after the superintendent of public instruction complies  
5 with all statutory payment obligations imposed for the 2019-21 biennium, any moneys remain in  
6 the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 38 of the 2019  
7 Session Laws, the lesser of \$23,733,064 or the remaining amount must be continued into the  
8 2021-23 biennium and the office of management and budget shall transfer this amount into the  
9 public instruction fund for the purpose of providing program and passthrough grants as  
10 appropriated in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act.

11 **SECTION 13. EXEMPTION - DYSLEXIA SCREENING PILOT PROGRAM.**

12 Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-11, if, after the superintendent of public instruction complies  
13 with all statutory payment obligations imposed for the 2019-21 biennium, any moneys remain in  
14 the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 38 of the 2019  
15 Session Laws, up to \$250,000 must be continued into the 2021-23 biennium for the purpose of  
16 defraying the expenses of the dyslexia screening pilot program.

17 **SECTION 14. STATE AID TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES.** The grants line item in subdivision 2 of  
18 section 1 of this Act includes \$1,737,582 for aid to public libraries, of which no more than  
19 one-half may be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022.

20 **SECTION 15. EXEMPTION - SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF - HIGHER EDUCATION**

21 **INTERPRETER GRANT PROGRAM DISTRIBUTION.** The \$40,000 appropriated for the  
22 purpose of providing grants to assist institutions under the control of the state board of higher  
23 education with the cost of interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf or  
24 hard of hearing in subdivision 3 of section 1 of chapter 38 of the 2019 Session Laws and any  
25 funding continued for this purpose from prior bienniums is not subject to section 54-44.1-11. Any  
26 funds remaining must be distributed pursuant to the provisions of this section:

- 27 1. The school for the deaf shall develop a formula to determine the grant amount for  
28 which an institution is eligible. The formula must be based on a uniform hourly  
29 reimbursement.
- 30 2. To obtain a grant under this section, an institution shall submit to the school for the  
31 deaf, at the time and in the manner directed by the school, invoices showing the



1 amount expended for interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf  
2 or hard of hearing.

3 3. The school for the deaf may not distribute more than fifty percent of the amount  
4 appropriated during the first year of the biennium.

5 4. If any grant moneys remain undistributed at the end of the biennium, the school for the  
6 deaf shall provide additional prorated grants to institutions that incurred, during the  
7 biennium, hourly expenses in excess of the formula reimbursement level.

8 5. At the request of an institution under the control of the state board of higher education,  
9 the school for the deaf shall consult with the institution and provide advice regarding  
10 the provision of services most appropriate to meet a student's needs.

11 **SECTION 16. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-02-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
12 amended and reenacted as follows:

13 **15.1-02-02. Salary.**

14 The annual salary of the superintendent of public instruction is one hundred  
15 ~~twenty-two~~twenty-seven thousand ~~eight~~seven hundred ~~ten~~sixty-eight dollars through June 30,  
16 ~~2020~~2022, and one hundred ~~twenty-five~~twenty-nine thousand ~~eight~~six hundred ~~eighty~~eighty-five  
17 dollars thereafter.

18 **SECTION 17. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-02-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
19 amended and reenacted as follows:

20 **15.1-02-16. Superintendent of public instruction - Issuance of credentials to teachers**  
21 **and administrators.**

22 The superintendent of public instruction may adopt rules governing the issuance of:

- 23 1. Credentials for teachers of driver's education;
- 24 2. Credentials for teachers of early childhood special education;
- 25 3. Credentials for elementary school principals;
- 26 4. Credentials for teachers of students who are emotionally disturbed;
- 27 5. Credentials for teachers of students who are gifted and talented;
- 28 6. Credentials for secondary school principals;
- 29 7. Credentials for library media;
- 30 8. Credentials for teachers of title I;
- 31 9. Credentials for teachers of students who have intellectual disabilities;

- 1       10.   Credentials for teachers of students who are physically disabled;
- 2       11.   Credentials for coordinators of programs for students with limited English proficiency;
- 3       12.   Credentials for school counselors;
- 4       13.   Credentials for special education directors;
- 5       14.   Credentials for special education strategists;
- 6       15.   Credentials for teachers of students who have specific learning disabilities;
- 7       16.   Credentials for superintendents;
- 8       17.   Credentials for teachers of students who have vision impairments;
- 9       18.   Credentials for teachers of students who are deaf or hard of hearing;
- 10      19.   Credentials for teachers of computer and cyber science; and
- 11      20.   Certificate of completion for paraprofessionals; and
- 12      21.   Certificate of completion for school health technicians.

