- 1 A BILL FOR AN ACT relating to children and families; to amend sections 28-710, 28-713, 28-720, 28-728, 28-729, 43-1301, 43-2201, 43-2203, 2 3 43-2204, 43-2205, 43-2209, 68-1207, and 68-1212, Reissue Revised 4 Statutes of Nebraska; to adopt the Nebraska Family First Act; to define and redefine terms; to create, change, and eliminate 5 6 provisions relating non-court-involved responses to reports of child 7 abuse or neglect, the central registry of child protection cases, 8 and foster care placement; to create the kinship navigator program 9 and the family finding services project; to repeal the original sections; and to outright repeal sections 43-2206, 43-2208, and 10 81-3136, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska. 11
- 12 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

1 Section 1. Sections 1 to 19 of this act shall be known and may be

- 2 cited as the Nebraska Family First Act.
- 3 Sec. 2. (1) The Legislature finds that children do best with their
- 4 own family, when safety can be assured, or with relatives or kin, and in
- 5 <u>the least restrictive environment. The Legislature also finds that</u>
- 6 enhanced support to children and families can prevent foster care
- 7 placement through the provision of mental health and substance abuse
- 8 prevention and treatment services, in-home parent skill-based programs,
- 9 and kinship navigator services.
- 10 (2) It is the intent of the Legislature to:
- 11 (a) Provide services for all children who are at risk of or who have
- 12 <u>already experienced abuse and neglect, regardless of their eligibility</u>
- 13 for federal funding. Such services should be available in the right
- 14 place, at home or in the community whenever possible, at the right time,
- 15 preferably before children and families are in crisis, with the most
- 16 appropriate duration, intensity, and mix of services to meet the needs of
- 17 children and their families;
- 18 (b) Align state child welfare funding with the primary outcomes of
- 19 safety, permanency, and well-being;
- 20 <u>(c) Equitably distribute state child welfare funding to support a</u>
- 21 continuum of interventions for children and families, including early
- 22 intervention to prevent abuse and neglect from occurring, timely and
- 23 effective response to children at risk of abuse and neglect to help keep
- 24 <u>families together</u>, and urgent attention to safety, timely permanency, and
- 25 well-being for children in out-of-home placement;
- 26 (d) Maximize federal funding for child welfare, including, but not
- 27 <u>limited to, funding from Title IV-E of the federal Social Security Act,</u>
- 28 and the medical assistance program established pursuant to the federal
- 29 <u>medicaid program;</u>
- 30 (e) Provide services to children and families that follow best
- 31 practices, promising practices, and well-supported practices; and

1 (f) Implement the federal Family First Prevention Services Act, as

- 2 <u>such act existed on January 1, 2019, and the following sections</u>
- 3 consistent with the intent stated in this section.
- 4 Sec. 3. For purposes of the Nebraska Family First Act:
- 5 (1) Candidate for foster care means a child who is identified in a
- 6 prevention plan as being in imminent risk of entering foster care but who
- 7 can remain safely in the child's home or in a kinship placement as long
- 8 <u>as services and programs are provided that are necessary to prevent the</u>
- 9 entry of the child into foster care. Candidate for foster care includes a
- 10 child whose adoption or guardianship arrangement is at risk of a
- 11 disruption or dissolution that would result in foster care placement.
- 12 Candidate for foster care includes a child with an open juvenile court
- 13 proceeding pursuant to subdivision (3)(a) of section 43-247 who has not
- 14 been removed from his or her home or is residing in his or her home, a
- 15 child with a non-court-involved case or an alternative response case, a
- 16 child whose juvenile court proceeding has closed within the past six
- 17 months, a child who is a victim of or is at risk of becoming a victim of
- 18 sex trafficking or labor trafficking as defined in section 28-830, and a
- 19 <u>child for whom an initial assessment finding has been made pursuant to</u>
- 20 <u>subdivision (2)(b), (c), or (f) of section 43-272.01;</u>
- 21 (2) Department means the Department of Health and Human Services;
- 22 (3) Kin caregiver means a person with whom a child in foster care
- 23 has been placed or with whom a child is residing pursuant to a temporary
- 24 living arrangement in a non-court-involved case when at least one of the
- 25 primary caretakers has previously lived with or is a trusted adult that
- 26 has a preexisting, significant relationship with the child or a sibling
- of such child placed pursuant to section 43-1311.02;
- 28 (4) Licensed residential family-based treatment facility for
- 29 substance abuse means a treatment facility that provides, as part of the
- 30 treatment for substance abuse, trauma-informed parenting skills training,
- 31 parent education, and individual and family counseling;

