

1 AN ACT

2 RELATING TO GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS; AUTHORIZING THE  
3 ISSUANCE AND SALE OF CAPITAL PROJECTS GENERAL OBLIGATION  
4 BONDS TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR SENIOR CITIZEN  
5 FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS, FOR LIBRARY  
6 ACQUISITIONS, FOR THE PURCHASE OF SCHOOL BUSES AND FOR  
7 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS AT INSTITUTIONS OF  
8 HIGHER EDUCATION, STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND TRIBAL SCHOOLS;  
9 PROVIDING FOR A PROPERTY TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL  
10 OF, INTEREST ON AND CERTAIN COSTS RELATED TO THE BONDS;  
11 REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS AT THE 2018  
12 GENERAL ELECTION OF THE STATE; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

13  
14 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

15 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the  
16 "2018 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act".

17 SECTION 2. PURPOSE.--For the purpose of providing funds  
18 for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2018 Capital  
19 Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation  
20 indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and  
21 in the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act.

22 SECTION 3. BOND TERMS.--

23 A. The state board of finance, except as limited  
24 by the 2018 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act,  
25 shall determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds

1 issued pursuant to that act, including:

- 2 (1) date or dates of issue, denominations  
3 and maturities;  
4 (2) principal amounts;  
5 (3) rate or rates of interest; and  
6 (4) provisions for redemption, including  
7 premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds  
8 are issued in one or more series and other covenants relating  
9 to the bonds and the issuance thereof.

10 B. The bonds shall be in such form as the state  
11 board of finance determines with an appropriate series  
12 designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in  
13 the resolution of the state board of finance.

14 C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall  
15 begin not more than two years after the date of their  
16 issuance, and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years  
17 after the date of their issuance. Both principal and  
18 interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United  
19 States at the office of the paying agent within or without  
20 the state as the state board of finance may direct.

21 D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or  
22 facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer,  
23 and the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be  
24 placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in  
25 book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical

1 securities.

2 E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with  
3 the provisions of the 2018 Capital Projects General  
4 Obligation Bond Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act  
5 and the Uniform Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act  
6 and may be issued in accordance with the Public Securities  
7 Short-Term Interest Rate Act.

8 F. The full faith and credit of the state is  
9 pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of  
10 and interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the  
11 2018 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

12 SECTION 4. EXPENDITURES.--The proceeds from the sale of  
13 the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be  
14 distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the  
15 amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2018 Capital Projects  
16 General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred  
17 under Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of  
18 the bonds that are not required for the purposes set forth in  
19 Sections 6 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose  
20 of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds.

21 SECTION 5. SALE.--The bonds authorized under the 2018  
22 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by  
23 the state board of finance at such time and in such manner  
24 and amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at  
25 private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less

1 than par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If  
2 sold at public sale, the state board of finance shall publish  
3 a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of  
4 general circulation in the state and may also publish the  
5 notice in a recognized financial journal outside the state.  
6 The required publications shall be made once each week for  
7 two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale,  
8 the last publication thereof to be at least five days prior  
9 to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the  
10 amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds  
11 to be offered for sale and the place, date and hour at which  
12 the sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place  
13 specified in the notice, the state board of finance shall  
14 open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the  
15 bidder or bidders offering the best price for the bonds. The  
16 state board of finance may reject any or all bids and  
17 readvertise and may waive any irregularity in a bid. All  
18 bids, except that of the state, shall be accompanied by a  
19 deposit of two percent of the principal amount of the bonds  
20 in a form acceptable to the state board of finance. The  
21 deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall be returned upon  
22 rejection of the bid. The state board of finance may also  
23 sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the state  
24 treasurer or state investment officer. The state treasurer  
25 or state investment officer is authorized to purchase any of

1 the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal investments  
2 for any person or board charged with the investment of any  
3 public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposit  
4 of public money.

5 SECTION 6. EXPENSES.--The expenses incurred by the  
6 state board of finance in or relating to the preparation and  
7 sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the  
8 sale of the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and  
9 other obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond  
10 proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended,  
11 shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money  
12 of the state, legally available for such payments.

13 SECTION 7. PROPERTY TAX LEVY.--To provide for the  
14 payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds issued  
15 and sold pursuant to the provisions of the 2018 Capital  
16 Projects General Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and  
17 there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which  
18 any of the bonds are outstanding an ad valorem tax on all  
19 property in the state subject to property taxation for state  
20 purposes sufficient to pay the interest as it becomes due on  
21 the bonds, together with an amount sufficient to provide a  
22 sinking fund to pay the principal of the bonds as it becomes  
23 due, and, if permitted by law, ad valorem taxes may be  
24 collected to pay administrative costs incident to the  
25 collection of such taxes. The taxes shall be imposed,

1 levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner  
2 that other property taxes for state purposes are imposed,  
3 levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of all tax  
4 officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be imposed,  
5 levied, assessed and collected.

6 SECTION 8. TREASURER--DUTIES.--The state treasurer  
7 shall keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant  
8 to the taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of  
9 the 2018 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and  
10 shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the  
11 principal of and interest on the bonds as they become due and  
12 any expenses relating thereto.

13 SECTION 9. IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR  
14 ISSUANCE.--An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the  
15 provisions of the 2018 Capital Projects General Obligation  
16 Bond Act may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action or  
17 mandamus, enforce and compel the performance of the duties  
18 required by that act of any officer or entity mentioned in  
19 that act. The provisions of that act constitute an  
20 irrevocable contract with the owners of any of the bonds  
21 issued pursuant to that act for the faithful performance of  
22 which the full faith and credit of the state is pledged.  
23 Without reference to any other act of the legislature, the  
24 2018 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is full  
25 authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds authorized

1 in that act, and such bonds shall have all the qualities of  
2 investment securities under the Uniform Commercial Code,  
3 shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the  
4 proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and shall  
5 be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or  
6 holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the  
7 provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt  
8 from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body  
9 thereof.

