ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 554-COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

(ON BEHALF OF THE GOVERNOR)

MARCH 28, 2011

Referred to Committee on Education

SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing education. (BDR 34-953)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact. Effect on the State: Yes.

EXPLANATION - Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to education; requiring the Department of Education to assign a letter grade to each school district and public school; requiring that a report card be prepared for each school district with information pertaining to the letter grades received by the school district and certain other information pertaining to the progress made in pupil achievement; requiring the Department to prepare a separate report card for charter schools sponsored by the State Board of Education; requiring the board of trustees of each school district to adopt a policy authorizing the parent or legal guardian of pupil to enroll his or her child in a public school other than the public school the child is otherwise zoned to attend; prohibiting the promotion of a pupil to grade 4 if the pupil does not obtain a certain score on the criterion-referenced examination in reading; providing certain good-cause exemptions for certain pupils; requiring school districts to offer intensive instructional services in reading for certain pupils; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Section 2 of this bill requires the Department of Education to assign a letter grade to each school district and each public school, including, without limitation, each charter school, in this State. **Section 2** also requires that a report card be prepared for each school district indicating the letter grades received by the public schools within the school district and the district as a whole. **Section 2** further





requires the Department to prepare a separate report card for those charter schools
sponsored by the State Board of Education. The report cards for each school district
must be posted on the Internet website maintained by the school district, and the
Department is required to post all report cards on its Internet website.

Section 3 of this bill requires the State Board of Education to prescribe an indexed point system for assigning letter grades to each school district and public school in this State and provides the criteria on which that system must be based.

Existing law authorizes school districts to establish zones of attendance that prescribe which pupils attend each school within the district. (NRS 388.040) Section 9 of this bill requires the board of trustees of each school district to adopt a policy authorizing the parent or legal guardian of a pupil to request that his or her child attend a public school within the school district but outside the zone of attendance the pupil is otherwise required to attend.

19 Under existing law, a pupil may be retained in the same grade rather than 20 21 22 23 24 25 26 27 28 29 30 promoted to the next higher grade for the succeeding school year upon joint agreement by the teacher and the principal. (NRS 392.125) Also under existing law, the governing body of a charter school is exempt from these requirements governing promotion to the next higher grade and instead is required to adopt its own rules for the academic retention of the pupils enrolled in the charter school. (NRS 386.583) Section 11 of this bill prohibits certain pupils enrolled in grade 3 from being promoted to grade 4 unless the pupil obtains a score prescribed by the State Board in the subject area of reading on the criterion-referenced examination. Section 11 also provides certain good-cause exemptions for certain pupils. Section 11 also requires the State Board to prescribe an alternate examination in reading for those pupils who do not obtain the requisite score on the criterion-referenced 31 32 33 34 examination in reading for promotion to grade 4. Section 6 of this bill imposes the same prohibition on the promotion of pupils enrolled in grade 3 for those pupils enrolled in charter schools. Section 12 of this bill requires the principal of a school to provide notice to the parent or legal guardian of a pupil who is retained in grade 35 3 and requires the principal to provide intensive instructional services in reading for 36 certain pupils. Section 12 also requires the board of trustees of each district to 37 prescribe the intensive instructional services in reading which must be 38 implemented.

Section 10 of this bill requires the principal of a public school to provide notice
to the parent or legal guardian of a pupil enrolled in kindergarten or grade 1, 2 or 3
who exhibits a substantial deficiency in reading for the pupil's grade level. Section
also requires the principal to provide certain intensive instructional services in
reading for such pupils.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** Chapter 385 of NRS is hereby amended by adding 2 thereto the provisions set forth as sections 2 and 3 of this act.

3 Sec. 2. 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, the 4 Department shall assign a letter grade to each school district and 5 each public school, including, without limitation, each charter 6 school, in accordance with the indexed point system prescribed by 7 the State Board pursuant to section 3 of this act. A school district

8 or public school, as applicable, must receive:





(a) A grade of "A" if the school district or public school is 1 2 making excellent progress;

(b) A grade of "B" if the school district or public school is 3 making above average progress; 4

(c) A grade of "C" if the school district or public school is 5 making satisfactory progress; 6

(d) A grade of "D" if the school district or public school is 7 making less than satisfactory progress; and 8

(e) A grade of "F" if the school district or public school fails to 9 10 make adequate progress.

2. The Department shall not assign a letter grade to a public 11 12 school if the number of pupils enrolled in the school is insufficient 13 to yield statistically reliable information or the results would 14 reveal personally identifiable information about an individual 15 pupil.

