13	FEDERAL LAW IS AMENDED TO AUTHORIZE A STATE TO EXEMPT ITSELF OR
14	A PART OF ITSELF, OR TO AUTHORIZE COUNTIES TO EXEMPT
15	THEMSELVES, FROM REVERTING TO STANDARD TIME AND ACCORDINGLY
16	EITHER THE STATE OF TEXAS EXEMPTS ITSELF OR A PART OF ITSELF
17	CONTAINING EL PASO COUNTY, TEXAS, FROM REVERTING TO STANDARD
18	TIME OR THE COUNTY COMMISSION OF EL PASO COUNTY, TEXAS, EXEMPTS
19	THE COUNTY FROM REVERTING TO STANDARD TIME.

21	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
22	SECTION 1. [ <u>NEW MATERIAL</u> ] FINDINGSThe legislature
23	finds that:
24	A. the federal Uniform Time Act of 1966, Public Law
25	89-387, was enacted by congress to "promote the adoption and

1 observance of uniform time within the standard time zones" of 2 the United States and established an annual advancement from 3 standard time in March of each year, commonly called "daylight 4 saving time", and an annual return to standard time 5 approximately eight months later;

B. federal law authorizes a state that is entirely situated within one time zone to exempt itself from the annual requirement to advance time for daylight saving as long as it does so uniformly as an entire state; and

C. the freight rail-connected economic sectors in southern New Mexico and El Paso, Texas, are linked.

SECTION 2. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME EXEMPTION.--The state exempts itself from reverting to standard time after advancing to daylight saving time, and the time in New Mexico shall be mountain daylight saving time.

SECTION 3. CONTINGENT EFFECTIVE DATE.--The effective date of the provisions of this act is November 3, 2024; provided that the United States secretary of transportation certifies to the New Mexico compilation commission and the legislative council service that federal law has been enacted that authorizes a state to exempt itself or a part of itself, or allows a county to exempt itself, from reverting to standard time and pursuant to that authorization:

A. the state of Texas has enacted a law exempting itself or a part of itself that includes the county of El Paso, .223915.3 - 2 -
