## ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 268–ASSEMBLYMAN CARRILLO

SUMMARY—Revises provisions related to vital statistics. (BDR 40-1036)

AN ACT relating to vital statistics; revising provisions related to certificates of death; revising the fines assessed against certain medical professionals for failing to complete a medical certificate of death; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

## Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Under existing law a physician or advanced practice registered nurse who was in medical attendance upon any deceased person at the time of death and neglects or refuses to execute the medical certificate of death upon the request of certain parties shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$250. (NRS 440.720) This bill provides that if a physician or advanced practice registered nurse neglects or refuses to make out and deliver a certificate of death upon request, he or she shall be punished by a fine of \$250 for the first offense, \$500 for the second offense and \$1,000 for the third and subsequent offenses.

# THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** NRS 440.720 is hereby amended to read as follows: 440.720 Any physician or advanced practice registered nurse who was in medical attendance upon any deceased person at the time of death who neglects or refuses to make out and deliver to the funeral director, sexton or other person in charge of the interment, removal or other disposition of the body, upon *a* request [,] *made pursuant to NRS 440.470*, the medical certificate of the cause of death shall be punished by a fine of [not more than:]:





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- For a first offense, \$250 [.];
  For a second offense, \$500; and
  For a third or subsequent offense, \$1,000.
  Sec. 2. This act becomes effective on July 1, 2019.
