[NEW MATERIAL] DEFINITIONS.--As used in the 8 SECTION 2. 9 Public Accountability Act: "adjunct agency" means an agency, board, 10 Α. commission, office or other instrumentality, not assigned to an 11 12 elected constitutional officer, that is excluded from any direct or administrative attachment to a department of state 13 government and that retains policymaking and administrative 14 autonomy separate from any other agency of state government; 15 Β. "board" means the public accountability board; 16 C. "breach" means an action that is a violation of 17 any of the acts provided in Section 6 of the Public 18 Accountability Act; 19 "complainant" means a person who files a D. 20 complaint with the board; 21 Ε. "complaint" means a formal written assertion of 22 a breach filed with the board in accordance with the Public 23 Accountability Act; 24 "director" means the executive director of the F. 25 .205610.2

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1 board;

2 G. "government contractor" means a person who has a
3 contract with a public body or who has submitted a bid for a
4 contract with a public body;

H. "instrumentality of the state" means the New
Mexico exposition center authority, New Mexico finance
authority, New Mexico industrial and agricultural finance
authority, New Mexico lottery authority, New Mexico mortgage
finance authority, New Mexico renewable energy transmission
authority, New Mexico state fair and water quality control
commission;

I. "lobbyist" means "lobbyist", as that term is defined in the Lobbyist Regulation Act;

J. "public body" means a department, commission, council, board, committee or agency of the executive branch of government of the state; a state educational institution; a state institution; a political subdivision of the state; or an instrumentality of the state;

K. "public employee" means a person employed by a public body;

L. "public officer" means a person elected or appointed to an office of the executive branch of government of the state; a person elected or appointed to a position with a public body; a person elected to a public office of a political subdivision of the state; or a member of a governing body of a

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M. "qualified political party" means a political party that has been qualified in accordance with the provisions of the Election Code;

N. "respondent" means a person whose conduct or alleged breach is the subject of a complaint; and

O. "retired judge" means a person who has previously served as a judge; who has been retained pursuant to the provisions of Article 6, Section 33 of the constitution of New Mexico; who remains an active member of the state bar; and who is qualified to serve again as a judge pursuant to the laws of the state.

SECTION 3. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] PUBLIC ACCOUNTABILITY BOARD CREATED--MEMBERSHIP--TERMS--REMOVAL.--

A. The "public accountability board" is created as an adjunct agency under the direction of twelve board members, appointed as follows:

(1) three members appointed by the secretary
of state:

20 (a) one member upon the recommendation21 of the New Mexico municipal league;

(b) one member upon the recommendation of the New Mexico association of counties; and

(c) one member upon the recommendation of the New Mexico school boards association;

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1 three members appointed by majority vote (2) of all members of the board of commissioners of the state bar 2 of New Mexico, of which at least one member shall be appointed 3 from each congressional district; 4 three members appointed by the governor, 5 (3) of which at least one member shall be appointed from each 6 7 congressional district; and (4) three members appointed by the chief 8 9 justice of the supreme court, of which at least one member shall be appointed from each congressional district. 10 No more than five board members shall be Β. 11 12 registered members of the same qualified political party. Each appointing authority shall file letters of C. 13 appointment with the secretary of state no later than the dates 14 provided in Subsection D of this section. 15 Appointments shall be made as follows: D. 16 (1) by the third Tuesday in May of each odd-17 numbered year: 18 19 (a) one board member shall be appointed 20 by the secretary of state upon the recommendation of the New Mexico municipal league, the New Mexico association of counties 21 or the New Mexico school boards association on a rotating 22 basis; and 23 (b) one board member shall be appointed 24 by the board of commissioners of the state bar of New Mexico; 25 .205610.2 - 5 -

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(2) by the second Tuesday in June of each oddnumbered year, one board member shall be appointed by the governor; and

(3) by the last business day in June of each odd-numbered year, one board member shall be appointed by the chief justice of the supreme court.

E. Terms of office are six years in length and begin on July 1 of the year of the board member's appointment and continue through June 30 of the sixth year of a term. Board members shall serve until their successors are appointed and qualified. A person shall not serve as a board member for more than two consecutive terms. A board member who serves a partial term of at least four years shall be deemed to have served a full term of six years. A vacancy on the board shall be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term by appointment by the original appointing authority upon the recommendation of the original recommending authority, if applicable.

