- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 57-40.6 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to the creation and funding of an emergency information program; to
- 3 amend and reenact section 57-40.6-01 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to
- 4 definitions; and to provide an appropriation.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 6 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 57-40.6-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is 7 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 8 **57-40.6-01. Definitions.**

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- 9 In this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:
- 1. "Assessed communications service" means a software service, communication
 connection, cable or broadband transport facilities, or a combination of these facilities,
 between a billed retail end user and a service provider's network that provides the end
 user, upon dialing 911, access to a public safety answering point through a permissible
 interconnection to the dedicated 911 network. The term includes telephone exchange
 access service, wireless service, and voice over internet protocol service.
 - 2. "Automated notification system" means that portion of a telecommunications system that provides rapid notice of emergency situations to the public.
 - 3. "Commissioner" means the state tax commissioner.
- "Communication connection" means a telephone access line, wireless access line,
 unique voice over internet protocol service connection, or functional equivalent
 uniquely identifiable by a number, internet address, or other designation.
- 5. "Consumer" means a person who purchases prepaid wireless service in a retail transaction.

1 "Emergency information program" means a supplemental 9-1-1 and emergency 2 management database to be used in emergency scenarios. 3 6.7. "Emergency services communication system" means a statewide, countywide, or 4 citywide radio system, land lines communication network, wireless service network, or 5 enhanced 911 (E911) telephone system, which provides rapid public access for 6 coordinated dispatching of services, personnel, equipment, and facilities for law 7 enforcement, fire, medical, or other emergency services. 8 7.8. "FCC order" means federal communications commission order 94-102 [961 Federal 9 Register 40348] and any other FCC order that affects the provision of wireless 10 enhanced 911 service. 11 8.9. "Prepaid wireless emergency 911 fee" means the fee that is required to be collected 12 by a seller from a consumer in the amount established under section 57-40.6-14. 13 9.10. "Prepaid wireless service" means any telecommunications service that provides the 14 right to use a mobile wireless service as well as other nontelecommunications 15 services, including the download of digital products delivered electronically, content 16 and ancillary services, which are paid for in advance and sold in predetermined units 17 or dollars which decline with use in a known amount. 18 10.11. "Prepaid wireless service provider" means any person that provides prepaid wireless 19 telecommunications service pursuant to a license issued by the federal 20 communications commission. 21 11.12. "Public safety answering point" or "PSAP" means a communications facility or 22 combination of facilities operated on a twenty-four-hour basis which first receives 911 23 calls from persons in a 911 service area and which, as appropriate, may directly 24 dispatch public safety services or extend, transfer, or relay 911 calls to appropriate 25 public safety agencies. 26 "Public safety answering point service area" means the geographic area for which a 12.13. 27 public safety answering point has dispatch and emergency communications 28 responsibility. 29 13.14. "Public safety telecommunicator" means an individual whose primary full-time or 30 part-time duties are receiving, processing, and transmitting public safety information 31 received through an emergency services communication system.

1 14.15. "Retail transaction" means the purchase of prepaid wireless service from a seller for 2 any purpose other than resale. 3 15.16. "Seller" means a person who sells prepaid wireless services to a consumer. 4 16.17. "Subscriber service address" means, for purposes of wire line subscribers, the 5 address where the telephone subscriber's wire line telephone device is used and, for 6 purposes of wireless subscribers, the place of primary use, as that term is defined in 7 section 57-34.1-02. 8 17.18. "Telephone access line" means the principal access to the telephone company's 9 switched network, including an outward dialed trunk or access register. 10 18.19. "Telephone exchange access service" means service to any wire line telephone 11 access line identified by a unique telephone number that provides local wire line 12 access to the telecommunications network to a service subscriber and which enables 13 the subscriber to access the emergency services communications system by dialing 14 the digits 9-1-1 on the subscriber's telephone device. 15 19.20. "Unpublished" means information that is not published or available from directory 16 assistance. 17 20.21. "Voice over internet protocol service" means a service that enables real-time two-way 18 voice communications; requires a broadband connection from the user's location; 19 requires internet protocol-compatible customer premises equipment; and permits 20 users generally to receive calls that originate on the public switched telephone network 21 and to terminate calls to the public switched telephone network. 22 "Wireless access line" means each active wireless and prepaid wireless telephone 21.22. 23 number assigned to a commercial mobile radio service subscriber, including end users 24 of resellers. 25 22.23. "Wireless enhanced 911 service" means the service required to be provided by 26 wireless service providers pursuant to the FCC order. 27 23.24. "Wireless service" means commercial mobile radio service as defined in 47 U.S.C. 28 332(d)(1) and includes: 29 Services commonly referred to as wireless; and a. 30 b. Services provided by any wireless real-time two-way voice communication 31 device, including radio-telephone communications used in:

