SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing parental involvement in education. (BDR 34-859)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact.  
Effect on the State: Yes.

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EXPLANATION – Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets **fomitted-material** is material to be omitted.

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AN ACT relating to education; creating the Office of Parental Involvement and Family Engagement within the Department of Education; prescribing the duties of the Office; revising the contents of the annual reports of accountability for school districts prepared by school districts; revising the contents of the plans to improve the achievement of pupils prepared by school districts and public schools; requiring the Commission on Professional Standards in Education to prescribe course work on parental involvement and family engagement; revising the membership of the Statewide Council for the Coordination of the Regional Training Programs; requiring the Statewide Council to establish a statewide program for teachers and administrators concerning parental involvement and family engagement; requiring the regional training programs for the professional development of teachers and administrators to provide training on parental involvement and family engagement; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.



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**Legislative Counsel's Digest:**

1 Existing law establishes the Advisory Council on Parental Involvement. (NRS  
2 385.600, 385.610, 385.620) **Sections 10-12** of this bill change the name of the  
3 Council to the Advisory Council on Parental Involvement and Family Engagement  
4 and revise the duties of the Council. **Section 2** of this bill creates the Office of  
5 Parental Involvement and Family Engagement within the Department of Education  
6 and requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to appoint an employee of the  
7 Department to serve as the Director of the Office. **Section 3** of this bill prescribes  
8 the duties of the Office, which include adopting policies and developing a list of  
9 practices designed to increase the involvement of parents and the engagement of  
10 families in the support of the education of their children. **Section 4** of this bill  
11 authorizes the board of trustees of a school district to establish an advisory council  
12 on parental involvement and family engagement to work in conjunction with the  
13 Advisory Council.

14 Under existing law, the board of trustees of each school district is required to  
15 prepare an annual report of accountability information for the public schools within  
16 the school district, including information on the communication with and  
17 participation by the parents of pupils in the school district. (NRS 385.347) **Sections**  
18 **5 and 7** of this bill revises the annual reports to include information on the  
19 involvement of parents and the engagement of families in the education of their  
20 children.

21 Under existing law, the board of trustees of each school district and each public  
22 school is required to prepare a plan to improve the achievement of pupils within the  
23 district or school. (NRS 385.348, 385.357) **Sections 6 and 8** of this bill revise the  
24 provisions of the plan to include strategies and practices to improve and promote  
25 effective involvement and engagement by parents and families.

26 Existing law requires the Commission on Professional Standards in Education  
27 to adopt regulations governing the qualifications for licensing teachers and other  
28 educational personnel. (NRS 391.019) **Section 13** of this bill requires the  
29 Commission, in cooperation with the Office of Parental Involvement and Family  
30 Engagement, to adopt regulations prescribing course work on parental involvement  
31 and family engagement.

32 Existing law establishes three regional training programs for the professional  
33 development of teachers and administrators and the Statewide Council for the  
34 Coordination of the Regional Training Programs. (NRS 391.500-391.556) **Section**  
35 **14** of this bill revises the membership of the Statewide Council to include the  
36 Director of the Office of Parental Involvement and Family Engagement, who serves  
37 ex officio. **Section 15** of this bill requires the Statewide Council, in cooperation  
38 with the Office, to establish a statewide training program for teachers and  
39 administrators concerning effective parental involvement and family engagement.  
40 **Section 16** of this bill requires the regional training programs to provide training on  
41 how to involve parents and engage families and how to work with parent liaisons in  
42 public schools.

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THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN  
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

- 1 **Section 1.** Chapter 385 of NRS is hereby amended by adding  
2 thereto the provisions set forth as sections 2, 3 and 4 of this act.  
3 **Sec. 2. 1. *The Office of Parental Involvement and Family***  
4 ***Engagement is hereby created within the Department.***  
5 ***2. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall:***



1 (a) *Appoint an employee of the Department to serve as the*  
2 *Director of the Office of Parental Involvement and Family*  
3 *Engagement; and*

4 (b) *Ensure that the Office of Parental Involvement and Family*  
5 *Engagement has a sufficient number of personnel for the Office to*  
6 *carry out the duties prescribed in section 3 of this act.*