F. Board members are entitled to receive per diem and mileage as provided in the Per Diem and Mileage Act.

G. The board shall elect a chair and a vice chair at the first regular meeting following July 1 of each oddnumbered year. The chair and vice chair shall not be of the same qualified political party and shall not have been appointed by the same appointing authority. The board may .205610.2

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1 elect other officers as necessary.

2 Η. Seven board members constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The board shall not take action 3 unless at least seven members concur. 4 5 I. A board member may be removed only for incompetence, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office. 6 Α 7 proceeding for the removal of a member may be commenced by action by the board. The supreme court has exclusive original 8 9 jurisdiction in quo warranto over proceedings to remove members. A member shall be given notice of hearing and an 10 opportunity to be heard before the member is removed. 11 12 SECTION 4. [NEW MATERIAL] BOARD MEMBERS--QUALIFICATIONS--LIMITATIONS.--13 14 Α. To qualify for appointment to the board, a person shall: 15 be a resident of New Mexico for at least (1) 16 17 four years; 18 (2) not have changed qualified political party 19 affiliation as shown on the person's voter registration for at 20 least two years prior to appointment; if appointed by the board of commissioners 21 (3) of the state bar of New Mexico, be an attorney licensed to 22 practice law in this state; and 23 if appointed by the chief justice of the (4) 24 25 supreme court, be a retired judge. .205610.2

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1 Before entering upon the duties of the office of Β. 2 board member, each board member shall take the oath of office as provided in Article 20, Section 1 of the constitution of New 3 Mexico and shall file that oath of office with the secretary of 4 5 state. A board member shall not: C. 6 7 (1)seek or hold an office or act as a leader in a political organization or a qualified political party; 8 9 (2) seek or hold an elective public office or an appointed public position; 10 (3) be a public employee, government 11 12 contractor or lobbyist; (4) be employed or contracted by a political 13 14 committee or a person in that person's capacity as a candidate for public office; 15 publicly endorse or publicly oppose a 16 (5) candidate for public office or a ballot issue unrelated to the 17 administration of justice or the legal system; 18 make speeches on behalf of a political 19 (6) 20 organization; or solicit funds for, pay an assessment to or (7) 21 make a contribution to a political organization or candidate. 22 D. A board member who seeks or holds an office or 23 position or is employed as prohibited in Subsection C of this 24 section is deemed to have resigned from the board. 25 .205610.2 - 8 -

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1	SECTION 5. [ <u>NEW MATERIAL</u> ] BOARDDUTIES AND POWERS
2	A. The board shall:
3	(1) meet as necessary, at least once in each
4	calendar quarter to carry out its duties;
5	(2) receive and investigate complaints;
6	(3) designate a complaint review committee of
7	the board;
8	(4) hold hearings when necessary to determine
9	whether there has been a breach as alleged in a complaint;
10	(5) administer the applicable compliance
11	provisions of the acts listed in Section 6 of the Public
12	Accountability Act;
13	(6) promulgate rules necessary to implement
14	and administer the provisions of the Public Accountability Act
15	and the applicable compliance provisions of the acts listed in
16	Section 6 of the Public Accountability Act;
17	(7) compile, index, maintain and provide
18	public and online access to all advisory opinions and reports
19	required to be made public pursuant to the Public
20	Accountability Act;
21	(8) compile, maintain and provide access to
22	all codes of conduct filed with the board in accordance with
23	Section 10-16-11 NMSA 1978;
24	(9) draft a proposed code of public
25	accountability and submit the proposed code to each elected
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1 public officer and public body for adoption; 2 (10)appoint an executive director; contract for professional services as 3 (11)necessary to carry out duties; 4 (12) have the authority to accept federal 5 funds and other public or private grants to perform duties 6 7 consistent with the Public Accountability Act; and 8 (13) prepare an annual report of its 9 activities, including any recommendations regarding state ethics or public accountability laws or the scope of its powers 10 and duties, and the number of complaints received, dismissed, 11 12 adjudicated and referred to other authorities, publish the report on the board's website and provide copies of the report 13 14 upon request. Β. The board is limited in its authority to those 15 powers granted by the Public Accountability Act or expressly 16 granted in another applicable statute. In carrying out its 17 responsibilities pursuant to the Public Accountability Act, the 18 19 board may: 20 (1) sue and be sued; issue advisory opinions as provided in (2) 21 Section 9 of the Public Accountability Act; 22 designate a campaign finance committee of (3) 23 the board to resolve matters related to violations of the 24 Campaign Reporting Act; and 25 .205610.2 - 10 -

