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20	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
21	SECTION 1. Section 22-23-2 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1973,
22	Chapter 285, Section 2, as amended) is amended to read:
23	"22-23-2. DEFINITIONSAs used in the Bilingual
24	Multicultural Education Act:
25	[A. "bilingual multicultural education program"
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1 means a program using two languages, including English and the 2 home or heritage language, as a medium of instruction in the 3 teaching and learning process;] A. "assistant secretary" means the assistant 4 secretary of bilingual multicultural education; 5 <u>B. "council" means the state bilingual</u> 6 7 multicultural advisory council; [B.] C. "culturally and linguistically [different] 8 diverse" means students who are of a different cultural 9 background than mainstream United States culture and whose home 10 or heritage language, inherited from the student's family, 11 12 tribe or country of origin, is a language other than English; [C. "district" means a public school, or any 13 14 combination of public schools in a district;] D. "culturally responsive teaching" means a 15 multicultural education teaching framework that centers 16 classroom instruction in multiethnic cultural frames of 17 reference, using the cultural knowledge, prior experiences, 18 frames of reference and performance styles of ethnically 19 20 diverse students to make learning more relevant, while utilizing the strengths of diverse students to teach them; 21 E. "division" means the bilingual multicultural 22 education division of the department; 23 [D.] F. "English language learner" means a student 24 whose first or heritage language is not English and who is 25 .216194.2

"standardized curriculum" means a school 3 district curriculum that is aligned with the state academic 4 content standards, benchmarks and performance standards; 5 L. "tribal language" means the indigenous language 6 7 spoken by an Indian tribe that is allowed by the tribe to be taught outside the tribe, but which language might not be 8 9 written; and "tribe" means a New Mexico Indian nation, tribe 10 М. or pueblo." 11 12 SECTION 2. A new section of the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act is enacted to read: 13 14 "[NEW MATERIAL] BILINGUAL MULTICULTURAL EDUCATION DIVISION--CREATED--ASSISTANT SECRETARY--DUTIES.--15 The "bilingual multicultural education division" 16 Α. 17 is created in the department to: (1) achieve the purposes of the Bilingual 18 19 Multicultural Education Act; ensure that bilingual multicultural 20 (2) education programs are in compliance with the Bilingual 21 Multicultural Education Act; 22 (3) provide technical assistance and support 23 to all school districts and charter schools in achieving the 24 25 goals of the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act; .216194.2 - 4 -

1	(4) coordinate and collaborate with all deputy
2	and assistant secretaries of divisions in the department to
3	ensure that public schools have sufficient resources, including
4	the expertise, to provide students with a bilingual
5	multicultural education;
6	(5) review and approve applications for
7	bilingual multicultural education programs and related funding;
8	(6) monitor and assess the effectiveness of
9	bilingual multicultural education programs;
10	(7) accept gifts, grants and donations to be
11	used for bilingual or multicultural education;
12	(8) enforce rules for the administration of
13	the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act;
14	(9) conduct research and compile statistics
15	relating to the education of bilingual and multicultural
16	students;
17	(10) coordinate with the Indian education and
18	Hispanic education divisions, including the deputy and
19	assistant secretaries and their advisory councils, for the
20	provision and assessment of bilingual multicultural education
21	programs and services for American Indian and Hispanic students
22	enrolled in public schools; and
23	(11) collaborate with the Indian education and
24	Hispanic education divisions and their advisory councils for
25	the provision of high quality bilingual multicultural education
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1 programs and services.

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Β. The secretary, with input from the council, shall appoint an "assistant secretary of bilingual and 3 multicultural education", who shall direct the activities of the division and advise the secretary on development of policy regarding bilingual and multicultural education.

C. The assistant secretary shall coordinate with appropriate administrators from all units in the department to ensure that department administrators from all units of the department make implementation of the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act central to and embedded in their educational priorities.

