- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 34-03 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to employer-required COVID-19 vaccinations; to amend and reenact
- 3 sections 23-01-05.3 and 23-12-20 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to vaccine

4 passports and limitations on requiring documentation of COVID-19 vaccinations, antibodies,

- 5 and post-transmission recovery status; to repeal section 23-12-20 of the North Dakota Century
- 6 Code and section 2 of this Act, relating to limitations on requiring documentation of COVID-19
- 7 vaccinations, antibodies, and post-transmission recovery status and employer-required
- 8 COVID-19 vaccinations; and to provide an effective date.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

10 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 23-01-05.3 of the North Dakota Century Code is

11 amended and reenacted as follows:

12 23-01-05.3. Immunization data. (Effective through August 31, 2022)

- 13 1. The state department of health may establish an immunization information system and
- 14 may require the childhood immunizations specified in subsection 1 of section
- 15 23-07-17.1 and other information be reported to the department. The state department
- 16 of health may only require the reporting of childhood immunizations and other data
- 17 upon completion of the immunization information reporting system. A health care
- 18 provider who administers a childhood immunization shall report the patient's
- 19 identifying information, the immunization that is administered, and other required
- 20 information to the department. The report must be submitted using electronic media,
- and must contain the data content and use the format and codes specified by thedepartment.
- 23 2. If a health care provider fails to submit an immunization report required under this24 section within four weeks of vaccination:

1		a.	That health care provider may not order or receive any vaccine from the North
2			Dakota immunization program until that provider submits all reports required
3			under this section.
4		b.	The state department of health shall make a report to that health care provider's
5			occupational licensing entity outlining that provider's failure to comply with the
6			reporting requirements under this section.
7	3.	Noty	withstanding any other provision of law, a health care provider, elementary or

24			certifying or otherwise communicating the following before providing access to
25			state property, funds, or services:
26			(1) An individual's <u>COVID-19</u> vaccination status;
27			(2) The presence of <u>COVID-19</u> pathogens, antigens, or antibodies; or
28			(3) An individual's <u>COVID-19</u> post-transmission recovery status;
29		b.	Otherwise publish or share an individual's <u>COVID-19</u> vaccination record or similar
30			health information, except as specifically authorized by the individual or otherwise
31			authorized by statute; or

1		c. Require a private business to obtain documentation, whether physical or
2		electronic, for purposes of certifying or otherwise communicating the following
3		before employment or providing access to property, funds, or services based on:
4		(1) An individual's <u>COVID-19</u> vaccination status;
5		(2) The presence of <u>COVID-19</u> pathogens, antigens, or antibodies; or
6		(3) An individual's <u>COVID-19</u> post-transmission recovery status.
7	2.	Subsection 1 does not apply to the department of corrections and rehabilitation, a
8		correctional facility as defined under section 12-44.1-01, the state hospital, or a public
9		health unit.
10	<u>3.</u>	A private business located in this state or doing business in this state may not require
11		a patron. client, or customer in this state to provide any documentation certifying
12		COVID-19 vaccination, the presence of COVID-19 pathogens, antigens, or antibodies,
13		or COVID-19 post-transmission recovery to gain access to, entry upon, or services
14		from the business. This subsection does not apply to a developmental disability
15		residential facility or a health care provider, including a long-term care provider, basic
16		care provider, and assisted living provider. As used in this subsection, a private
17		business does not include a nonprofit entity that does not sell a product or a service.
18	<u>3.4.</u>	This section may not be construed to interfere with an individual's rights to access that
19		individual's own personal health information or with a person's right to access personal
20		health information of others which the person otherwise has a right to access.
21	<u>4.5.</u>	Subsection 1 is not applicable to the state board of higher education, the university
22		system, or institutions under the control of the state board of higher education to the
23		extent the entity has adopted policies and procedures governing the type of
24		documentation required, the circumstances under which such documentation may be
25		shared, and exemptions from providing such documentation.
26	5.<u>6.</u>	This section is not applicable during a public health disaster or emergency declared in
27		accordance with chapter 37-17.1.
28	6.	This section is limited in application to a vaccination authorized by the federal food and-
29		drug administration pursuant to an emergency use authorization

10	<u>2.</u>	If an employer or contractor requires an employee, prospective employee, or					
11		independent contractor in this state to be vaccinated against COVID-19 as a condition					
12		of employment or a term of a contract:					
13		<u>a.</u>	The	employer or contractor shall allow the employee, prospective employee, or			
14			inde	pendent contractor to submit proof of COVID-19 antibodies as an exemption			
15			<u>to th</u>	e vaccination requirement. Such proof is valid for six months from the date of			
16			the a	antibody test.			
17		<u>b.</u>	The	employer or contractor shall allow the employee, prospective employee, or			
18			inde	pendent contractor to submit to periodic COVID-19 tests as an exemption to			
19			the v	vaccination requirement.			
20		<u>C.</u>	The	employer or contractor shall allow the employee, prospective employee, or			
21			inde	pendent contractor to submit one of the following certificates as an			
22			<u>exer</u>	nption to the vaccination requirement:			
23			<u>(1)</u>	A certificate from a North Dakota licensed physician, physician assistant, or			
24				advanced practice registered nurse stating the physical condition of the			
25				employee, prospective employee, or independent contractor is such that			
26				immunization would endanger the life or health of the employee, prospective			
27				employee, or independent contractor; or			
28			<u>(2)</u>	A certificate signed by the employee, prospective employee, or independent			
29				contractor stating the employee's, prospective employee's, or independent			
30				contractor's religious, philosophical, or moral beliefs are opposed to such			
31				immunization.			

1	<u>3.</u>	This section does not apply to the extent an employer or an independent contractor is
2		required to comply with federal law, rules, or guidance relating to requirements for
3		vaccinations for COVID-19 or resulting from Title 42, Code of Federal Regulations,
4		part 416 et seq. [86 FR 61555 et seq. (2021)]; Title 29, Code of Federal Regulations,
5		part 1910 et seq. [86 FR 61555 et seq. (2021)]; or the presidential executive order on
6		ensuring adequate COVID safety protocols for federal contractors, issued
7		<u>September 9, 2021.</u>
8	SEC	TION 4. REPEAL. Section 23-12-20 of the North Dakota Century Code and section 3
9	of this A	ct are repealed.
10	SEC	CTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 4 of this Act becomes effective August 1, 2023.