13       **SECTION 18. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-06-19 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
14 amended and reenacted as follows:

15       **15.1-06-19. Counselor positions - Requirement.**

- 16       1.   Beginning with the 2010-11 school year, each school district must have available one  
17       full-time equivalent school counselor for every three hundred students in grades seven  
18       through twelve.
- 19       2.   Beginning with the 2022-23 school year, each school district must have available one  
20       full-time equivalent school counselor for every three hundred students in grades  
21       kindergarten through six.
- 22       3.   The duties of a school counselor under this section must include the academic  
23       advisement and appraisal of students, career preparation and advisement of students,  
24       assisting in the orientation of new students, interpreting aptitude and achievement  
25       tests, providing short-term individual and group counseling sessions to students,  
26       presentation of age-appropriate school counseling lessons to students, interpreting  
27       student records, collaborating with teachers on building classroom connections,  
28       collaborating with school administration to identify student issues and needs,  
29       advocating for students, and analyzing disaggregated schoolwide data. The duties  
30       may not include assessment administration, clerical responsibilities, or other  
31       administrative duties.

1     ~~2.4.~~ Up to one-third of the full-time equivalency requirement established in subsection 1  
2           may be met by career advisors.

3     ~~3.5.~~ For purposes of this section, a "career advisor" means an individual who holds a  
4           certificate in career development facilitation issued by the department of career and  
5           technical education under section 15-20.1-24 or an individual who is provisionally  
6           approved by the department of career and technical education under section  
7           15-20.1-25 to serve as a career advisor.

8           **SECTION 19. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-27-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
9     amended and reenacted as follows:

10           **15.1-27-16. Per student payments - Administrative cost-sharing - Cooperating**  
11 **districts.**

12           1. If any school district receiving payments under this chapter cooperates with another  
13           school district for the joint provision of educational services under a plan approved by  
14           the superintendent of public instruction, the superintendent of public instruction shall,  
15           notwithstanding the provisions of section 15.1-27-03.2, create and assign a separate  
16           weighting factor that allows the cooperating districts to receive, for a period of four  
17           years, a payment rate equivalent to that which each district would have received had  
18           the cooperative plan not taken effect. The superintendent of public instruction shall  
19           compute the separate weighting factor to four decimal places and that weighting factor  
20           is effective for the duration of the cooperative plan.

21           2. A school district that is cooperating with another school district under a cooperative  
22           plan approved by the superintendent of public instruction, and which has taxable  
23           property located in the same city as the other school district under the cooperative  
24           plan, may not be required as part of the cooperative plan to:

- 25           a. Provide unduplicated grade level services; or  
26           b. Share administrative personnel.

27           3. If any school district receiving payments under this chapter cooperates with another  
28           school district to jointly employ both a superintendent and a business manager, the  
29           superintendent of public instruction shall provide partial reimbursement of the  
30           combined salaries of the superintendent and the business manager as follows:

- 1           a. If the combined salaries exceed three hundred thousand dollars, the amount of  
2           the reimbursement must be calculated based upon three hundred thousand  
3           dollars. Each cooperating school district shall receive a prorated share of the  
4           reimbursement percentages listed below based on the percentage of full-time  
5           equivalency that the superintendent and business manager are employed by  
6           each district. The percentage of reimbursement for the combined salaries of the  
7           jointly hired superintendent and business manager must be as follows:  
8           (1) If two schools are cooperating, ten percent of the combined salaries;  
9           (2) If three schools are cooperating, fifteen percent of the combined salaries;  
10          (3) If four schools are cooperating, twenty percent of the combined salaries;  
11                and  
12          (4) If five or more schools are cooperating, twenty-five percent of the combined  
13                salaries.
- 14          b. To be eligible for reimbursement under this subsection, the cooperating school  
15          districts must:  
16          (1) Have been approved by the superintendent of public instruction and have  
17                implemented their administrative cost-sharing program after June 30, 2022;  
18                and  
19          (2) Submit the salaries of the superintendent and business manager to the  
20                superintendent of public instruction by June first of each year.

21           **SECTION 20. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION**

22           **FUNDING.** During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the  
23           feasibility and desirability of using up to 1 percent of common schools trust fund assets annually  
24           for school construction grants. The legislative management shall report its findings and  
25           recommendations, together with any legislation necessary to implement the recommendations,  
26           to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.

27           **SECTION 21. LEARNING LOSS, ACCELERATED LEARNING RECOVERY, AND**  
28           **ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL EMERGENCY RELIEF FUND - REPORT TO**

29           **LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.** School districts receiving funds from the elementary and  
30           secondary school emergency relief fund shall provide two narrative summary reports to the  
31           superintendent of public instruction, including information regarding learning losses of students

1 identified within the district, including subgroup gaps; school district plans to accelerate learning  
2 recovery for all students, including closing subgroup gaps; uses of elementary and secondary  
3 school emergency relief funds, including the percentage of those funds expended in categories  
4 determined by the superintendent of public instruction; and the impact elementary and  
5 secondary school emergency relief fund expenditures had on accelerating the learning recovery  
6 for the districts' students. The first school district report must be submitted to the superintendent  
7 of public instruction by December 1, 2021. An aggregated report must be presented by the  
8 superintendent of public instruction to the legislative management by June 1, 2022. The second  
9 school district report must be submitted to the superintendent of public instruction by  
10 December 1, 2022. An aggregated report must be presented by the superintendent of public  
11 instruction to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.

12 **SECTION 22. EXPIRATION DATE.** Section 19 of this Act is effective through June 30,  
13 2024, and after that date is ineffective.