D. In accordance with the rules of the department and after consulting with the council, the assistant secretary shall:

(1) provide assistance, including advice on allocation of resources to school districts and charter schools, to improve services to meet the bilingual and multicultural educational needs of all students:

(2) provide assistance and school expertise to school districts, charter schools and tribes in the planning, development, implementation and evaluation of a bilingual and multicultural education curricula;

develop or select for implementation (3) challenging, sequential, culturally and linguistically relevant .216194.2 - 6 -

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2 pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade; 3 provide technical assistance and support (4) to school districts, public schools and local school boards to 4 develop culturally relevant standardized curricula and 5 instructional materials; and 6 7 (5) ensure that bilingual and multicultural programs are part of a school district's or charter school's 8 9 professional development plan." **SECTION 3.** A new section of the Bilingual Multicultural 10 Education Act is enacted to read: 11 12 "[NEW MATERIAL] STATE BILINGUAL MULTICULTURAL ADVISORY COUNCIL--MEMBERSHIP--DUTIES.--13 14 Α. The "state bilingual multicultural advisory council" is created to advise the secretary, department staff, 15 the governor and the legislature through its interim and 16 standing committees on the effective implementation of the 17 18 Bilingual Multicultural Education Act and the support of all 19 pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade students to have 20 equitable access to instruction and learning as required by state and federal education and civil rights laws. 21 The council consists of no more than fifteen Β. 22 members who have technical knowledge of and expertise in 23 bilingual and multicultural education as follows: 24

curriculum models to provide instruction to students in

(1) two enrolled members of tribes;

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(2) six members who are pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade teachers, principals, superintendents, other education administrators or higher education faculty who are from different geographical areas of the state and at least one of whom has a special education background;

(3) six parents of bilingual or multicultural students, including one parent of an American Indian student, one parent of a Hispanic student, one parent of an African American student, one parent of an Asian student, one parent of a Muslim student and at least one parent of a student with a disability, whose students are enrolled in bilingual or multicultural education programs at the pre-kindergarten, elementary or secondary level; and

(4) one bilingual or multicultural education
student.

C. The members shall include a minimum of two members from the department-created state bilingual advisory group; other council members shall be appointed by the secretary with input from the serving council members from an applicant pool submitted by the co-chairs after consultation with various stakeholder groups.

D. Members of the council shall begin to serve their appointment on July 1, 2020 for a maximum of two terms with each term being no longer than three years. The secretary may stagger terms on the council.

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1	E. The council shall:
2	(1) study issues of bilingual and
3	`multicultural education for all students and provide advice to
4	the department in the areas of curriculum, instruction,
5	assessment, teacher preparation, teacher evaluation,
6	professional development, licensure and student and family
7	services to:
8	(a) strengthen the quality of bilingual
9	and multicultural education programs;
10	(b) promote rigorous culturally and
11	linguistically responsive instruction in bilingual and
12	multicultural education programs; and
13	(c) support effective classroom teaching
14	for bilingual and multicultural education program students; and
15	(2) advise the division on issues such as:
16	(a) identifying current professional
17	development best practices to support teachers to work
18	effectively with all students;
19	(b) developing and training effective
20	bilingual and multicultural teachers;
21	(c) creating professional development
22	opportunities to build the capacity of public education
23	administrators to effectively lead bilingual and multicultural
24	education programs and become knowledgeable regarding current
25	research, theory and pedagogy, including culturally and
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1 linguistically responsive teaching practices;

2 (d) developing and preparing teachers,
3 educational assistants and other licensed employees to support
4 bilingual and multicultural education;

(e) contributing ideas for solutions to
streamline and strengthen program management, implementation,
assessment and monitoring of bilingual and multicultural
education programs at the state, school district and school
site levels; and

(f) becoming a resource on bilingual and multicultural education for school districts and local schools.

F. Public members of the council are entitled to receive per diem and mileage as provided in the Per Diem and Mileage Act."

SECTION 4. A new section of the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act is enacted to read:

"[<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] MULTICULTURAL EDUCATION FRAMEWORK--ASSESSMENT--PLANNING--ACCOUNTABILITY.--

A. Each school, in collaboration with the department, the Indian education and Hispanic education divisions and their advisory councils and outside experts as needed, shall develop a multicultural education plan for the full implementation of bilingual and multicultural education at their respective educational site in all public elementary and secondary schools in the state.

