- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact section 43-58-11 of the North Dakota Century Code,
- 2 relating to the regulation of naturopaths; and to amend and reenact sections 43-58-01 and
- 3 43-58-08 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the regulation of naturopaths.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

5 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 43-58-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is

6 amended and reenacted as follows:

7 **43-58-01**. Definitions.

- 8 As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:
- 9 1. "Approved naturopathic medical college" means a college and program granting the 10 degree of doctor of naturopathy or naturopathic medicine which must require as a 11 minimum a four-year, full-time resident program of academic and clinical study and 12 which:
- a. Is accredited, or has the status of candidate for accreditation, by an organization
 approved by the board, such as the council on naturopathic medical education; or
- b. Has been approved by the board after an investigation that determines that the
 college or program meets education standards equivalent to those established by
 the accrediting agency under subdivision a and complies with the board's rules.
- 18 2. "Board" means the state board of integrative health care created under chapter 43-57.
- "Homeopathic preparations" means nonprescriptive substances prepared according to
 the official homeopathic pharmacopoeia of the United States. The term does not include prescriptive drugs.
- 4. "Licensee" means an individual licensed by the board under this chapter.
- 23 <u>5.</u> <u>"Minor office procedures" means the methods for repair and care incidental to</u>
- 24 superficial lacerations and abrasions, superficial lesions, and the removal of foreign

4	5.<u>6.</u>	"Na	turopath" means an individual licensed to practice naturopathic health care under			
5		this	chapter.			
6	6.<u>7.</u>	"Na	turopathic health care", "naturopathic medicine", or "naturopathy" means a system			
7		of p	rimary health care practiced by naturopaths for the prevention, diagnosis, and			
8		trea	tment of human health conditions, injury, and disease. The purpose of			
9		natu	uropathic health care, naturopathic medicine, or naturopathy is to promote or			
10		rest	ore health by the support and stimulation of the individual's inherent self-healing			
11		proc	cesses. This is accomplished through education of the patient by a naturopath and			
12		thro	ugh the use of natural therapies and therapeutic substances.			
13	7.<u>8.</u>	"Na	turopathic physical application" means the therapeutic use by a naturopath of the			
14		actio	ons or devices of electrical muscle stimulation, galvanic, diathermy, ultrasound,			
15		ultra	aviolet light, hydrotherapy, and naturopathic manipulative therapy. The term does			
16		not	include manipulation of the spine.			
17	<u>9.</u>	<u>"Su</u>	rgical procedure" means structurally altering the human body by the incision or			
18		des	truction of tissues.			
19	19 SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 43-58-08 of the North Dakota Century Code is					
20	20 amended and reenacted as follows:					
21	43-58-08. Practice of naturopathic health care.					
22	1.	Ana	aturopath may practice naturopathic medicine as a limited practice of the healing			
23		arts	arts as exempted under section 43-17-02. A naturopath may not:			
24		a.	PrescribeExcept as authorized under subsection 4, prescribe, dispense, or			
25			administer any prescription drug;			
26		b.	Administer ionizing radioactive substances for therapeutic purposes;			
27		C.	PerformExcept as authorized under subsection 5, perform a surgical procedure;			
28			or			
29		d.	Claim to practice any licensed health care profession or system of treatment			
30			other than naturopathic medicine unless holding a separate license in that			

1		I	profession. A naturopath may not hold out to the public that the naturopath is a	
2		I	primary care provider.	
3	2.	A nat	uropath may prescribe and administer for preventive and therapeutic purposes a	
4		presc	riptive device and the following nonprescriptive natural therapeutic substances,	
5		drugs, and therapies:		
6		a. I	Food, vitamins, minerals, dietary supplements, enzymes, botanical medicines,	
7		ä	and homeopathic preparations;	
8		b. ·	Topical drugs, health care counseling, nutritional counseling and dietary therapy,	
9		I	naturopathic physical applications, and therapeutic devices; and	
10		c. I	Barrier devices for contraception.	
11	3.	A nat	uropath may perform or order for diagnostic purposes a physical or orificial	
12		examination, ultrasound, phlebotomy, clinical laboratory test or examination,		
13		physi	ological function test, and any other noninvasive diagnostic procedure commonly	
14		used	by physicians in general practice and as authorized by the board.	
15	<u>4.</u>	A naturopath may prescribe or administer a prescription drug listed in a naturopathic		
16		<u>formu</u>	lary established by a subcommittee of the board.	
17		<u>a.</u>	The subcommittee under this subsection must be made up of the following four	
18		Ī	board members: the doctor of medicine or osteopathy, the naturopath, the	
19		ł	pharmacist, and the advanced practice registered nurse.	
20		<u>b.</u>	Except for endogenous anabolic androgenic steroids, the naturopathic formulary	
21		l	may not include drugs classified in schedules I through IV of chapter 19-03.1.	
22	<u>5.</u>	<u>A nat</u>	uropath may perform minor office procedures.	
23	<u>6.</u>	<u>A nat</u>	uropath certified by the board for specialty practice may practice naturopathic	
24		<u>childb</u>	pirth attendance.	
25	SEC	SECTION 3. Section 43-58-11 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as

29	<u>1.</u>	<u>A nat</u>	uropath may not practice naturopathic childbirth attendance unless certified by	
30		the bo	oard for specialty practice.	

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1	<u>2.</u>	<u>The</u>	e board shall adopt rules setting forth the requirements a naturopath must meet to	
2		qua	alify for certification for the specialty practice of naturopathic childbirth attendance.	
3	<u>3.</u>	<u>To (</u>	qualify for certification for the specialty practice of naturopathic childbirth	
4		attendance, a naturopath shall:		
5		<u>a.</u>	Successfully complete a three-year, didactic and clinical, certified professional	
6			midwifery curriculum approved by the board.	
7		<u>b.</u>	Successfully complete a national standardized examination in midwifery	
8			prescribed or endorsed by the board, such as the North American registry of	
9			midwives.	
10		<u>C.</u>	Meet requirements established by the board by rule.