1 (5) Non-court-involved case means a case in which the department has

- 2 <u>determined that ongoing services are required to address or alleviate the</u>
- 3 <u>safety risk or other risk identified in the initial assessment and the</u>
- 4 family is willing to voluntarily engage in child protective services;
- 5 (6) Pregnant or parenting foster child means a pregnant or parenting
- 6 <u>individual</u> who is either a child under the age of majority in foster care
- 7 or a young adult in the bridge to independence program established
- 8 pursuant to the Young Adult Bridge to Independence Act;
- 9 (7) Prevention plan means a case plan that (a) identifies a foster
- 10 care prevention strategy for a child so that the child may remain safely
- 11 <u>at home, live temporarily with a relative or kin caregiver until</u>
- 12 <u>reunification can be safely achieved, or live permanently with a relative</u>
- or kin caregiver and (b) lists the services or programs to be provided to
- 14 or on behalf of the child to ensure the success of that prevention
- 15 strategy;
- 16 (8) Qualified individual means a trained professional or licensed
- 17 clinician who is not an employee of the department and who is not
- 18 connected to, or affiliated with, any placement setting in which children
- 19 are placed by the state;
- 20 (9) Qualified residential treatment program means a residential
- 21 treatment program that is trauma-informed, has registered or licensed
- 22 nursing and other clinical staff, facilitates outreach to and
- 23 participation of family members of the child to the extent appropriate
- 24 and in accordance with the best interests of the child, documents and
- 25 maintains contact information for any known biological family and kin
- 26 <u>caregiver</u>, <u>documents how family members are integrated into the treatment</u>
- 27 process and how sibling connections are maintained, provides discharge
- 28 planning and family-based aftercare support for at least six months post-
- 29 <u>discharge</u>, and is licensed and accredited; and
- 30 (10) Temporary living arrangement means a short-term out-of-home
- 31 living and care arrangement with a relative or kin caregiver for a child

- in a non-court-involved case, or when such arrangement is made during an
- 2 <u>initial assessment, when necessary to facilitate services provided by the</u>
- 3 department under the Nebraska Family First Act in which the parent
- 4 temporarily delegates parental authority to the relative or kin caregiver
- 5 and which is approved by the department following a home visit and
- 6 background check.
- 7 Sec. 4. (1) The department shall provide prevention and family
- 8 services and programs in accordance with the requirements of the Nebraska
- 9 Family First Act for children who are determined to be candidates for
- 10 foster care or who are pregnant or parenting foster children and the
- 11 parents or relative or kin caregivers of the children. Such services and
- 12 programs shall be specified in advance in a prevention plan.
- 13 (2) The department shall provide the following services for up to
- 14 twelve months, unless renewed by the department, when the needs of the
- 15 child, parent, or caregiver are directly related to the safety,
- 16 permanence, or well-being of the child or to prevent the child from
- 17 entering foster care:
- 18 (a) Mental health and substance abuse prevention and treatment
- 19 services provided by a qualified individual that begins on the date a
- 20 <u>child is identified in a prevention plan as a child who is a candidate</u>
- 21 for foster care or a pregnant or parenting foster child; and
- 22 (b) In-home, parent-skill-based programs including parenting-skills
- 23 training, parent education, and individual and family counseling.
- 24 (3) The services or programs provided under this section shall be
- 25 trauma-informed and in accordance with best, promising, supported, or
- 26 well-supported practices listed in the federal prevention services
- 27 <u>clearinghouse consistent with the federal Family First Prevention</u>
- 28 Services Act, as such act existed on January 1, 2019. The department
- 29 <u>shall comply with the requirements and protections of the Nebraska Family</u>
- 30 First Act in all non-court-involved and alternative response cases.
- 31 Sec. 5. (1) The department shall maintain a written prevention plan