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1 Β. The division shall: 2 (1) utilize an external equity audit to provide an assessment and status report of education for 3 students at each school and an equity plan with specific goals 4 5 for the school. The report will identify the needs of the school for technical assistance and needed support to implement 6 7 bilingual and multicultural education at the school. Levels of bilingual and multicultural education programs will be 8 9 determined through an equity audit and equity plan at each school site, with funding provided through the at-risk index 10 and state public education funds; 11 12 (2) require that educational programs and services provided to students by school districts and charter 13

services provided to students by school districts and charter schools be aligned with the purpose, goals and provisions of the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act, the Indian Education Act and the Hispanic Education Act;

(3) require that the development of curriculum, instructional materials and other learning tools and resources provided by school districts and charter schools be relevant and responsive to the cultures and languages of their students;

(4) require the assistant secretary and the assistant secretaries of Indian education and Hispanic education and their divisions to work collaboratively with school districts, charter schools, tribes and community

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partners;

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2 (5) require the assistant secretary and the assistant secretaries of Indian education and Hispanic 3 education and their divisions to work in coordination with the 4 5 secretary and all other units of the department to make the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act, the Indian Education Act 6 7 and the Hispanic Education Act priorities of the department; 8 (6) work with the higher education department 9 and the colleges of education at state institutions of higher education to develop a comprehensive bilingual and 10 multicultural teacher preparation program; 11 12 (7) develop professional development standards, including training in culturally responsive 13 14 teaching, ethnic studies and related support services for bilingual and multicultural education, Indian education and 15 Hispanic education teachers, educational assistants and other 16 public school personnel that need such professional development 17 to make them more proficient at their jobs; 18 19 (8) set up semiannual meetings among the 20 advisory councils of the three divisions; conduct family and community forums and (9) 21 collect other forms of school data as indicators to measure the 22 effect of the bilingual and multicultural education on the 23 lives and academic progress of students statewide; 24 (10) conduct an annual report on the status of 25 .216194.2 - 12 -

bilingual and multicultural education for all students that highlights successful programs and reports on indicators of success;

(11) identify strategies that are working at schools to close the academic achievement gap for culturally and linguistically diverse students;

(12) monitor all money allocated to the department, divisions, school districts and charter schools that is earmarked to implement the provisions of the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act, the Indian Education Act and the Hispanic Education Act;

(13) monitor and ensure that school districts and charter schools have sufficient funding and resources to fully implement the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act, the Indian Education Act and the Hispanic Education Act;

(14) ensure that the expenditures of state funds are aligned with the provisions of the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act, the Indian Education Act and the Hispanic Education Act; and

(15) for each act, issue an annual report that is produced through collaboration and coordination with the Indian education and Hispanic education divisions that sets forth if and how the provisions of this subsection were accomplished during the past year, including meetings, assessments, monitoring, professional development and

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collaboration among units of the department and between the department and school districts and charter schools, and describe plans for the coming year to ensure the educational success of culturally and linguistically diverse students."

SECTION 5. A new section of the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act is enacted to read:

"[<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] TEACHER ON ADVISEMENT.--

A. As used in this section, "teacher on advisement" means a teacher with advanced coursework, experience and skills in multicultural education who is designated by a local school board, school district or charter school to teach at the school site where the teacher is assigned as a teacher on advisement and oversee the mentoring and professional development for staff who teach or work in the multicultural education program at that school site.

B. The teacher on advisement shall work with the equity assessment team and with the community to develop the equity plan and assessment report and will coordinate collaborations with the school and community to develop the equity plan.

C. The teacher on advisement shall work with all multicultural education teachers and welcome and mentor new teachers entering the school to familiarize new teachers with the school's goals for students in the multicultural education program and students in at-risk categories.