16 3. A report card must be prepared for each school district on the form prescribed by the Department. In a county whose 17 population is 400,000 or more, the board of trustees of the school 18 district shall prepare the report card for the school district. In a 19 county whose population is less than 400,000, the Department 20 shall prepare the report card for the school district. Each report 21 22 card must include, without limitation:

23 (a) The letter grade assigned to the school district pursuant to 24 subsection 1:

25 (b) The letter grade assigned to each public school located in the school district pursuant to subsection 1, including, without 26 27 limitation, each charter school that is sponsored by the board of 28 trustees of the school district;

29 (c) A description of the performance of pupils enrolled in the 30 school district on the examinations administered pursuant to NRS 389.015 and 389.550, including, 31 without limitation, the 32 performance of pupils disaggregated by the following groups:

(1) Pupils who are economically disadvantaged, as defined 33 by the State Board; 34

35 (2) Pupils from major racial and ethnic groups, as defined by the State Board: 36 37

(3) Pupils with disabilities;

(4) Pupils who are limited English proficient; and

(5) Pupils who are migratory children, as defined by the 39 State Board: 40

(d) The mean score of pupils on the examinations 41 42 administered pursuant to NRS 389.015 and 389.550 for those pupils who scored at or in the lowest 25th percentile on those 43 44 examinations in the preceding school year; and



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1 (e) Information on the status of the progress made by the 2 public schools and the school district on improving the 3 achievement of pupils enrolled in the school district.

4 4. The Department shall:

5 (a) Prepare a single report card for those charter schools 6 sponsored by the State Board with the information prescribed by 7 subsection 3; and

8 (b) Post the report card for those charter schools sponsored by 9 the State Board on the Internet website maintained by the 10 Department and otherwise make the report card available to the 11 parents and legal guardians of pupils enrolled in charter schools 12 and the general public.

13 5. The board of trustees of each school district shall post the 14 report card prepared pursuant to subsection 3 on the Internet 15 website maintained by the school district and otherwise make the 16 report card available to the parents and legal guardians of pupils 17 enrolled in the school district and the general public. The 18 Department shall post the report card of each school district on 19 the Internet website maintained by the Department.

20 6. The State Board shall prescribe regulations to provide for 21 the recognition of:

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(a) Schools that consistently receive a letter grade of "A"; and

23 (b) Schools that improve at least one letter grade when 24 compared to the letter grade received by the school in the 25 immediately preceding year.

26 7. Except for the money appropriated for the basic support 27 guarantee for school districts, in determining the apportionment 28 of any money that may be available for school districts and public 29 schools pursuant to legislative appropriation or otherwise, the 30 Legislature may consider the letter grade assigned to each school 31 district and public school pursuant to subsection 1.

32 8. The Department shall design the form and content for the 33 report cards.

34 **Sec. 3.** 1. The State Board shall prescribe an indexed point 35 system for assigning letter grades to each public elementary and 36 middle school and junior high school in this State. The indexed 37 point system must assign a value to each of the following:

(a) The results of pupils on the examinations administered
pursuant to NRS 389.015 and 389.550, which must account for 50
percent of the letter grade assigned;

41 (b) The learning gains of all pupils, based upon pupil progress 42 measured from year to year, which must account for 25 percent of 43 the letter grade assigned; and





1	(c) The learning gains of those pupils who scored at or in the
2	lowest 25th percentile in the preceding school year, which must

4	2. The State Board shall prescribe an indexed point system

23	(5) Any other factors determined by the State Board, such
24	as individual pupil growth from year to year in each of the
25	categories set forth in subparagraphs (1) to (4), inclusive.
26	→ The indexed point system for high schools must provide that the
27	data set forth in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) account for 50 percent
28	of the letter grade and the other grading components set forth in
29	paragraph (d) account for 50 percent of the letter grade.
30	3. Each school district must be assigned a letter grade based
31	upon the indexed point system prescribed pursuant to subsections
32	<i>1 and 2 for the public schools within the school district.</i>
33	4. The regulations must provide that in any year in which not
34	less than 80 percent of all the public schools in this State earn a
35	letter grade of "A" or "B," the number of points that are required
36	to earn such a grade level pursuant to the indexed point system
37	must be increased by 5 percent statewide.
38	5. In determining the letter grades, information relating to
39	those pupils who are permanently expelled from public school
40	must not be included.

(f) The most recent 3-year trend in the achievement of pupils in each subject area tested and each grade level tested pursuant to NRS 389.015 and 389.550, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, which may include information regarding the trend in the achievement of pupils for more than 3 years, if such information is available.