7 **Sec. 3. 1. The Office of Parental Involvement and Family**  
8 **Engagement created by section 2 of this act shall:**

9 (a) *Review and evaluate the programs implemented by the*  
10 *school districts and public schools, including, without limitation,*  
11 *programs which are supported in part with money received from*  
12 *the Federal Government, for carrying out and increasing parental*  
13 *involvement and family engagement in the public schools. The*  
14 *review and evaluation must include an identification of current*  
15 *strategies and practices for effective parental involvement and*  
16 *family engagement.*

17 (b) *Develop a list of practices which have been proven effective*  
18 *in increasing the involvement of parents and the engagement of*  
19 *families in the education of their children, including, without*  
20 *limitation, practices that increase the ability of school districts and*  
21 *public schools to effectively reengage parents and families and*  
22 *provide those parents and families with the skills and resources*  
23 *necessary to support the academic achievement of their children.*

24 (c) *Work in cooperation with the Statewide Council for the*  
25 *Coordination of the Regional Training Programs to establish a*  
26 *statewide training program concerning parental involvement and*  
27 *family engagement required pursuant to NRS 391.520.*

28 (d) *Provide information to the school districts and public*  
29 *schools on the availability of competitive grants for programs*  
30 *which offer:*

31 (1) *Professional development for educational personnel on*  
32 *practices to reengage disengaged parents and families in the*  
33 *education of their children;*

34 (2) *Training for parents and families in skills of leadership*  
35 *and volunteerism;*

36 (3) *Family literacy training;*

37 (4) *Home visitation programs to encourage the involvement*  
38 *of parents and the engagement of families in the education of*  
39 *their children; and*

40 (5) *Other innovative programs that are designed to increase*  
41 *the involvement of parents and the engagement of families in the*  
42 *academic achievement of their children.*

43 (e) *Provide support to those school districts which have*  
44 *established an advisory council on parental involvement and*  
45 *family engagement pursuant to section 4 of this act and encourage*



1 *those school districts which have not established such an advisory*  
2 *council to consider creating an advisory council for the school*  
3 *district.*

4 *(f) Build the capacity of public schools to work in*  
5 *collaboration with parents to establish policies for the involvement*  
6 *of parents and the engagement of families, including, without*  
7 *limitation, policies that focus on partnerships between public*  
8 *schools and the parents and families of children enrolled in public*  
9 *schools and the empowerment of parents and families in support*  
10 *of the education of their children.*

11 *(g) Work in cooperation with the Commission on Professional*  
12 *Standards in Education in developing the regulations required by*  
13 *subparagraph (11) of paragraph (a) of subsection 1 of NRS*  
14 *391.019 and monitoring the implementation of those regulations.*

15 *(h) Establish, in collaboration with the State Board, guidelines*  
16 *to assist parents and families in helping their children achieve the*  
17 *standards of content and performance adopted by the State Board*  
18 *pursuant to NRS 389.520.*

19 *(i) Collaborate with the Nevada State Parent Information and*  
20 *Resource Center, the Parent Training and Information Centers,*  
21 *the Nevada Parent Teacher Association, the Advisory Council and*  
22 *the teachers who are trained to serve as liaisons to parents*  
23 *and legal guardians of pupils enrolled in public schools to plan*  
24 *and implement a statewide summit on parental involvement and*  
25 *family engagement, which must be held at least biennially. After*  
26 *each summit, the Office of Parental Involvement and Family*  
27 *Engagement shall evaluate the success of the summit in*  
28 *consultation with the entities identified in this paragraph.*

29 *(j) Assist each school district and the public schools within the*  
30 *school district with incorporating strategies and practices for*  
31 *effective parental involvement and family engagement into the*  
32 *plans to improve the achievement of pupils prepared by the school*  
33 *districts pursuant to NRS 385.348 and the public schools pursuant*  
34 *to NRS 385.357.*

35 *(k) Work in partnership with the Advisory Council to:*

36 *(1) Review and evaluate the annual reports of*  
37 *accountability prepared by the board of trustees of each school*  
38 *district pursuant to NRS 385.347 relating to parental involvement*  
39 *and family engagement in the school districts and public schools;*

