SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing the confidentiality of personal information of certain persons. (BDR 20-620)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact. Effect on the State: Yes.

EXPLANATION - Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to confidential information; authorizing certain persons who perform tasks related to code enforcement to obtain court orders requiring a county assessor, county recorder, the Secretary of State or a county or city clerk to maintain certain personal information in a confidential manner; authorizing such persons to request the Department of Motor Vehicles to display an alternate address on the person's driver's license, commercial driver's license or identification card; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

1 Existing law authorizes certain persons to obtain a court order to require a 2345678 county assessor, county recorder, the Secretary of State or a city or county clerk to maintain the personal information of the person contained in their records in a confidential manner. The person seeking the order must submit to the court a sworn affidavit that, among other things, sets forth sufficient justification for the request for confidentiality. (NRS 247.530, 250.130, 293.906) The persons authorized to obtain such orders include justices, judges, certain court personnel, certain prosecutors and state or county public defenders. Existing law also authorizes the spouse, domestic partner or minor child of any such person and the surviving 9 10 spouse, domestic partner or minor child of any such person who was killed in the 11 performance of his or her duties to obtain such orders. (NRS 247.540, 250.140, 12 293.908) Sections 1-3 of this bill further authorize such orders to be obtained by





any inspector, officer or investigator employed by this State or a political
subdivision of this State designated by his or her employer who: (1) possesses
specialized training in code enforcement; (2) interacts with the public; and (3)
whose primary duties are the performance of tasks related to code enforcement.

Existing law authorizes certain persons to request that the Department of Motor Vehicles display an alternate address on the person's driver's license, commercial driver's license or identification card. (NRS 481.091) Section 4 of this bill further authorizes any inspector, officer or investigator employed by this State or a political subdivision of this State designated by his or her employer who: (1) possesses specialized training in code enforcement; (2) interacts with the public; and (3) whose primary duties are the performance of tasks related to code enforcement, to make such requests.
