- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new subsection to section 4-30-01 and four new
- 2 sections to chapter 4-30 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to shared animal ownership
- 3 agreements; to amend and reenact subsection- 21 of section 4-30-01 and sections 4-30-36,
- 4 4-30-36.2, 4-30-36.3, and 4-30-36.4 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to dairy
- 5 products regulations; and to provide for a legislative management study.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

7	SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Subsection 21 of section 4-30-01 of the North Dakota Century		
8	Code is amended and reenacted as follows:		
9	21. "Pa	steurized Milk Ordinance" means the 20092011 revision of the Grade "A"	
10	Pas	teurized Ordinance issued by the United States food and drug administration and	
11	by t	he United States department of agriculture's public health service.	
12	SECTION 2. A new subsection to section 4-30-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is		
13	created and enacted as follows:		
14	<u>"Sh</u>	ared animal ownership agreement" means any contractual arrangement under	
15	which an individual:		
16	<u>a.</u>	Acquires an ownership interest in a milk-producing animal;	
17	<u>b.</u>	Agrees to pay another for, reimburse another for, or otherwise accept financial	
18		responsibility for the care and boarding of the milk-producing animal at the dairy	
19		farm; and	
20	<u>C.</u>	Is entitled to receive a proportionate share of the animal's raw milk production as	
21		a condition of the contractual arrangement.	

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 4-30-36 of the North Dakota Century Code is amendedand reenacted as follows:

1	4-30	0-36. Standards for grade A milk and milk products - Adoption of amendments.	
2	<u>1.</u>	Only grade A milk may be sold as fluid beverage for human consumption. The	
3		minimum standards for milk and milk products designated as grade A are the same as	
4		the minimum requirements of the Pasteurized Milk Ordinance which includes	
5		provisions from the "Grade A Condensed and Dry Milk Products and Condensed and	
6		Dry Whey - Supplement 1 to the Grade A PMO". The commissioner may adopt as-	
7		regulations other standards in the interest of public safety, wholesomeness of product,	
8		consumer interest, sanitation, good supply, salability, and promotion of grade A milk	
9		and milk products.	
10	<u>2.</u>	It is not a violation of this section to transfer or obtain raw milk under a shared animal	
11		ownership agreement. However, a person may not resell raw milk or raw milk products	
12		obtained under a shared animal ownership agreement.	
13	SEC	CTION 4. AMENDMENT. Section 4-30-36.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is	
14	amende	d and reenacted as follows:	
15	4-30	0-36.2. State milk sanitation rating and sampling surveillance officer - Duties -	
16	Guideli	nes.	
17	The state milk sanitation rating and sampling surveillance officer is responsible for the rating		
18	and certification of milk and dairy products. The rating and certification of milk and dairy		
19	9 products must be in accordance with the procedures outlined in the public health service/food		
20	0 and drug administration publication entitled "Methods of Making Sanitation Ratings of Milk		
21	Shippers - 20092011 Revision, Edition" and the sampling of milk and dairy products must be in		
22	accordance with the guidelines in the Standard Methods.		
23	SEC	CTION 5. AMENDMENT. Section 4-30-36.3 of the North Dakota Century Code is	
24	amende	d and reenacted as follows:	
25	4-30	0-36.3. Milk laboratory evaluations officer - Duties - Guidelines.	
26	The milk laboratory evaluations officer is responsible for the certification and evaluation of		
27	milk and dairy products laboratories within the state. Evaluations and certification of milk		
28	laboratories must be made in accordance with the Standard Methods and the procedures		
29	outlined in the public health service/food and drug administration publication entitled "Evaluation		
30	of Milk L	aboratories - 2009<u>2011</u> Edition".

