

1 AN ACT

2 AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF CAPITAL PROJECTS GENERAL
3 OBLIGATION BONDS TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR SENIOR
4 CITIZEN FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS, FOR LIBRARY
5 ACQUISITIONS AND FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS AT
6 INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION, STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND
7 TRIBAL SCHOOLS; PROVIDING FOR A TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF
8 PRINCIPAL OF, INTEREST ON AND CERTAIN COSTS RELATED TO THE
9 BONDS; REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS AT THE
10 2014 GENERAL ELECTION OF THE STATE; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

12 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the
13 "2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act".

14 SECTION 2. PURPOSE.--For the purpose of providing funds
15 for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2014 Capital
16 Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation
17 indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and
18 in the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act.

19 SECTION 3. BOND TERMS.--

20 A. The state board of finance, except as limited
21 by the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act,
22 shall determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds
23 issued pursuant to that act, including but not limited to:

24 (1) date or dates of issue, denominations
25 and maturities;

(2) principal amounts;

(3) rate or rates of interest; and

(4) provisions for redemption, including
premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds

1 are issued in one or more series and other covenants relating
2 to the bonds and the issuance thereof.

3 B. The bonds shall be in such form as the state
4 board of finance determines with an appropriate series
5 designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in
6 the resolution of the state board of finance.

7 C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall
8 begin not more than two years after the date of their
9 issuance, and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years
10 after the date of their issuance. Both principal and
11 interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United
12 States at the office of the paying agent within or without
13 the state as the state board of finance may direct.

14 D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or
15 facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer,
16 and the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be
17 placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in
18 book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical
19 securities.

20 E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with
21 the provisions of the 2014 Capital Projects General
22 Obligation Bond Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act
23 and the Uniform Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act
24 and may be issued in accordance with the Public Securities
25 Short-Term Interest Rate Act.

F. The full faith and credit of the state is
pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of
and interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the
2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

SECTION 4. EXPENDITURES.--The proceeds from the sale of

1 the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be
2 distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the
3 amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2014 Capital Projects
4 General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred
5 under Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of
6 the bonds that are not required for the purposes set forth in
7 Sections 6 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose
8 of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds.

9 SECTION 5. SALE.--The bonds authorized under the 2014
10 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by
11 the state board of finance at such time and in such manner
12 and amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at
13 private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less
14 than par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If
15 sold at public sale, the state board of finance shall publish
16 a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of
17 general circulation in the state and may also publish the
18 notice in a recognized financial journal outside the state.
19 The required publications shall be made once each week for
20 two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale,
21 the last publication thereof to be at least five days prior
22 to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the
23 amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds
24 to be offered for sale and the place, date and hour at which
25 the sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place
specified in the notice, the state board of finance shall
open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the
bidder or bidders offering the best price for the bonds. The
state board of finance may reject any or all bids and
readvertise and may waive any irregularity in a bid. All

1 bids, except that of the state, shall be accompanied by a
2 deposit of two percent of the principal amount of the bonds
3 in a form acceptable to the state board of finance. The
4 deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall be returned upon
5 rejection of the bid. The state board of finance may also
6 sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the state
7 treasurer or state investment officer. The state treasurer
8 or state investment officer is authorized to purchase any of
9 the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal investments
10 for any person or board charged with the investment of any
11 public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposit
12 of public money.

13 SECTION 6. EXPENSES.--The expenses incurred by the
14 state board of finance in or relating to the preparation and
15 sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the
16 sale of the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and
17 other obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond
18 proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended,
19 shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money
20 of the state, legally available for such payments.

21 SECTION 7. TAX LEVY.--To provide for the payment of the
22 principal of and interest on the bonds issued and sold
23 pursuant to the provisions of the 2014 Capital Projects
24 General Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and there is
25 hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of
the bonds are outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property
in the state subject to property taxation for state purposes
sufficient to pay the interest as it becomes due on the
bonds, together with an amount sufficient to provide a
sinking fund to pay the principal of the bonds as it becomes

1 due, and, if permitted by law, ad valorem taxes may be
2 collected to pay administrative costs incident to the
3 collection of such taxes. The taxes shall be imposed,
4 levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner
5 that other property taxes for state purposes are imposed,
6 levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of all tax
7 officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be imposed,
8 levied, assessed and collected.

9 SECTION 8. TREASURER--DUTIES.--The state treasurer
10 shall keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant
11 to the taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of
12 the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and
13 shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the
14 principal of and interest on the bonds as they become due and
any expenses relating thereto.