- 1 for each candidate for foster care that shall:
- 2 (a) Identify the foster care prevention strategy for the child so
- 3 that the child may remain safely at home, live temporarily with a
- 4 relative or kin caregiver until reunification can be safely achieved, or
- 5 live permanently with a relative or kin caregiver;
- 6 (b) List the services or programs to be provided to or on behalf of
- 7 the child to ensure the safety of the child and success of that
- 8 prevention strategy;
- 9 (c) Indicate, when appropriate, that the child is receiving such
- 10 services or programs to prevent out-of-home placement and that absent
- 11 preventative services, foster care is the planned arrangement for the
- 12 <u>child; and</u>
- 13 (d) Include a document signed by the parents and, if applicable, kin
- 14 caregivers, acknowledging that a written copy of the prevention plan was
- 15 provided to them as well as a notice of the rights of the child, parents,
- 16 and applicable relative or kin caregivers.
- 17 (2) The department shall maintain a written prevention plan for each
- 18 pregnant or parenting foster child. The services or programs contained in
- 19 <u>such plan do not need to pertain to parenting or pregnancy exclusively.</u>
- 20 <u>The prevention plan shall:</u>
- 21 (a) Be included in a child's permanency plan if required under
- 22 subsection (2) of section 43-285;
- 23 (b) List the services or programs to ensure the safety of the child
- 24 and that the child is prepared and able to be a parent;
- (c) Describe the foster care prevention strategy for any child born
- 26 to the pregnant or parenting foster child; and
- 27 (d) Include a document signed by the pregnant or parenting foster
- 28 child acknowledging that a written copy of the prevention plan was
- 29 provided to him or her as well as a notice regarding the rights of the
- 30 pregnant or parenting foster child as a parent to his or her child.
- 31 Sec. 6. (1) Nothing in the Nebraska Family First Act shall be

- 1 construed to prevent law enforcement from taking temporary custody of a
- 2 candidate for foster care or a pregnant or parenting foster child if the
- 3 child is seriously endangered and immediate removal is necessary for the
- 4 protection of the child.
- 5 (2) In all non-court-involved cases and cases involving a candidate
- 6 for foster care where the child lives temporarily with a relative or kin
- 7 caregiver until reunification can be safely achieved or permanently with
- 8 <u>a relative or kin caregiver, a parent shall have the right to have his or</u>
- 9 her children returned to his or her home upon demand unless the child is
- 10 <u>seriously endangered by his or her surroundings and immediate removal is</u>
- 11 necessary for the child's protection. If the child is seriously
- 12 endangered and immediate removal is necessary, the department shall
- 13 inform the parent that he or she may be referred for a court-involved
- 14 case or for a petition to be filed pursuant to subdivision (3)(a) of
- 15 section 43-247.
- 16 (3) In all non-court-involved cases and cases involving a candidate
- 17 for foster care where the child lives temporarily with a relative or kin
- 18 caregiver until reunification can be safely achieved or permanently with
- 19 a relative or kin caregiver, the relative or kin caregiver shall have
- 20 temporary parental authority to exercise powers regarding the care,
- 21 custody, and property of the child except (a) the power to consent to
- 22 marriage and adoption of the child or (b) for other limitations placed on
- 23 the delegation of parental authority to the relative or kin caregiver
- 24 described in the prevention plan. The department shall reimburse such
- 25 relative or kin caregiver for facilitating services for the child
- 26 necessary to complete the prevention plan and shall notify the relative
- 27 or kin caregiver if he or she is eligible for the child-only Temporary
- 28 Assistance to Needy Families program established in 42 U.S.C. 601 et
- 29 seq., and assist the relative or kin caregiver in applying for such
- 30 program.
- 31 (4) The department shall provide a written notice of rights to