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1	(4) as necessary, designate such other
2	committees of the board to make recommendations for action to
3	the board.
4	SECTION 6. [ <u>NEW MATERIAL</u> ] BOARD JURISDICTIONCOMPLIANCE
5	PROVISIONS
6	A. The board shall enforce the applicable civil
7	compliance provisions of the:
8	(1) Campaign Reporting Act;
9	(2) Financial Disclosure Act;
10	(3) Gift Act;
11	(4) Governmental Conduct Act;
12	(5) Inspection of Public Records Act;
13	(6) Lobbyist Regulation Act;
14	(7) Open Meetings Act;
15	(8) Procurement Code;
16	(9) Public Accountability Act;
17	(10) School District Campaign Reporting Act;
18	(11) Voter Action Act; and
19	(12) Article 9, Section 14 of the constitution
20	of New Mexico.
21	B. Except where a local accountability board or its
22	equivalent with civil enforcement jurisdiction exists, the
23	board shall also enforce the applicable civil compliance
24	provisions of any local ordinances that regulate the matters
25	regulated by the laws listed in Subsection A of this section.
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1 The board may exercise concurrent jurisdiction with a local 2 accountability board or its equivalent as provided for in any 3 local ordinance. As used in this subsection, "local ordinance" 4 includes any rule, ordinance, resolution or other instrument 5 containing the force of law that was adopted by a political 6 subdivision of the state, including a home rule municipality 7 and an incorporated or urban county.

8 C. The board shall file any court action to enforce 9 the civil compliance provisions of an act listed in Subsection 10 A of this section in the district court of the county in which 11 the defendant resides.

SECTION 7. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR--APPOINTMENT--DUTIES--POWERS--LIMITATIONS.--

A. The executive director of the board shall be:

15 (1) knowledgeable about state laws related to 16 public accountability;

(2) appointed without regard to qualifiedpolitical party affiliation; and

(3) appointed, retained and reappointed solelyon the grounds of fitness to perform the duties of the office.

B. The director shall hold office for a term commencing on the date of appointment through June 30 of the fourth even-numbered year following the director's appointment.

C. Prior to the end of the director's term of office, the director may only be removed by the board for cause .205610.2

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1 and with the concurrence of at least nine board members. 2 D. Once appointed or reappointed through an action by the board, the director shall: 3 take the oath of office required by 4 (1) Article 20, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico and 5 file that oath of office with the secretary of state; 6 7 (2)devote the director's entire professional time and attention to the duties of that office: 8 9 (3) prepare an annual budget for the board and submit it to the board for approval; 10 (4) make recommendations to the board of 11 12 proposed rules or legislative changes needed to provide better administration of the Public Accountability Act; 13 14 (5) operate and maintain a publicly accessible internet website on which shall be published the board's 15 advisory opinions and annual reports and a list of persons who 16 failed or refused to file a report of expenditures and 17 contributions or a statement of no activity or to pay a penalty 18 19 imposed by the board shall be published; and 20 (6) at every meeting of the board, report any complaints referred to the board by the complaint review 21 committee and the status of all open investigations and 22 investigations closed since the board's last meeting. 23 The director may: Ε. 24 hire a general counsel for the board and 25 (1).205610.2

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1 additional personnel necessary to enable the board to carry out 2 its duties: and 3 (2) enter into contracts and agreements on behalf of the board. 4 F. The director shall not: 5 seek or hold an office in a qualified 6 (1)7 political party; or seek or hold an elected public office or 8 (2) 9 an appointed public position. A director who seeks or holds an office or G. 10 position as prohibited in Subsection F of this section is 11 12 deemed to have resigned as director. SECTION 8. [NEW MATERIAL] BOARD MEMBER RECUSAL--13 14 DISQUALIFICATION .--A board member shall recuse from and not 15 Α. participate in a board proceeding in which the member has a 16 conflict of interest. The member shall state in writing the 17 18 reason for the recusal. 19 Β. If the propriety of a board member's 20 participation in a particular matter is questioned on the grounds that the member has a conflict of interest and if the 21 member refuses to recuse from participation in the matter, the 22 board may disqualify that member from participation in the 23 relevant board proceeding with concurrence of at least nine 24 25 members.