40 *(2) Review and evaluate the plans to improve the*  
41 *achievement of pupils prepared by each school district pursuant to*  
42 *NRS 385.348 and each public school pursuant to NRS 385.357*  
43 *relating to the strategies and practices for effective parental*  
44 *involvement and family engagement incorporated into the plans;*  
45 *and*



1           (3) *Review the status of the implementation of the*  
2 *provisions of this section and the effectiveness of the Office in*  
3 *carrying out the duties prescribed in this section.*

4           2. *On or before August 1 of each year, the Office of Parental*  
5 *Involvement and Family Engagement shall prepare a report which*  
6 *includes a summary of the:*

7           (a) *Status of the progress made by the school districts and*  
8 *public schools in effectively involving parents and engaging*  
9 *families in the education of their children and an identification of*  
10 *any areas where further improvement is needed; and*

11           (b) *Activities of the Office during the immediately preceding*  
12 *school year, including the progress made by the Office, in*  
13 *consultation with the Advisory Council, in assisting the school*  
14 *districts and public schools with increasing the effectiveness of*  
15 *involving parents and engaging families in the education of their*  
16 *children.*

17           3. *The Department shall post on its Internet website:*

18           (a) *The list of practices developed by the Office of Parental*  
19 *Involvement and Family Engagement pursuant to paragraph (b)*  
20 *of subsection 1;*

21           (b) *The report prepared by the Office pursuant to subsection 2;*  
22 *and*

23           (c) *Any other information that the Office finds useful for the*  
24 *school districts, public schools, parents, families and general*  
25 *public relating to effective parental involvement and family*  
26 *engagement.*

27           **Sec. 4.** *The board of trustees of a school district may*  
28 *establish an advisory council on parental involvement and family*  
29 *engagement to work in conjunction with the Advisory Council.*

30           **Sec. 5.** NRS 385.347 is hereby amended to read as follows:

31           385.347 1. The board of trustees of each school district in  
32 this State, in cooperation with associations recognized by the State  
33 Board as representing licensed educational personnel in the district,  
34 shall adopt a program providing for the accountability of the school  
35 district to the residents of the district and to the State Board for the  
36 quality of the schools and the educational achievement of the pupils  
37 in the district, including, without limitation, pupils enrolled in  
38 charter schools in the school district. The board of trustees of each  
39 school district shall report the information required by subsection 2  
40 for each charter school that is located within the school district,  
41 regardless of the sponsor of the charter school. The information for  
42 charter schools must be reported separately and must denote the  
43 charter schools sponsored by the school district, the charter schools  
44 sponsored by the State Board and the charter schools sponsored by a



1 college or university within the Nevada System of Higher  
2 Education.

3 2. The board of trustees of each school district shall, on or  
4 before August 15 of each year, prepare an annual report of  
5 accountability concerning:

6 (a) The educational goals and objectives of the school district.

7 (b) Pupil achievement for each school in the district and the  
8 district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school  
9 in the district. The board of trustees of the district shall base its  
10 report on the results of the examinations administered pursuant to  
11 NRS 389.015 and 389.550 and shall compare the results of those  
12 examinations for the current school year with those of previous  
13 school years. The report must include, for each school in the district,  
14 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and  
15 each grade in which the examinations were administered:

16 (1) The number of pupils who took the examinations.

17 (2) A record of attendance for the period in which the  
18 examinations were administered, including an explanation of any  
19 difference in the number of pupils who took the examinations and  
20 the number of pupils who are enrolled in the school.

21 (3) Except as otherwise provided in this paragraph, pupil  
22 achievement, reported separately by gender and reported separately  
23 for the following groups of pupils:

24 (I) Pupils who are economically disadvantaged, as  
25 defined by the State Board;

26 (II) Pupils from major racial and ethnic groups, as defined  
27 by the State Board;

28 (III) Pupils with disabilities;

29 (IV) Pupils who are limited English proficient; and

30 (V) Pupils who are migratory children, as defined by the  
31 State Board.

32 (4) A comparison of the achievement of pupils in each group  
33 identified in paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 385.361 with the  
34 annual measurable objectives of the State Board.

35 (5) The percentage of pupils who were not tested.