- 1 parents and, if applicable, to relative or kin caregivers that complies
- 2 with due process and includes notice (a) of the possibility that a
- 3 petition under section 43-247 could be filed in the future if it is
- 4 determined that the safety of the child is not or cannot be assured and
- 5 (b) that their participation in receiving prevention services could be
- 6 relevant evidence presented in any future proceedings. The notice of
- 7 rights shall also include the parent's or relative or kin caregiver's
- 8 right to refuse any or all voluntary services without any referral for a
- 9 court-involved case or for a petition to be filed pursuant to section
- 10 <u>43-247 if the child is not seriously endangered in his or her</u>
- 11 <u>surroundings and immediate removal is not necessary for the protection of</u>
- 12 the child.
- 13 Sec. 7. (1) If a child is seriously endangered in his or her
- 14 surroundings and immediate removal appears to be necessary for the
- 15 protection of the child, the department shall not pursue a non-court-
- 16 involved case and shall immediately terminate voluntary services if such
- 17 endangerment and need for removal becomes apparent in the course of a
- 18 non-court-involved case. The department shall immediately notify law
- 19 enforcement and refer the case to the county attorney within twenty-four
- 20 hours.
- 21 (2) If a child is seriously endangered and the county attorney
- 22 declines to file a petition for juvenile court jurisdiction pursuant to
- 23 subdivision (3)(a) of section 43-247, the department shall offer or
- 24 continue to provide services as part of a non-court-involved case and
- 25 consistent with the Nebraska Family First Act if the parent is willing to
- 26 voluntarily participate.
- 27 (3) If a child is not seriously endangered and the child is within
- 28 the meaning of subdivision (3)(a) of section 43-247, the department in
- 29 its discretion may either pursue diversion in the form of a non-court-
- 30 involved case with parent or relative or kin caregiver, if the safety
- 31 risk or other risk identified in the investigation can be addressed or

1 alleviated with services, or refer the case to the county attorney for

- 2 <u>initiation of legal proceedings.</u>
- 3 (4) If a child is not seriously endangered and the child is within
- 4 the meaning of subdivision (3)(a) of section 43-247, or a county attorney
- 5 declines to file a case referred to the county attorney, the department
- 6 may offer the parent foster care diversion services in the form of a non-
- 7 court-involved case but shall not threaten or coerce the parent with a
- 8 potential referral for a court-involved case or for a petition pursuant
- 9 to subdivision (3)(a) of section 43-247 in order to entice the parent to
- 10 <u>accept the voluntary placement of his or her child with a relative or kin</u>
- 11 <u>caregiver or to accept services.</u>
- 12 Sec. 8. <u>In addition to the prevention and family services and</u>
- 13 programs specified in the Nebraska Family First Act, the department shall
- 14 assess the eligibility of a family for and assist in application for any
- 15 public benefits, including, but not limited to, aid to dependent children
- 16 described in section 43-512, Supplemental Security Income administered
- 17 pursuant to 42 U.S.C. 1381 et seq., social security disability insurance
- 18 administered pursuant to 42 U.S.C. 423, social security survivors
- 19 benefits administered pursuant to 42 U.S.C. 402, the Special Supplemental
- 20 <u>Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children, the Supplemental</u>
- 21 Nutrition Assistance Program administered by the State of Nebraska
- 22 pursuant to 7 U.S.C. 2011 et seq., and the low-income home energy
- 23 assistance program administered by the State of Nebraska pursuant to 42
- 24 U.S.C. 8621 to 8630. The department may also connect the family with
- 25 community response services and additional services and supports based on
- 26 identified need.
- 27 Sec. 9. In all non-court-involved cases involving candidates for
- 28 foster care in which the child lives temporarily with a relative or kin
- 29 caregiver until reunification can be safely achieved or lives permanently
- 30 <u>with a relative or kin caregiver, the department shall assess</u> to
- 31 determine if the Nebraska Indian Child Welfare Act applies. If a child is