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1 D. The teacher on advisement role shall include the 2 following responsibilities: mentor teachers at the school in 3 (1) multicultural education and culturally responsive teaching; 4 collaborate with teachers and school staff 5 (2) to design specialized intervention and assessment plans; 6 7 (3) conduct the school's equity audit; and (4) work with the school district to provide 8 district-level professional development." 9 SECTION 6. A new section of the Bilingual Multicultural 10 Education Act is enacted to read: 11 12 "[NEW MATERIAL] MULTICULTURAL EDUCATION SEAL.--Criteria for a student to earn a multicultural education seal shall be 13 14 determined at the state level in consultation with the 15 secretary and the council with school district and public school input. Students shall have the option to earn a 16 multicultural education seal based on their advanced coursework 17 18 in multicultural education paired with community service and 19 research." 20 SECTION 7. Section 22-23-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1973, Chapter 285, Section 4, as amended) is amended to read: 21 "22-23-4. DIVISION AND DEPARTMENT--POWERS--DUTIES.--22 The division shall write rules for the Α. 23 department [<del>shall</del>] to issue [<del>rules</del>] for the development and 24 25 implementation of bilingual <u>and</u> multicultural education

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B. The [<del>department</del>] <u>division</u> shall administer and enforce the provisions of the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act.

C. The [department] division shall assist <u>local</u> school boards <u>and charter schools</u> in developing and evaluating bilingual <u>and</u> multicultural education programs.

D. In the development, implementation and
administration of [the] bilingual and multicultural education
programs, [the department] local superintendents and head
administrators of charter schools shall give preference to New
Mexico residents who have received specialized training in
bilingual and multicultural education when hiring personnel."

SECTION 8. Section 22-23B-1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2010, Chapter 108, Section 1 and Laws 2010, Chapter 114, Section 1) is amended to read:

24	appropriate administrators and divisions to ensure that
25	department administrators make implementation of the Hispanic
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1 Education Act a priority. 2 D. In accordance with rules of the department, and after consulting with the council, the assistant secretary 3 4 shall: (1) provide assistance, including advice on 5 allocation of resources, to public schools to improve services 6 7 to meet the educational needs of Hispanic students; 8 (2) provide assistance to public schools and 9 school districts in the planning, development, implementation and evaluation of Hispanic education curricula; 10 (3) develop or select for implementation 11 12 challenging, sequential, culturally relevant curricula standards and models to provide instruction to Hispanic 13 students in pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade; 14 (4) provide assistance to public schools, 15 school districts, local school boards and governing bodies of 16 charter schools to develop culturally relevant curricula and 17 instructional materials for Hispanic education; 18 19 (5) within budget limitations, hire Hispanic liaisons; 20 (6) within budget limitations, develop and 21 implement culturally relevant support services, including 22 continuing professional development, to increase the number of 23 Hispanic teachers, instructional support providers, principals 24 and other school administrators in New Mexico public schools; 25 .216194.2

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1 and 2 (7) develop a plan to educate New Mexico Hispanic parents about the Education Trust Act, which allows 3 parents or others to open investment accounts to save for a 4 child's higher education through the education trust board." 5 SECTION 11. A new section of the Hispanic Education Act 6 7 is enacted to read: 8 "[NEW MATERIAL] HISPANIC EDUCATION FUND--CREATED--9 PURPOSES . - -The "Hispanic education fund" is created as a 10 Α. nonreverting fund in the state treasury. The fund consists of 11 12 appropriations, gifts, grants and donations and income from 13 investment of the fund. The fund shall be administered by the 14 division. Money in the fund is subject to appropriation by the legislature for the distribution of awards to implement the 15 provisions of the Hispanic Education Act. Disbursements from 16 17 the fund shall be made by warrant of the secretary of finance 18 and administration pursuant to vouchers signed by the secretary 19 of public education or the secretary's designated 20 representative. Β. The division shall ensure that money disbursed 21

from the Hispanic education fund shall be used for the purposes stated in the Hispanic Education Act.

C. The division, in consultation with the department, shall develop procedures and rules for the award of .216194.2 - 21 -

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1	money from the fund."