(g) Information on whether each school district has made adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation, the name of each school district, if any, designated as demonstrating need for improvement pursuant to NRS 385.377 and the number of consecutive years that the school district has carried that designation.

(h) Information on whether each public school, including,
without limitation, each charter school, has made:

(1) Adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation,
the name of each public school, if any, designated as demonstrating
need for improvement pursuant to NRS 385.3623 and the number of
consecutive years that the school has carried that designation.

43 (2) Progress based upon the model adopted by the 44 Department pursuant to NRS 385.3595, if applicable for the grade 45 level of pupils enrolled at the school.





1 (i) Information on the results of pupils who participated in the 2 examinations of the National Assessment of Educational Progress 3 required pursuant to NRS 389.012.

4 (j) The ratio of pupils to teachers in kindergarten and at each 5 grade level for all elementary schools, reported for each school 6 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the 7 district, and for this State as a whole, and the average class size for 8 each core academic subject, as set forth in NRS 389.018, for each 9 secondary school, reported for each school district and for this State 10 as a whole.

(k) For each school district, including, without limitation, each
charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole,
information on the professional qualifications of teachers employed
by the school districts and charter schools, including, without
limitation:

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(1) The percentage of teachers who are:

(I) Providing instruction pursuant to NRS 391.125;

18 (II) Providing instruction pursuant to a waiver of the 19 requirements for licensure for the grade level or subject area in 20 which the teachers are employed; or

21 (III) Otherwise providing instruction without an 22 endorsement for the subject area in which the teachers are 23 employed;

24 (2) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects, 25 as set forth in NRS 389.018, in this State that are not taught by 26 highly qualified teachers;

27 (3) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects, 28 as set forth in NRS 389.018, in this State that are not taught by 29 highly qualified teachers, in the aggregate and disaggregated by 30 high-poverty compared to low-poverty schools, which for the 31 purposes of this subparagraph means schools in the top quartile of 32 poverty and the bottom quartile of poverty in this State;

13 (1) The total expenditure per pupil for each school district in this 14 State, including, without limitation, each charter school in the 15 district. If this State has a financial analysis program that is designed 16 to track educational expenditures and revenues to individual 17 schools, the State Board shall use that statewide program in 18 complying with this paragraph. If a statewide program is not 19 available, the State Board shall use the Department's own financial 20 analysis program in complying with this paragraph.

(m) The total statewide expenditure per pupil. If this State has a
financial analysis program that is designed to track educational
expenditures and revenues to individual schools, the State Board
shall use that statewide program in complying with this paragraph.
If a statewide program is not available, the State Board shall use the
Department's own financial analysis program in complying with
this paragraph.

(n) For all elementary schools, junior high schools and middle
schools, the rate of attendance, reported for each school district,
including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and
for this State as a whole.

(o) The annual rate of pupils who drop out of school in grade 8
and a separate reporting of the annual rate of pupils who drop out of
school in grades 9 to 12, inclusive, reported for each school district,
including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and
for this State as a whole. The reporting for pupils in grades 9 to 12,
inclusive, excludes pupils who:

(1) Provide proof to the school district of successfulcompletion of the examinations of general educational development.

40 (2) Are enrolled in courses that are approved by the 41 Department as meeting the requirements for an adult standard 42 diploma.

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(3) Withdraw from school to attend another school.





1 (p) The attendance of teachers who provide instruction, reported 2 for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter 3 school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

4 (q) Incidents involving weapons or violence, reported for each 5 school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in 6 the district, and for this State as a whole.

7 (r) Incidents involving the use or possession of alcoholic 8 beverages or controlled substances, reported for each school district, 9 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and 10 for this State as a whole.

(s) The suspension and expulsion of pupils required or
authorized pursuant to NRS 392.466 and 392.467, reported for each
school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in
the district, and for this State as a whole.

15 (t) The number of pupils who are deemed habitual disciplinary 16 problems pursuant to NRS 392.4655, reported for each school 17 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the 18 district, and for this State as a whole.

(u) The number of pupils in each grade who are retained in the
same grade pursuant to NRS 386.583, 392.033 or 392.125, or
section 11 of this act, reported for each school district, including,
without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this
State as a whole.

(v) The transiency rate of pupils, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole. For the purposes of this paragraph, a pupil is not a transient if the pupil is transferred to a different school within the school district as a result of a change in the zone of attendance by the board of trustees of the school district pursuant to NRS 388.040.

31 (w) Each source of funding for this State to be used for the 32 system of public education.