1	SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Section 4-30-36.4 of the North Dakota Century Code is				
2	amended and reenacted as follows:				
3	4-30	4-30-36.4. Grade A pasteurized milk ordinance.			
4	Dair	y producers, processors, and manufacturers shall comply with the Pasteurized Milk			
5	Ordinan	ce and follow the standards set by the "Procedures Governing the Cooperative			
6	State-Public Health Service Food and Drug Administration Program of the National Conference				
7	on Inters	state Milk Shipments, 20092011 Revision".			
8	SEC	TION 7. A new section to chapter 4-30 of the North Dakota Century Code is created			
9	and enacted as follows:				
10	<u>Sha</u>	red animal ownership agreement - Notification of commissioner.			
11	<u>1.</u>	If during a calendar year the owner of a dairy farm licensed to sell grade A or			
12		manufacturing grade milk in this state enters or continues to participate in a shared			
13		animal ownership agreement, the owner shall notify the agriculture commissioner.			
14	<u>2.</u>	The notification must be in writing and must be submitted within thirty days after the			
15		conclusion of each calendar year.			
16	SEC	TION 8. A new section to chapter 4-30 of the North Dakota Century Code is created			
17	and ena	cted as follows:			
18	<u>Sha</u>	<u>red animal ownership agreement - Requirements.</u>			
19	<u>A pe</u>	erson that transfers an animal's raw milk production in accordance with a shared animal			
20	ownersh	ip agreement does not violate this chapter provided:			
21	<u>1.</u>	The milk is transferred at the dairy farm where the milk-producing animal is located or			
22		delivered to another location in accordance with a shared animal ownership			
23		agreement;			
24	<u>2.</u>	The individual receiving the milk has entered a shared animal ownership agreement			
25		with the owner of the dairy farm and is receiving the milk on the individual's own behalf			
26		or on behalf of another who has entered a shared animal ownership agreement with			
27		the owner of the dairy farm;			
28	<u>3.</u>	The shared animal ownership agreement contains a prominent statement warning			
29		that:			
30		a. The milk is not pasteurized;			
31		b. Potential pathogens may be present in the milk; and

1		<u>C.</u>	There are potential health concerns associated with the consumption of raw milk
2			or raw milk products.
3	<u>4.</u>	<u>Anr</u>	nually, the owner of the dairy farm provides to individuals who have entered shared
4	animal ownership agreements with the owner:		
5		<u>a.</u>	The standards used to ensure the health of the milk-producing animals that are
6			part of the shared animal ownership agreement;
7		<u>b.</u>	The standards used to ensure the production of milk;
8		<u>C.</u>	The results of any tests performed on the milk-producing animals, together with
9			an explanation of the test results; and
10		<u>d.</u>	The results of any tests performed on the milk from the milk-producing animals,
11			together with an explanation of the test results.
12	SEC		N 9. A new section to chapter 4-30 of the North Dakota Century Code is created
13	and enacted as follows:		
14	Shared animal ownership agreement - Prohibition.		
15	A person may not publish any statement that asserts or implies the approval or		
16	endorsement by the commissioner of shared animal ownership agreements and the acquisition		
17	of raw milk under such agreements.		
18	SECTION 10. A new section to chapter 4-30 of the North Dakota Century Code is created		
19	and enacted as follows:		
20	Commissioner - Rulemaking authority - Limitation.		
21	Notwithstanding chapter 28 32, the commissioner may not adopt any rule that restricts,		
22	limits, or imposes additional requirements on any individual transferring or obtaining raw milk in		
23	accordance with the terms of a shared animal ownership agreement.		
24	SEC		N 11. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - RAW MILK. During the 2013-14
25	interim,	the le	egislative management shall consider studying the availability of raw or
26	unpasteurized milk, for human consumption, in this state. The study should examine the nature		
27	and extent of governmental oversight with respect to the safety of the milk; the health of the		
28	animals used to produce the milk; and the conditions under which the product is produced,		
29	transferred, or obtained. The legislative management shall report its findings and		
30	recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to		
31	the sixty-fourth legislative assembly.