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D. A recused or disqualified board member shall not participate in any proceeding related to the matter from which the member is recused or disqualified, and the member shall be excused from that portion of a meeting at which the matter is discussed.

If four or more board members have recused 9 Ε. themselves or are disqualified from participating in a 10 11 proceeding, the remaining members shall request the appointment 12 of temporary members from the original appointing authorities that appointed the recused or disgualified members. If the 13 14 original appointing authority was the secretary of state, then the secretary of state shall appoint temporary members 15 recommended by the original recommending authority. Appointing 16 authorities shall appoint temporary members within twenty days 17 of the request for appointment. 18

SECTION 9. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] ADVISORY OPINIONS.--

A. The board may issue advisory opinions on matters related to the laws listed in Section 6 of the Public Accountability Act. Advisory opinions shall:

(1) be requested in writing;

(2) present a question regarding whether the requester's contemplated future conduct would violate any of

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1 the acts listed in Section 6 of the Public Accountability Act; 2 (3) be issued within sixty days of receipt of 3 the request unless the board notifies the requester in writing of a delay in issuance and with specificity as to that request, 4 the reason for the delay, and continues to notify the requester 5 in writing every thirty days until the advisory opinion is 6 7 issued, which in all cases shall be within one hundred eighty 8 days of the request; and 9 (4) be published on the board's website after omitting the requester's name and identifying information. 10 A request for an advisory opinion and the Β. 11 12 research conducted to formulate the advisory opinion are confidential and not subject to the provisions of the 13 Inspection of Public Records Act. 14 Unless amended or revoked, an advisory opinion C. 15 shall be binding on the board in any subsequent board 16 proceedings concerning a person who acted in good faith and in 17 reasonable reliance on the advisory opinion. 18 [NEW MATERIAL] COMPLAINTS--JURISDICTION--19 SECTION 10. 20 INVESTIGATIONS -- SUBPOENAS .--A complaint alleging a breach of the acts listed 21 Α. in Section 6 of the Public Accountability Act may be filed with 22 the board by any person other than the director, a board member 23 or a person employed by or in a contractual relationship with 24 25 the board. .205610.2

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B. The complainant shall set forth in detail the specific allegations against the respondent and the facts that support the allegations. The complainant shall submit any available evidence that supports the complaint, including documents, records, names of witnesses and other evidence. The complaint shall be in writing, signed and sworn by the complainant and notarized.

C. Failure to satisfy a nonsubstantive requirement for filing a complaint does not invalidate the complaint.

D. The board shall not accept or consider a complaint unless the complaint is filed within two years from the last date on which the alleged conduct or breach occurred or from the last date on which a reasonable person would have discovered the facts upon which the complaint is based.

E. When a complaint is filed, the director shall present the complaint to the complaint review committee and make recommendations whether the conduct alleged in the complaint is within the civil enforcement jurisdiction of the board and warrants investigation.

F. The complaint review committee shall dismiss a complaint that is frivolous, unfounded or outside the board's civil enforcement jurisdiction within ten days of receipt of the complaint.

G. If the complaint review committee determines that a complaint is under the jurisdiction of another entity, .205610.2 - 17 -

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the committee shall, within ten days of receipt of the complaint by the board, forward the complaint to the relevant entity. A complaint shall be deemed to have been filed timely, for the purpose of the relevant entity's deadlines, if the complaint is prepared in compliance with the requirements in this section and is filed with the board.

H. The complaint review committee or the board may dismiss a complaint upon a finding that the complaint was filed for the primary purpose of publicity.