(x) A compilation of the programs of remedial study purchased
in whole or in part with money received from this State that are used
in each school district, including, without limitation, each charter
school in the district. The compilation must include:

(y) The percentage of pupils who graduated from a high school

7 (aa) For each school district, including, without limitation, each 8 charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, the 9 number and percentage of pupils who received:

10 (1) A standard high school diploma, reported separately for 11 pupils who received the diploma pursuant to:

12 13 (I) Paragraph (a) of subsection 1 of NRS 389.805; and

(II) Paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 389.805.

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(2) An adjusted diploma.

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(3) A certificate of attendance.

16 (bb) For each school district, including, without limitation, each 17 charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, the 18 number and percentage of pupils who failed to pass the high school 19 proficiency examination.

20 (cc) The number of habitual truants who are reported to a school police officer or local law enforcement agency pursuant to 21 22 paragraph (a) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144 and the number of 23 habitual truants who are referred to an advisory board to review 24 school attendance pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 2 of NRS 25 392.144, reported for each school district, including, without 26 limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a 27 whole.

(dd) Information on the paraprofessionals employed at public
schools in this State, including, without limitation, the charter
schools in this State. The information must include:

(1) The number of paraprofessionals employed, reported for
each school district, including, without limitation, each charter
school in the district, and for this State as a whole; and

34 (2) For each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, the 35 number and percentage of all paraprofessionals who do not satisfy 36 the qualifications set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 6319(c). The reporting 37 38 requirements of this subparagraph apply to paraprofessionals who 39 are employed in programs supported with Title I money and to 40 paraprofessionals who are not employed in programs supported with 41 Title I money.

17 (5) The number and percentage of pupils who completed a 18 program of career and technical education and who received a standard high school diploma, an adjusted diploma or a certificate of 19 20 attendance: and

21 (6) The number and percentage of pupils who completed a 22 program of career and technical education and who did not receive a high school diploma because the pupils failed to pass the high 23 24 school proficiency examination.

A separate reporting for a group of pupils must not be made 25 pursuant to this section if the number of pupils in that group is 26 27 insufficient to yield statistically reliable information or the results would reveal personally identifiable information about an individual 28 29 pupil. The State Board shall prescribe a mechanism for determining the minimum number of pupils that must be in a group for that 30 group to yield statistically reliable information. 31

3. The annual report of accountability must:

(a) Comply with 20 U.S.C. § 6311(h)(1) and the regulations 33 34 adopted pursuant thereto; 35

(b) Be prepared in a concise manner; and

(c) Be presented in an understandable and uniform format and, 36 to the extent practicable, provided in a language that parents can 37 38 understand.

39 On or before September 1 of each year, the State Board 4. 40 shall:

41 (a) Provide for public dissemination of the annual report of accountability by posting a copy of the report on the Internet 42 website maintained by the Department; and 43



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1 (b) Provide written notice that the report is available on the Internet website maintained by the Department. The written notice 2 3 must be provided to the:

(1) Governor; 4

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- (2) Committee:
- 6 (3) Bureau;
 - (4) Board of Regents of the University of Nevada;
 - (5) Board of trustees of each school district; and

(6) Governing body of each charter school.

Upon the request of the Governor, an entity described in 10 5. 11 paragraph (b) of subsection 4 or a member of the general public, the 12 State Board shall provide a portion or portions of the annual report 13 of accountability. 14

As used in this section: 6.

15 (a) "Highly qualified" has the meaning ascribed to it in 20 16 U.S.C. § 7801(23).

17 (b) "Paraprofessional" has the meaning ascribed to it in 18 NRS 391.008. 19

Sec. 5. NRS 385.347 is hereby amended to read as follows:

20 385.347 1. The board of trustees of each school district in this State, in cooperation with associations recognized by the State 21 22 Board as representing licensed educational personnel in the district, 23 shall adopt a program providing for the accountability of the school 24 district to the residents of the district and to the State Board for the 25 quality of the schools and the educational achievement of the pupils in the district, including, without limitation, pupils enrolled in 26 27 charter schools in the school district. The board of trustees of each 28 school district shall report the information required by subsection 2 29 for each charter school that is located within the school district, 30 regardless of the sponsor of the charter school. The information for 31 charter schools must be reported separately and must denote the charter schools sponsored by the school district, the charter schools 32 33 sponsored by the State Board and the charter schools sponsored by a 34 college or university within the Nevada System of Higher 35 Education.

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(a) The educational goals and objectives of the school district.