1			(1) Cellular telephone service;			
2			(2) Personal communications service; or			
3			(3) The functional or competitive equivalent of a radio-telephone			
4			communications line used in cellular telephone service, personal			
5			communications service, or a network radio access line.			
6	24. <u>25.</u>	"Wir	eless service provider" means any entity authorized by the federal			
7		com	munications commission to provide wireless service within this state.			
8	SEC	SECTION 2. A new section to chapter 57-40.6 of the North Dakota Century Code is created				
9	and enacted as follows:					
10	Emergency information program - Generally.					
11	<u>1.</u>	<u>The</u>	emergency information program must be a hosted supplemental 9-1-1 and			
12		eme	rgency management database and must be used by all public safety answering			
13		poin	ts and emergency management agencies within the state. The supplemental			
14		data	base may allow individuals to provide information to be used in emergency			
15		scenarios and planning. The emergency information program service must:				
16		<u>a.</u>	Allow for the collection of a variety of formatted data relevant to 9-1-1, emergency			
17			management, and other public safety agencies. The formatted data must include			
18			photographs of the individual, physical descriptions, medical conditions, allergies,			
19			household data, primary language indicator, and emergency contacts;			
20		<u>b.</u>	Allow for individuals to enter formatted data through a secure website at their			
21			discretion;			
22		<u>C.</u>	Be compliant with all accessibility elements of section 508 of the Rehabilitation			
23			Act of 1973 [29 U.S.C. 749d];			
24		<u>d.</u>	Manage the currency of the data through an aging and reminder process, at least			
25			twice per year, requesting community members to keep their data up to date;			
26		<u>e.</u>	Automatically display data provided by individuals to 9-1-1 call takers for all types			
27			of telephones including landlines, mobile telephones, and voice over internet			
28			protocol service when a call is placed to 9-1-1 from a registered and confirmed			
29			phone number;			
30		<u>f.</u>	Support the delivery of community member information through a secure internet			
31			connection to all public safety answering points within North Dakota:			

1		<u>g.</u>	Ensure that service is operational across all 9-1-1 call taking equipment in North		
2			Dakota and allow for the easy transfer of information into computer-aided		
3		!	dispatch or records management systems;		
4		<u>h.</u>	Provide decision support to emergency management through the collection,		
5		į	aggregation, and visualization of community members across the United States		
6		1	through existing emergency information program databases;		
7		<u>i.</u> ,	Allow local communities to tailor data collected based on their unique regional		
8		1	requirements;		
9		<u>j.</u> .	Make data available to first responders; and		
10		<u>k.</u>	Be compatible with all future 9-1-1 systems.		
11	<u>2.</u>	<u>Publi</u>	c safety and emergency management agencies shall make reasonable efforts to		
12		public	cize the emergency information program through pamphlets, social media,		
13		neigh	borhood watch programs, community policing programs, television, municipal		
14		notification systems, and websites.			
15	<u>3.</u>	When special needs information is made available with the 9-1-1 call, the			
16		<u>telec</u>	ommunicator, where appropriate, shall relay that information to responding		
17		perso	onnel.		
18	<u>4.</u>	The information gathered as part of the emergency information program shall remain			
19		<u>strictl</u>	ly confidential. The information shall be used only to provide assistance to 9-1-1		
20		<u>telec</u>	ommunicators, first responders, and emergency personnel. A public safety worker		
21		may ı	not knowingly violate this confidentiality clause.		
22	<u>5.</u>	<u>Indivi</u>	iduals participating in the emergency information program must be advised that		
23		the p	rovision of special needs information will not result in preferential treatment.		
24			SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION. There is appropriated out of any moneys in		
25		the g	eneral fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of		
26		\$950,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, for the implementation and			
27		opera	ation of an emergency information program, for the biennium beginning July 1,		
28		2015	, and ending June 30, 2017.