I. If a complaint is dismissed as frivolous, unfounded or outside the board's jurisdiction, or in accordance with Subsection H of this section, or is forwarded to another entity, the complaint review committee shall notify the complainant of the complaint's dismissal or referral to another entity and notify the respondent of the specific allegations in and the dismissal or referral of the complaint. A complainant shall be notified of the complainant's ability to appeal a dismissal to the board.

J. If the complaint review committee determines that there is sufficient cause to proceed with an investigation, it shall investigate the complaint. As part of an investigation, the complaint review committee may request that the district court issue subpoenas requiring the attendance of witnesses or the production of books, records, documents or other evidence reasonably related to the

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1 investigation. After the service of a subpoena, if a person 2 neglects or refuses to comply with the subpoena, the board may apply to a district court for an order enforcing the subpoena 3 and compelling compliance. The complaint review committee may 4 administer oaths, interview witnesses and examine books, 5 records, documents and other evidence reasonably related to the 6 7 complaint. All testimony in an investigation shall be under oath, and the respondent shall have the right to be represented 8 9 by legal counsel and to request that the district court issue subpoenas requiring the attendance of witnesses or the 10 production of books, records, documents or other evidence 11 12 reasonably related to the complaint. A public employee or public official who is a respondent shall be entitled to 13 representation by the risk management division of the general 14 services department, a local risk management entity or other 15 appropriate insurance carrier. 16

K. Within sixty days of the receipt of a complaint under investigation, the complaint review committee shall either:

(1) provide a copy of the complaint to the respondent and notify the respondent that the respondent shall file with the board a response to the complaint within thirty days of the respondent's receipt of the notice, unless the director approves an extension of time for filing the response; or

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1 (2) dismiss the complaint and notify the 2 complainant of the dismissal and notify the respondent of the specific allegations in and the dismissal of the complaint. 3 If a respondent fails to file a response to a 4 L. complaint within thirty days or the extended time period 5 approved by the director, the complaint review committee shall 6 7 refer the complaint along with the complaint review committee's 8 investigation and recommendation to the board for its consideration and decision. 9 Within thirty days of the filing of a 10 Μ. respondent's response, the complaint review committee shall, 11 12 having considered the response, either: dismiss the complaint and notify the 13 (1)complainant and the respondent of the dismissal; or 14 refer the complaint, response, (2) 15 investigation and recommendation to the board for its 16 consideration and decision and notify the complainant and the 17 respondent that the complaint was referred to the board. 18 No later than July 1 of each even-numbered year, 19 Ν. 20 the chief justice of the supreme court shall appoint an active or pro tempore district judge to consider the issuance and 21 enforcement of subpoenas provided for in this section. The 22 appointment shall end on June 30 of the next even-numbered year 23 after appointment. 24 [NEW MATERIAL] PRE-HEARING DISPOSITION--BOARD SECTION 11. 25

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1 HEARINGS--FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS--DISCLOSURE--APPEAL OF 2 DISMISSAL.--

A. If a complaint is referred to the board by the complaint review committee, the director shall provide the board at its next meeting a report of the committee's investigation of any complaints referred to the board. Based on the director's report, the board shall:

8 (1) dismiss the complaint and notify the9 complainant and the respondent of the dismissal; or

10 (2) set a public hearing, as soon as
11 practicable, and notify the complainant of the date, time and
12 place of the hearing at which the board will consider and
13 adjudicate the matter.

B. At any time before a hearing provided for in Subsection A of this section, the board may approve a prehearing disposition of a complaint agreed to by the director and the respondent.

C. The hearing provided for in Subsection A of this section shall be pursuant to the rules of evidence that govern proceedings in the state's courts. One of the board members appointed by the chief justice of the supreme court shall preside over the hearing and is authorized to administer oaths. The respondent has the right to be represented by counsel. The parties may present evidence and testimony, compel the presence of witnesses and examine and cross-examine witnesses.