36 (6) Except as otherwise provided in this paragraph, the  
37 percentage of pupils who were not tested, reported separately by  
38 gender and reported separately for the groups identified in  
39 subparagraph (3).

40 (7) The most recent 3-year trend in pupil achievement in  
41 each subject area tested and each grade level tested pursuant to NRS  
42 389.015 and 389.550, which may include information regarding the  
43 trend in the achievement of pupils for more than 3 years, if such  
44 information is available.



1 (8) Information that compares the results of pupils in the  
2 school district, including, without limitation, pupils enrolled in  
3 charter schools in the district, with the results of pupils throughout  
4 this State. The information required by this subparagraph must be  
5 provided in consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy  
6 of the comparison.

7 (9) For each school in the district, including, without  
8 limitation, each charter school in the district, information that  
9 compares the results of pupils in the school with the results of pupils  
10 throughout the school district and throughout this State. The  
11 information required by this subparagraph must be provided in  
12 consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the  
13 comparison.

14 (10) Information on whether each school in the district,  
15 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, has  
16 made progress based upon the model adopted by the Department  
17 pursuant to NRS 385.3595.

18 ↪ A separate reporting for a group of pupils must not be made  
19 pursuant to this paragraph if the number of pupils in that group is  
20 insufficient to yield statistically reliable information or the results  
21 would reveal personally identifiable information about an individual  
22 pupil. The State Board shall prescribe the mechanism for  
23 determining the minimum number of pupils that must be in a group  
24 for that group to yield statistically reliable information.

25 (c) The ratio of pupils to teachers in kindergarten and at each  
26 grade level for each elementary school in the district and the district  
27 as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the  
28 district, and the average class size for each core academic subject, as  
29 set forth in NRS 389.018, for each secondary school in the district  
30 and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each  
31 charter school in the district.

32 (d) Information on the professional qualifications of teachers  
33 employed by each school in the district and the district as a whole,  
34 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. The  
35 information must include, without limitation:

36 (1) The percentage of teachers who are:

37 (I) Providing instruction pursuant to NRS 391.125;

38 (II) Providing instruction pursuant to a waiver of the  
39 requirements for licensure for the grade level or subject area in  
40 which the teachers are employed; or

41 (III) Otherwise providing instruction without an  
42 endorsement for the subject area in which the teachers are  
43 employed;



1 (2) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects,  
2 as set forth in NRS 389.018, that are not taught by highly qualified  
3 teachers;

4 (3) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects,  
5 as set forth in NRS 389.018, that are not taught by highly qualified  
6 teachers, in the aggregate and disaggregated by high-poverty  
7 compared to low-poverty schools, which for the purposes of this  
8 subparagraph means schools in the top quartile of poverty and the  
9 bottom quartile of poverty in this State;

10 (4) For each middle school, junior high school and high  
11 school:

12 (I) On and after July 1, 2005, the number of persons  
13 employed as substitute teachers for 20 consecutive days or more in  
14 the same classroom or assignment, designated as long-term  
15 substitute teachers, including the total number of days long-term  
16 substitute teachers were employed at each school, identified by  
17 grade level and subject area; and

18 (II) On and after July 1, 2006, the number of persons  
19 employed as substitute teachers for less than 20 consecutive days,  
20 designated as short-term substitute teachers, including the total  
21 number of days short-term substitute teachers were employed at  
22 each school, identified by grade level and subject area; and

23 (5) For each elementary school:

24 (I) On and after July 1, 2005, the number of persons  
25 employed as substitute teachers for 20 consecutive days or more in  
26 the same classroom or assignment, designated as long-term  
27 substitute teachers, including the total number of days long-term  
28 substitute teachers were employed at each school, identified by  
29 grade level; and

30 (II) On and after July 1, 2006, the number of persons  
31 employed as substitute teachers for less than 20 consecutive days,  
32 designated as short-term substitute teachers, including the total  
33 number of days short-term substitute teachers were employed at  
34 each school, identified by grade level.

35 (e) The total expenditure per pupil for each school in the district  
36 and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each  
37 charter school in the district. If this State has a financial analysis  
38 program that is designed to track educational expenditures and  
39 revenues to individual schools, each school district shall use that  
40 statewide program in complying with this paragraph. If a statewide  
41 program is not available, each school district shall use its own  
42 financial analysis program in complying with this paragraph.

