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15	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
16	SECTION 1. Section 7-2-18.22 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2007,
17	Chapter 361, Section 2) is amended to read:
18	"7-2-18.22. [TAX CREDIT] RURAL HEALTH CARE PRACTITIONER
19	TAX CREDIT
20	A. A taxpayer who files an individual New Mexico
21	tax return, who is not a dependent of another individual, who
22	is an eligible health care practitioner and who has provided
23	health care services in New Mexico in a rural health care
24	underserved area in a taxable year may claim a credit against
25	the tax liability imposed by the Income Tax Act. The credit
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provided in this section may be referred to as the "rural
 health care practitioner tax credit".

The rural health care practitioner tax credit 3 Β. may be claimed and allowed in an amount that shall not exceed 4 five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for all eligible health care 5 practitioners, including physicians, osteopathic physicians, 6 7 dentists, clinical psychologists, podiatrists, [and] 8 optometrists, [who qualify pursuant to the provisions of this 9 section, except the credit shall not exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for all eligible | pharmacists, independent 10 social workers, clinical mental health practitioners, marriage 11 12 and family therapists, professional art therapists, dental hygienists, physician assistants, certified nurse-midwives, 13 certified registered nurse anesthetists, certified nurse 14 practitioners and clinical nurse specialists. 15

C. To qualify for the rural health care practitioner tax credit, an eligible health care practitioner shall have provided health care during a taxable year for at least two thousand eighty hours at a practice site located in an approved rural health care underserved area. An eligible rural health care practitioner who provided health care services for at least one thousand forty hours but less than two thousand eighty hours at a practice site located in an approved rural health care underserved area during a taxable year is eligible for one-half of the credit amount.

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1 D. Before an eligible health care practitioner may 2 claim the rural health care practitioner tax credit, the practitioner shall submit an application to the department of 3 health that describes the practitioner's clinical practice and 4 5 contains additional information that the department of health The department of health shall determine whether 6 may require. 7 an eligible health care practitioner qualifies for the rural health care practitioner tax credit and shall issue a 8 9 certificate to each qualifying eligible health care practitioner. The department of health shall provide the 10 taxation and revenue department appropriate information for all 11 12 eligible health care practitioners to whom certificates are 13 issued.

E. A taxpayer claiming the credit provided by this section shall submit a copy of the certificate issued by the department of health with the taxpayer's New Mexico income tax return for the taxable year. If the amount of the credit claimed exceeds a taxpayer's tax liability for the taxable year in which the credit is being claimed, the excess may be carried forward for three consecutive taxable years.

F. As used in this section:

(1) "eligible health care practitioner" means:(a) a certified nurse-midwife licensedby the board of nursing as a registered nurse and licensed bythe public health division of the department of health to

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1 practice nurse-midwifery as a certified nurse-midwife; 2 (b) a dentist or dental hygienist licensed pursuant to the Dental Health Care Act; 3 (c) a pharmacist licensed pursuant to 4 the Pharmacy Act; 5 [(c)] (d) an optometrist licensed 6 7 pursuant to [the provisions of] the Optometry Act; [(d)] (e) an osteopathic physician 8 9 [licensed pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 61, Article 10 NMSA 1978] or an osteopathic physician assistant licensed 10 pursuant to [the provisions of] the Osteopathic [Physicians' 11 12 Assistants] Medicine Act; [(e)] (f) a physician or physician 13 assistant licensed pursuant to [the provisions of Chapter 61, 14 Article 6 NMSA 1978] the Medical Practice Act; 15 [(f)] (g) a podiatrist licensed pursuant 16 to [the provisions of] the Podiatry Act; 17 [(g)] (h) a clinical psychologist 18 19 licensed pursuant to [the provisions of] the Professional 20 Psychologist Act; [and (h) (i) a registered nurse in advanced 21 practice who has been prepared through additional formal 22 education as provided in Sections 61-3-23.2 through 61-3-23.4 23 NMSA 1978 to function beyond the scope of practice of 24 professional registered nursing, including certified nurse 25 .215733.2

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1 practitioners, certified registered nurse anesthetists and 2 clinical nurse specialists; (j) an independent social worker 3 licensed pursuant to the Social Work Practice Act; and 4 (k) a professional clinical mental 5 health counselor, marriage and family therapist or professional 6 7 art therapist licensed pursuant to the Counseling and Therapy 8 Practice Act; "health care underserved area" means a 9 (2) geographic area or practice location in which it has been 10 determined by the department of health, through the use of 11 12 indices and other standards set by the department of health, that sufficient health care services are not being provided; 13 "practice site" means a private practice, 14 (3) public health clinic, hospital, public or private nonprofit 15 primary care clinic or other health care service location in a 16 health care underserved area; and 17 (4) "rural" means an area or location 18 19 identified by the department of health as falling outside of an urban area." 20 SECTION 2.