- 1 identified as an Indian child or the department has reason to believe the
- 2 child is an Indian child, the department shall comply with the Nebraska
- 3 Indian Child Welfare Act and provide protections as provided in
- 4 subsection (4) of section 43-1505 and sections 43-1506 and 43-1508.
- 5 Sec. 10. <u>The department shall provide and contract with providers</u>
- 6 to create a full array of services described in this section statewide. A
- 7 child in foster care may be placed in one of the following placements:
- 8 (1) A foster family home that:
- 9 (a) Is licensed or approved pursuant to section 71-1902 including an
- 10 approved home that has received a waiver of licensure under subsection
- 11 (2) of section 71-1904;
- 12 (b) The department deems capable of adhering to the reasonable and
- 13 prudent parent standard as defined in subdivision (7) of section 43-4703;
- 14 (c) Provides twenty-four-hour substitute care for children placed
- 15 away from their parents or other caretakers; and
- 16 (d) Provides care for not more than six children in foster care,
- 17 except that such numerical limitation may be exceeded:
- 18 (i) To allow a pregnant or parenting foster child to remain with his
- 19 <u>or her child;</u>
- 20 (ii) To allow siblings to be placed together with his or her sibling
- 21 or siblings pursuant to section 43-1311.02;
- 22 (iii) To allow a child with an established meaningful relationship
- 23 with the family to remain with the family; or
- 24 (iv) To allow a family with special training or skills to provide
- 25 care to a child who has a severe disability;
- 26 (2) A licensed residential family-based treatment facility for
- 27 <u>substance abuse with a parent residing in the facility in accordance with</u>
- 28 section 12 of this act;
- 29 (3) A qualified residential treatment program in accordance with
- 30 <u>section 13 of this act;</u>
- 31 (4) A setting specializing in providing prenatal, postpartum, or

- 1 parenting supports for parenting foster children; or
- 2 (5) A setting providing high-quality residential care and supportive
- 3 services to children who are, or are at risk of becoming, victims of sex
- 4 trafficking as defined in section 29-3005.
- 5 Sec. 11. The department shall seek coverage under the federal
- 6 medicaid program for all eligible services or placement under the Family
- 7 First Act, without delay, following a recommendation for such services or
- 8 placement for eligible persons. If coverage is denied, the guardian ad
- 9 <u>litem or the provider or, if the guardian ad litem is unable or</u>
- 10 unwilling, the child, through a client-directed attorney, who may be
- 11 appointed by the juvenile court may appeal the denial of services under
- 12 <u>the Administrative Procedure Act, in the district court, or in the</u>
- 13 juvenile court. The guardian ad litem may appeal such denial within the
- 14 scope of his or her court appointment. If coverage under the federal
- 15 medicaid program is not provided within thirty days after application for
- 16 <u>assistance</u>, the department shall provide such services and seek
- 17 reimbursement under Title IV-E of the federal Social Security Act.
- 18 Sec. 12. <u>A child in foster care may be placed with a parent</u>
- 19 residing in a licensed residential family-based treatment facility for
- 20 <u>substance abuse. Whenever possible the recommendation for the placement</u>
- 21 shall be specified in the prevention plan prior to placement. Placement
- 22 of a child with a parent residing in a licensed residential family-based
- 23 treatment facility for substance abuse does not constitute an out-of-home
- 24 placement for the purpose of subdivision (7) of section 43-292.
- 25 Sec. 13. (1) An assessment of the child shall be completed within
- 26 <u>thirty days after placement at a qualified residential treatment program.</u>
- 27 Such assessment shall:
- 28 <u>(a) Assess the strengths and needs of the child using an age-</u>
- 29 appropriate, evidence-informed tool;
- 30 (b) Determine whether the needs of the child can be met with family
- 31 members or through placement in a foster family home or, if not, specify

1 in writing why the recommended placement in a qualified residential

- 2 treatment program is the setting that will provide the child with the
- 3 most effective and appropriate level of care in the least restrictive
- 4 environment and how that placement is consistent with the short-term and
- 5 long-term goals for the child, as specified in the permanency plan for
- 6 the child;
- 7 (c) Develop a list of child-specific short-term and long-term mental
- 8 and behavioral health goals; and
- 9 (d) Work in conjunction with the family of, and the permanency team
- 10 for, the child while conducting and making the assessment.
- 11 (2) When the assessment determines that the child should not be
- 12 placed in a foster family home, the reasons why the needs of the child
- 13 cannot be met by the family of the child or in a foster family home shall
- 14 <u>be specified in writing. A shortage or lack of foster family homes shall</u>
- 15 <u>not be a reason for determining that the needs of the child cannot be met</u>
- 16 in a foster family home. The department shall specify in writing why the
- 17 recommended placement in a qualified residential treatment program is the
- 18 setting that will provide the child with the most effective and
- 19 appropriate level of care in the least restrictive environment and how
- 20 that placement is consistent with the short-term and long-term goals for
- 21 the child, as specified in the assessment for the child.
- 22 Sec. 14. (1) A review of the child shall be completed by the
- 23 department or the juvenile court within sixty days after placement at a
- 24 qualified residential treatment program. Such review shall:
- 25 (a) Consider the assessment, determination, and documentation made
- 26 by the qualified individual conducting the assessment;
- 27 (b) Determine whether the needs of the child can be met through
- 28 placement in a foster family home or, if not, whether placement of the
- 29 child in a qualified residential treatment program provides the most
- 30 effective and appropriate level of care for the child in the least
- 31 restrictive environment and whether that placement is consistent with the