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1 D. After the hearing, if the board finds by clear 2 and convincing evidence that the respondent's conduct constituted a breach, the board shall, within thirty days of 3 the hearing, issue a written report that shall include findings 4 of fact and conclusions of law. The written report may include 5 a public reprimand or censure regarding the respondent's breach 6 7 or recommendations for disciplinary action against the respondent, and if the respondent's conduct constituted a 8 9 willful breach, the board shall impose any fines provided for by law. 10 The board shall publicly disclose a report Ε. 11 12 issued pursuant to Subsection D of this section. If the report concerns a willful breach, the board shall provide the report, 13 along with all evidence collected during the board's 14 investigation, to the respondent and the: 15 speaker and majority and minority floor 16 (1)leaders of the house of representatives if the respondent is a 17 public official who is subject to impeachment; 18 respondent's appointing authority if the 19 (2)20 respondent is an appointed public official; appropriate public body if the respondent (3) 21 is a public employee; 22 public body with which the respondent has (4) 23 a government contract if the respondent is a government 24 25 contractor; or .205610.2 - 22 -

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(5) respondent's employer if the respondent is a lobbyist.

F. After the hearing, if the board does not find by clear and convincing evidence that the respondent's conduct constituted a breach, the board shall dismiss the complaint and provide notice of the dismissal to the complainant and the respondent within thirty days after the hearing.

8 G. The board shall promulgate rules establishing9 procedures for hearings.

SECTION 12. [NEW MATERIAL] CONFIDENTIALITY OF RECORDS.--

A. A finding that a respondent's conduct constituted a breach shall be a public record. A dismissal of a complaint shall be a public record only upon the request of the respondent.

B. Except as otherwise provided in the acts listed in Section 6 of the Public Accountability Act, all complaints, reports, files, records and communications collected or generated by the board, complaint review committee or director that pertain to alleged breaches shall not be disclosed by the board or any board member, agent or employee of the board and are not subject to the Inspection of Public Records Act, unless:

(1) disclosure is necessary to pursue an investigation by the board or one of its committees;

(2) disclosure is required pursuant to the

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1 provisions of the Public Accountability Act; or 2 they are offered into evidence by the (3) 3 board, respondent or another party at a judicial, legislative or administrative proceeding. 4 C. Information and reports containing information 5 made confidential by law or exempt from the Inspection of 6 7 Public Records Act shall not be disclosed by the board or its director, staff or contractors. 8 9 SECTION 13. [NEW MATERIAL] BOARD--INITIAL APPOINTMENTS.--10 The initial appointments to the board shall be: Α. All meetings of a quorum of members of any Β. board, commission, administrative adjudicatory body or other policymaking body of any state agency or any agency or authority of any county, municipality, district or political

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1 subdivision, held for the purpose of formulating public policy, 2 including the development of personnel policy, rules, regulations or ordinances, discussing public business or taking 3 any action within the authority of or the delegated authority 4 of any board, commission or other policymaking body are 5 declared to be public meetings open to the public at all times, 6 7 except as otherwise provided in the constitution of New Mexico or the Open Meetings Act. No public meeting once convened that 8 9 is otherwise required to be open pursuant to the Open Meetings Act shall be closed or dissolved into small groups or 10 committees for the purpose of permitting the closing of the 11 12 meeting.

That notice shall include broadcast stations licensed by the federal communications commission and newspapers of general circulation that have provided a written request for such notice.

E. A public body may recess and reconvene a meeting to a day subsequent to that stated in the meeting notice if, prior to recessing, the public body specifies the date, time and place for continuation of the meeting and, immediately following the recessed meeting, posts notice of the date, time and place for the reconvened meeting on or near the door of the place where the original meeting was held and in at least one other location appropriate to provide public notice of the continuation of the meeting. Only matters appearing on the agenda of the original meeting may be discussed at the reconvened meeting.

F. Meeting notices shall include an agenda containing a list of specific items of business to be discussed or transacted at the meeting or information on how the public may obtain a copy of such an agenda. Except in the case of an emergency or in the case of a public body that ordinarily meets more frequently than once per week, at least seventy-two hours prior to the meeting, the agenda shall be available to the

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public and posted on the public body's [web site] website, if one is maintained. A public body that ordinarily meets more frequently than once per week shall post a draft agenda at least seventy-two hours prior to the meeting and a final agenda at least thirty-six hours prior to the meeting. Except for emergency matters, a public body shall take action only on items appearing on the agenda. For purposes of this subsection, "emergency" refers to unforeseen circumstances that, if not addressed immediately by the public body, will likely result in injury or damage to persons or property or substantial financial loss to the public body.