43 (f) The curriculum used by the school district, including:

44 (1) Any special programs for pupils at an individual school;  
45 and





1 (2) The curriculum used by each charter school in the  
2 district.

3 (g) Records of the attendance and truancy of pupils in all grades,  
4 including, without limitation:

5 (1) The average daily attendance of pupils, for each school in  
6 the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation,  
7 each charter school in the district.

8 (2) For each elementary school, middle school and junior  
9 high school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter  
10 school in the district that provides instruction to pupils enrolled in a  
11 grade level other than high school, information that compares the  
12 attendance of the pupils enrolled in the school with the attendance of  
13 pupils throughout the district and throughout this State. The  
14 information required by this subparagraph must be provided in  
15 consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the  
16 comparison.

17 (h) The annual rate of pupils who drop out of school in grade 8  
18 and a separate reporting of the annual rate of pupils who drop out of  
19 school in grades 9 to 12, inclusive, for each such grade, for each  
20 school in the district and for the district as a whole. The reporting  
21 for pupils in grades 9 to 12, inclusive, excludes pupils who:

22 (1) Provide proof to the school district of successful  
23 completion of the examinations of general educational development.

24 (2) Are enrolled in courses that are approved by the  
25 Department as meeting the requirements for an adult standard  
26 diploma.

27 (3) Withdraw from school to attend another school.

28 (i) Records of attendance of teachers who provide instruction,  
29 for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including,  
30 without limitation, each charter school in the district.

31 (j) Efforts made by the school district and by each school in the  
32 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the  
33 district, to increase:

34 (1) Communication with the parents of pupils *enrolled* in the  
35 district; ~~and~~

36 (2) The participation of parents in the educational process  
37 and activities relating to the school district and each school,  
38 including, without limitation, the existence of parent organizations  
39 and school advisory committees ~~and~~; *and*

40 (3) *The involvement of parents and the engagement of*  
41 *families of pupils enrolled in the district in the education of their*  
42 *children.*

43 (k) Records of incidents involving weapons or violence for each  
44 school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter  
45 school in the district.



1 (l) Records of incidents involving the use or possession of  
2 alcoholic beverages or controlled substances for each school in the  
3 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the  
4 district.

5 (m) Records of the suspension and expulsion of pupils required  
6 or authorized pursuant to NRS 392.466 and 392.467.

7 (n) The number of pupils who are deemed habitual disciplinary  
8 problems pursuant to NRS 392.4655, for each school in the district  
9 and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each  
10 charter school in the district.

11 (o) The number of pupils in each grade who are retained in the  
12 same grade pursuant to NRS 392.033 or 392.125, for each school in  
13 the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation,  
14 each charter school in the district.

15 (p) The transiency rate of pupils for each school in the district  
16 and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each  
17 charter school in the district. For the purposes of this paragraph, a  
18 pupil is not transient if the pupil is transferred to a different school  
19 within the school district as a result of a change in the zone of  
20 attendance by the board of trustees of the school district pursuant to  
21 NRS 388.040.

22 (q) Each source of funding for the school district.

23 (r) A compilation of the programs of remedial study that are  
24 purchased in whole or in part with money received from this State,  
25 for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including,  
26 without limitation, each charter school sponsored by the district. The  
27 compilation must include:

28 (1) The amount and sources of money received for programs  
29 of remedial study for each school in the district and the district as a  
30 whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the  
31 district.

32 (2) An identification of each program of remedial study,  
33 listed by subject area.

34 (s) For each high school in the district, including, without  
35 limitation, each charter school in the district, the percentage of  
36 pupils who graduated from that high school or charter school in the  
37 immediately preceding year and enrolled in remedial courses in  
38 reading, writing or mathematics at a university, state college or  
39 community college within the Nevada System of Higher Education.

40 (t) The technological facilities and equipment available at each  
41 school, including, without limitation, each charter school, and the  
42 district's plan to incorporate educational technology at each school.