40 (b) Pupil achievement for each school in the district and the 41 district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. The board of trustees of the district shall base its 42 report on the results of the examinations administered pursuant to 43 44 NRS 389.015 and 389.550 and shall compare the results of those 45 examinations for the current school year with those of previous





school years. The report must include, for each school in the district,
 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and

(b) Prescribe the intensive instructional services in reading 28 29 which the principal of a school must implement as determined 30 appropriate for a pupil who is retained in grade 3 pursuant to 31 section 11 of this act, including, without limitation: 32 (1) Instruction that is provided in small groups; (2) Instruction provided in classes with reduced pupil-33 34 *teacher ratios:* 35 (3) A timeline for frequently monitoring the progress of the 36 pupil; 37 (4) Tutoring and mentoring: (5) Classes which are designed to increase the ability of 38 pupils to transition from grade 3 to grade 4; 39 (6) Instruction provided through an extended school day, 40 41 school week or school year; or 42 (7) Programs to improve a pupil's proficiency in reading which are offered during the summer. 43 44 3. The intensive instructional services in reading required by 45 this section must be provided to the pupil by a teacher who is





highly qualified, as demonstrated by pupil performance data and 1 2 performance evaluations.

3 The board of trustees of each school district shall develop a 4. policy by which the principal of a school may promote a pupil who 4 is retained in grade 3 pursuant to section 11 of this act to grade 4 5 6 at any time during the school year if the pupil demonstrates adequate proficiency in reading. The policy must include the 7 specific criteria a pupil must satisfy to be eligible for promotion, 8 including, without limitation, a reasonable expectation that the 9 pupil's progress will allow him or her to sufficiently master the 10 requirements for a fourth-grade reading level. If a pupil is 11 promoted after November 1 of a school year, he or she must 12 13 demonstrate proficiency in reading at a level prescribed by the 14 State Board.

15 If a principal of a school determines that a pupil is not 5. 16 academically ready for promotion to grade 4 after being retained in grade 3 and the pupil received intensive instructional services 17 pursuant to this section, the school district in which the pupil is 18 enrolled shall provide the parent or legal guardian of the pupil 19 with the option for the pupil to be placed in a transitional 20 instructional setting which is designed to produce learning gains 21 sufficient for the pupil to meet the performance standards 22 required for grade 4 while continuing to receive remediation in the 23 area of his or her reading deficiency. 24

25 Sec. 13. In addition to the intensive instructional services 26 provided to a pupil who is retained in grade 3 pursuant to section 27 11 of this act, the principal of the school must offer the parent or legal guardian of the pupil at least one of the following 28 29 instructional options:

30 Supplemental tutoring which is based upon scientifically 1. 31 based reading instruction research;

32 2. Providing the parent or legal guardian with a plan for 33 reading with the pupil at home and participating in any workshops that may be available in the school district to assist the parent or 34 35 guardian with reading with his or her child at home, as set forth in 36 an agreement with the parent or legal guardian; or

37 Providing the pupil with a mentor or tutor who has *3*. 38 received specialized training in teaching pupils how to read.

39 Sec. 14. On or before September 1 of each year, the board of trustees of each school district shall: 40

41 Prepare a report concerning the number and percentage of 1. 42 pupils at each public school within the school district who were retained in grade 3 pursuant to section 11 of this act for a 43 44 deficiency in reading. 45

Submit a copy of the report to the Department. 2.





1 *3*. Post the report on the Internet website maintained by the 2 school district and otherwise make the report card available to the 3 parents and legal guardians of pupils enrolled in the school district and the general public. 4 5

Sec. 15. NRS 392.125 is hereby amended to read as follows:

392.125 6 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 4, before any pupil enrolled in a public school may be retained in the 7 8 same grade rather than promoted to the next higher grade for the 9 succeeding school year, the pupil's teacher and principal must make 10 a reasonable effort to arrange a meeting and to meet with the pupil's parents or guardian to discuss the reasons and circumstances. 11

12 2. [The] Except as otherwise provided in sections 10 to 14, 13 *inclusive, of this act, the* teacher and the principal in joint 14 agreement have the final authority to retain a pupil in the same 15 grade for the succeeding school year.

16 3. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2 of NRS 17 392.033 for the promotion of a pupil to high school, no pupil may 18 be retained more than one time in the same grade.

[This] Except as otherwise provided in NRS 386.583, this 19 4. 20 section does not apply to the academic retention of pupils who are enrolled in a charter school. 21

22 Sec. 16. 1. This section and sections 7, 8 and 9 of this act become effective on July 1, 2011. 23

Sections 1 to 6, inclusive, and 10 to 15, inclusive, of this act 24 2. 25 become effective on July 1, 2012.