15 SECTION 9. IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR
16 ISSUANCE.--An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the
17 provisions of the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation
18 Bond Act may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action or
19 mandamus, enforce and compel the performance of the duties
20 required by that act of any officer or entity mentioned in
21 that act. The provisions of that act constitute an
22 irrevocable contract with the owners of any of the bonds
23 issued pursuant to that act for the faithful performance of
24 which the full faith and credit of the state is pledged.
25 Without reference to any other act of the legislature, the
2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is full
authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds authorized
in that act, and such bonds shall have all the qualities of
investment securities under the Uniform Commercial Code,

1 shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the
2 proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and shall
3 be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or
4 holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the
5 provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt
6 from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body
7 thereof.

8 SECTION 10. PROJECTS.--The proceeds from the sale of
9 bonds issued under the provisions of the 2014 Capital
10 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as
11 follows for the purposes and in the amounts specified:

12 A. for senior citizen facility improvement,
13 construction and equipment acquisition projects, to the aging
14 and long-term services department:

15 (1) two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000)
16 to make improvements for building code compliance, including
17 purchase and installation of equipment, to Los Volcanes
18 senior center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

19 (2) three hundred sixty-five thousand
20 dollars (\$365,000) to make improvements for building code
21 compliance, including purchase and installation of equipment,
22 to the North Valley senior center in Albuquerque in
23 Bernalillo county;

24 (3) one hundred seventy-seven thousand
25 dollars (\$177,000) to make improvements for building code
compliance, including purchase and installation of equipment,
to the Palo Duro senior center in Albuquerque in
Bernalillo county;

(4) forty-six thousand dollars (\$46,000) to
purchase and install equipment in senior centers countywide

1 in Bernalillo county;

2 (5) one hundred eighty-three thousand four
3 hundred dollars (\$183,400) to purchase and install meals
4 equipment for senior centers countywide in Bernalillo county;

5 (6) two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to
6 purchase and install equipment in the Tijeras senior center
7 in Bernalillo county;

8 (7) one hundred twenty-three thousand
9 dollars (\$123,000) to plan, design, renovate and equip the

19 A. Bonds issued pursuant to the 2014 Capital
20 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be submitted to
21 the registered voters of the state at the general election to
22 be held in November 2014, and, if they receive a majority of
23 all the votes cast thereon at such election, shall take
24 effect upon certification of the state canvassing board
25 announcing the results of the election. No bonds shall be
issued or sold under that act until the registered voters of
this state have voted upon and approved the bonds and
property tax as provided in this section. Any bonds issued
under that act shall be issued within thirty months from the

1 date of such election.

2 B. The ballots used at the 2014 general election

13 For _____ Against _____".

14 C. Each question set forth in this section
15 includes a specific work or object to be financed by the
16 bonds. If any such question is not approved by a majority
17 vote of the electorate at the state's 2014 general election,
18 the issuance of bonds for the work or object specified by the
19 question shall be excluded from and shall not be part of the
20 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act. The
21 failure of a question to be approved by the electorate at the
22 2014 general election shall not affect those questions that
23 are approved at the election.

24 D. The secretary of state shall include the
25 submission of the capital projects general obligation bonds
to the people at the 2014 general election, and it shall be
included in the general election proclamation of each of the
county clerks. The secretary of state shall cause the 2014
Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act to be published
in full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state

1 if one be published therein, once each week, for four
2 successive weeks next preceding the general election as
3 required by the constitution of New Mexico.

4 SECTION 12. ART IN PUBLIC PLACES.--Pursuant to Section
5 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the appropriations
6 authorized in the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation
7 Bond Act include money for the art in public places fund.

8 SECTION 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.--

9 A. If an appropriation for a project authorized
10 in the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is
11 not sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the
12 appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes
13 specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be
14 made for purposes other than those specified in the
15 appropriation.

16 B. The state agencies and state institutions to
17 which money has been appropriated in the 2014 Capital
18 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for
19 monitoring the projects funded in that act to ensure
20 compliance with the constitution and laws of New Mexico and
21 shall cause to be reverted any unexpended or unencumbered
22 balance remaining at the earlier of the third full fiscal
23 year after issuance of the bonds or the termination or
24 completion of the specific project. Reverted funds shall be
25 deposited in the debt service fund established by the state
treasurer for the purpose of paying the principal of and
interest on the state's general obligation bonds.

SECTION 14. SEVERABILITY.--If any part or application
of the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is
held invalid, the remainder or its application to other

1 situations or persons shall not be affected.

2 SECTION 15. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public
3 peace, health and safety that this act take effect
4 immediately. _____

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
