

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 4—ASSEMBLYMAN HAMBRICK

PREFILED DECEMBER 13, 2010

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Referred to Committee on Judiciary

**SUMMARY**—Revises provisions relating to the crime of holding another person in involuntary servitude. (BDR 15-361)

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AN ACT relating to crimes; revising the provisions relating to the crime of holding another person in involuntary servitude; providing a penalty; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

**Legislative Counsel's Digest:**

1 Existing law provides that a person who, by certain actions, knowingly  
2 subjects, or attempts to subject, another person to forced labor or services is guilty  
3 of holding that person in involuntary servitude. (NRS 200.463) This bill provides  
4 that in addition to knowingly subjecting, or attempting to subject, another person to  
5 forced labor or services, the crime of holding a person in involuntary servitude also  
6 includes knowingly subjecting, or attempting to subject, another person to forced  
7 “commercial sex acts.” The definition of “commercial sex act” in the bill is  
8 patterned after the definition of the term contained in federal law, 18 U.S.C. §  
9 1591(e)(3). This bill also adds fraud and artifice as actions by which a person may  
10 subject another person to forced labor, services or commercial sex acts.

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THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN  
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1       **Section 1.** NRS 200.463 is hereby amended to read as follows:  
2       200.463   1. A person who knowingly subjects, or attempts to  
3       subject, another person to forced labor, **[or]** services **or commercial**  
4       **sex acts, including, without limitation, prostitution as defined in**  
5       **NRS 201.295**, by:  
6       (a) Causing or threatening to cause physical harm to any person;



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- 1       (b) Physically restraining or threatening to physically restrain  
2 any person;  
3       (c) Abusing or threatening to abuse the law or legal process;  
4       (d) Knowingly destroying, concealing, removing, confiscating  
5 or possessing any actual or purported passport or other immigration  
6 document, or any other actual or purported government  
7 identification document, of the person;  
8       (e) Extortion; ~~for~~  
9       (f) Causing or threatening to cause financial harm to any person  
10 ~~for~~; or  
11      (g) *Fraud or artifice*,  
12      → is guilty of holding a person in involuntary servitude.  
13      2. A person who is found guilty of holding a person in  
14 involuntary servitude is guilty of a category B felony and shall be  
15 punished:  
16       (a) Where the victim suffers substantial bodily harm while held  
17 in involuntary servitude or in attempted escape or escape therefrom,  
18 by imprisonment in the state prison for a minimum term of not less  
19 than 7 years and a maximum term of not more than 20 years, and  
20 may be further punished by a fine of not more than \$50,000.  
21       (b) Where the victim suffers no substantial bodily harm as a  
22 result of being held in involuntary servitude, by imprisonment in the  
23 state prison for a minimum term of not less than 5 years and a  
24 maximum term of not more than 20 years, and may be further  
25 punished by a fine of not more than \$50,000.  
26      3. *As used in this section, “commercial sex act” means any  
27 sex act, on account of which anything of value is given to or  
28 received by any person.*

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