10 SECTION 10. PROJECTS.--The proceeds from the sale of  
11 bonds issued under the provisions of the 2018 Capital  
12 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as  
13 follows for the purposes and in the amounts specified:

14 A. for senior citizen facility improvement,  
15 construction and equipment acquisition projects, to the aging  
16 and long-term services department:

17 (1) seventeen thousand six hundred dollars  
18 (\$17,600) for improvements to the facility to address code  
19 compliance issues and for the purchase and installation of  
20 equipment and building systems at the Barelás senior center  
21 in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

22 (2) seventeen thousand six hundred dollars  
23 (\$17,600) for improvements to the facility to address code  
24 compliance issues and for the purchase and installation of  
25 equipment and building systems at the Bear Canyon senior

1 center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

2 (3) twenty-one thousand one hundred dollars  
3 (\$21,100) for improvements to the facility to address code  
4 compliance issues and for the purchase and installation of  
5 equipment and building systems at the Highland senior center  
6 in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

7 (4) fourteen thousand one hundred dollars  
8 (\$14,100) for improvements to the facility to address code

12 (5) fifty-four thousand two hundred dollars

16 (\$19,200) for improvements to the facility to address code  
17 compliance issues and for the purchase and installation of

20 (7) fifty-four thousand two hundred dollars  
21 (\$54,200) to purchase and equip vehicles for the North Valley

25 compliance issues and for the purchase and installation of

3 (9) twenty-eight thousand dollars (\$28,000)  
4 to purchase and equip vehicles for the Palo Duro senior

6 (10) twenty thousand one hundred dollars  
7 (\$20,100) for improvements to the facility to address code  
8 compliance issues and for the purchase and installation of  
9 equipment and building systems at the Paradise Hills

11 (11) one hundred thirty-eight thousand  
12 dollars (\$138,000) for improvements to the facility to

9 (21) fifty-five thousand six hundred fifty  
10 dollars (\$55,650) to purchase and equip vehicles for La Casa

21 equip campuswide infrastructure improvements, including code

24 (d) five million dollars (\$5,000,000)  
25 to plan, design, construct, furnish and equip the center for

1 career and technical education, including site improvements,  
2 at the Gallup branch campus of the university of New Mexico

5 dollars (\$4,300,000) to plan, design, construct, furnish and  
6 equip a new college pathways to careers center at the Klauer

15 campuses in Grant county and in Luna county.

16 SECTION 11. ELECTION.--

17 A. Bonds issued pursuant to the 2018 Capital  
18 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be submitted to  
19 the registered voters of the state at the general election to  
20 be held in November 2018, and, if they receive a majority of  
21 all the votes cast thereon at such election, shall take  
22 effect upon certification of the state canvassing board  
23 announcing the results of the election. No bonds shall be  
24 issued or sold under that act until the registered voters of  
25 this state have voted upon and approved the bonds and

1 property tax as provided in this section. Any bonds issued  
2 under that act shall be issued within thirty months from the  
3 date of such election.

4 B. The ballots used at the 2018 general election  
5 shall contain substantially the following language:

6 (1) "The 2018 Capital Projects General  
7 Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of  
8 senior citizen facility improvement, construction and  
9 equipment acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized  
10 to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed

12 (\$10,770,000) to make capital expenditures for certain senior  
13 citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment  
14 acquisition projects and provide for a general property tax

17 the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

8 C. Each question set forth in this section  
9 includes a specific work or object to be financed by the  
10 bonds. If any such question is not approved by a majority  
11 vote of the electorate at the state's 2018 general election,  
12 the issuance of bonds for the work or object specified by the  
13 question shall be excluded from and shall not be part of the  
14 2018 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act. The  
15 failure of a question to be approved by the electorate at the  
16 2018 general election shall not affect those questions that  
17 are approved at the election.

18 D. The secretary of state shall include the  
19 submission of the capital projects general obligation bonds  
20 to the people at the 2018 general election, and it shall be  
21 included in the general election proclamation of each of the  
22 county clerks. The secretary of state shall cause the 2018  
23 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act to be published  
24 in full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state  
25 if one be published therein, once each week, for four



1 successive weeks next preceding the general election as  
2 required by the constitution of New Mexico.

3 SECTION 12. ART IN PUBLIC PLACES.--Pursuant to Section  
4 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the appropriations  
5 authorized in the 2018 Capital Projects General Obligation  
6 Bond Act include money for the art in public places fund.

7 SECTION 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.--

8 A. If an appropriation for a project authorized  
9 in the 2018 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is  
10 not sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the  
11 appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes  
12 specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be  
13 made for purposes other than those specified in the  
14 appropriation.

15 B. The state agencies and state institutions to  
16 which money has been appropriated in the 2018 Capital  
17 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for  
18 monitoring the projects funded in that act to ensure  
19 compliance with the constitution and laws of New Mexico and  
20 shall cause to be reverted any unexpended or unencumbered  
21 balance remaining at the earlier of the third full fiscal  
22 year after issuance of the bonds or the termination or  
23 completion of the specific project. Reverted funds shall be  
24 deposited in the debt service fund established by the state  
25 treasurer for the purpose of paying the principal of and

1 interest on the state's general obligation bonds.

2 SECTION 14. SEVERABILITY.--If any part or application  
3 of the 2018 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is  
4 held invalid, the remainder or its application to other  
5 situations or persons shall not be affected.

6 SECTION 15. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public  
7 peace, health and safety that this act take effect