1 short-term and long-term goals for the child, as specified in the

- 2 <u>assessment described in section 13 of this act; and</u>
- 3 (c) Approve or disapprove the placement.
- 4 (2) The written documentation and approval or disapproval of the
- 5 placement in a qualified residential treatment program shall be included
- 6 <u>in and made part of the permanency plan under subsection (2) of section</u>
- 7 43-285 of the child pursuant to section 13 of this act. As long as a
- 8 child remains placed in a qualified residential treatment program, the
- 9 department shall submit evidence at each status review and each
- 10 permanency hearing held with respect to the child:
- 11 (a) Demonstrating that ongoing assessment of the strengths and needs
- of the child continues to support the determination that the needs of the
- 13 child cannot be met through placement in a foster family home, that the
- 14 placement in a qualified residential treatment program provides the most
- 15 effective and appropriate level of care for the child in the least
- 16 <u>restrictive environment, and that the placement is consistent with the</u>
- 17 <u>short-term and long-term goals for the child, as specified in the</u>
- 18 permanency plan for the child;
- 19 (b) Documenting the specific treatment or service needs that will be
- 20 met for the child in the placement and the length of time the child is
- 21 <u>expected to need the treatment or service; and</u>
- (c) Documenting the efforts made by the department to prepare the
- 23 child to (i) return home, (ii) be placed with a fit and willing relative
- 24 or kin caregiver, a legal guardian, or an adoptive parent, or (iii) be
- 25 placed in a foster family home.
- 26 (3) In the case of any child who is at least thirteen years of age
- 27 and who is placed in a qualified residential treatment program for more
- 28 than twelve consecutive months or eighteen nonconsecutive months, or, in
- 29 the case of a child who is younger than thirteen years of age, for more
- 30 than six consecutive or nonconsecutive months, the department shall
- 31 obtain signed approval of the chief executive officer of the department

- 1 for the continued placement of the child in that setting.
- 2 Sec. 15. (1) For a child placed in a qualified residential
- 3 treatment program the department shall assemble a family and permanency
- 4 team for such child. The family and permanency team shall consist of all
- 5 appropriate biological family members, relative or kin caregivers of the
- 6 child, and, as appropriate, professionals who are a resource to the
- 7 family of the child, such as teachers, medical or mental health providers
- 8 who have treated the child, a representative of the child's culture or
- 9 clergy, and members of the family's informal support network. In the case
- 10 of a child who is younger than fourteen years of age, the family and
- 11 permanency team shall include members selected by the child. The family
- 12 and permanency team shall meet within thirty days of the start of each
- 13 placement in a qualified residential treatment program and every sixty
- 14 days thereafter for the duration of such placement.
- 15 (2) The department shall document in the child's prevention plan:
- 16 <u>(a) The reasonable and good faith effort of the department to</u>
- 17 <u>identify and include all the individuals described in subsection (1) of</u>
- 18 this section on the child's family and permanency team;
- 19 (b) All contact information for members of the family and permanency
- 20 team, as well as contact information for other family members and
- 21 relative or kin caregivers who are not part of the family and permanency
- 22 team;
- 23 (c) Evidence that meetings of the family and permanency team,
- 24 including meetings relating to the assessment required under section 13
- 25 of this act, are held at a time and place convenient for family;
- 26 (d) If reunification is the goal, evidence demonstrating that the
- 27 parent from whom the child was removed provided input on the members of
- 28 the family and permanency team;
- 29 <u>(e) Evidence that the assessment required under section 13 of this</u>
- 30 act is made in conjunction with the family and permanency team;
- 31 (f) The placement preferences of the family and permanency team

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1 relating to the assessment that recognizes children should be placed with

- 2 their siblings unless there is a finding by the court that such placement
- 3 is contrary to their best interest; and