43 (u) For each school in the district and the district as a whole,  
44 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, the  
45 number and percentage of pupils who received:



1 (1) A standard high school diploma, reported separately for  
2 pupils who received the diploma pursuant to:

3 (I) Paragraph (a) of subsection 1 of NRS 389.805; and

4 (II) Paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 389.805.

5 (2) An adjusted diploma.

6 (3) A certificate of attendance.

7 (v) For each school in the district and the district as a whole,  
8 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, the  
9 number and percentage of pupils who failed to pass the high school  
10 proficiency examination.

11 (w) The number of habitual truants who are reported to a school  
12 police officer or law enforcement agency pursuant to paragraph (a)  
13 of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144 and the number of habitual truants  
14 who are referred to an advisory board to review school attendance  
15 pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144, for each  
16 school in the district and for the district as a whole.

17 (x) The amount and sources of money received for the training  
18 and professional development of teachers and other educational  
19 personnel for each school in the district and for the district as a  
20 whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the  
21 district.

22 (y) Whether the school district has made adequate yearly  
23 progress. If the school district has been designated as demonstrating  
24 need for improvement pursuant to NRS 385.377, the report must  
25 include a statement indicating the number of consecutive years the  
26 school district has carried that designation.

27 (z) Information on whether each public school in the district,  
28 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, has  
29 made adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation:

30 (1) The number and percentage of schools in the district, if  
31 any, that have been designated as needing improvement pursuant to  
32 NRS 385.3623; and

33 (2) The name of each school, if any, in the district that has  
34 been designated as needing improvement pursuant to NRS 385.3623  
35 and the number of consecutive years that the school has carried that  
36 designation.

37 (aa) Information on the paraprofessionals employed by each  
38 public school in the district, including, without limitation, each  
39 charter school in the district. The information must include:

40 (1) The number of paraprofessionals employed at the school;  
41 and

42 (2) The number and percentage of all paraprofessionals who  
43 do not satisfy the qualifications set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 6319(c). The  
44 reporting requirements of this subparagraph apply to  
45 paraprofessionals who are employed in positions supported with



1 Title I money and to paraprofessionals who are not employed in  
2 positions supported with Title I money.

3 (bb) For each high school in the district, including, without  
4 limitation, each charter school that operates as a high school,  
5 information that provides a comparison of the rate of graduation of  
6 pupils enrolled in the high school with the rate of graduation of  
7 pupils throughout the district and throughout this State. The  
8 information required by this paragraph must be provided in  
9 consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the  
10 comparison.

11 (cc) An identification of the appropriations made by the  
12 Legislature that are available to the school district or the schools  
13 within the district and programs approved by the Legislature to  
14 improve the academic achievement of pupils.

15 (dd) For each school in the district and the district as a whole,  
16 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district,  
17 information on pupils enrolled in career and technical education,  
18 including, without limitation:

19 (1) The number of pupils enrolled in a course of career and  
20 technical education;

21 (2) The number of pupils who completed a course of career  
22 and technical education;

11 (b) Provide the parent or legal guardian with a reasonable  
12 opportunity to sign the educational involvement accord.

13 5. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, the board of  
14 trustees of each school district shall ensure that the form prescribed  
15 by the Department is used for the educational involvement accord of  
16 each public school in the school district. The board of trustees of a  
17 school district may authorize the use of an expanded form that  
18 contains additions to the form prescribed by the Department if the  
19 basic information contained in the expanded form complies with the  
20 form prescribed by the Department.

21 6. The Department and the board of trustees of each school  
22 district shall, at least once each year, review and amend their  
23 respective educational involvement accords.

24 7. If a school support team is established in accordance with  
25 the regulations of the State Board adopted pursuant to NRS 385.361  
26 for an elementary school, the principal of the school shall provide to  
27 the support team information concerning the distribution of the  
28 educational involvement accord and the number of accords which  
29 were signed and returned by parents and legal guardians. The  
30 information must be provided in an aggregated format and must not  
31 disclose the identity of an individual parent, legal guardian or pupil.

32 **Sec. 19.** On or before December 31, 2011, the Commission on  
33 Professional Standards in Education shall adopt the regulations  
34 required pursuant to NRS 391.019, as amended by section 13 of this  
35 act.

36 **Sec. 20.** This act becomes effective on July 1, 2011.
