SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing economic development. (BDR 18-760)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: No. Effect on the State: No.

EXPLANATION - Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to economic development; revising the name of the Governor's Workforce Investment Board to the Governor's Workforce Development Board; revising the membership and duties of the Board; revising provisions relating to industry sector councils; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law creates the Governor's Workforce Investment Board and requires the Board to perform certain duties, which include: (1) identifying industry sectors that are essential to this State and the region or regions of the State where the majority of the operations of each of those industry sectors is conducted; and (2) establishing regional goals for economic development and establishing a council for each industry sector. (NRS 232.935) **Section 3** of this bill revises the name of the Governor's Workforce Investment Board to the Governor's Workforce Development Board. **Sections 1, 2 and 4-6** of this bill make conforming changes to revise the name of the Governor's Workforce Investment Board to the Governor's Workforce Development Board.

11 Section 3 expands the representation requirements of the Board to include 12 members of local workforce development boards and other business representatives 13 from industry sectors. Section 3 further requires the Board to collaborate with local 14 workforce development boards and regional development authorities to: (1) identify 15 industry sectors that are essential to each region of this State; (2) establish regional 16 industry or sector partnerships; and (3) establish regional goals for economic development in the identified industry sectors. Section 3 also requires each regional 17 18 industry or sector partnership working with local workforce development boards to 19 report to the Board annually and when necessary.

20 Sections 4 and 7-9 of this bill make conforming changes to revise references to 21 industry sector councils.





THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. NRS 223.650 is hereby amended to read as follows:

report the information gathered by the survey to the State Board of
Education and the Board of Regents of the University of Nevada;

(e) Apply for grants on behalf of the State of Nevada relating to
 the development and expansion of education programs in the fields
 of science, technology, engineering and mathematics;

24 (f) Identify a nonprofit corporation to assist in the 25 implementation of the plans developed pursuant to paragraphs (a), 26 (b) and (c);

27 (g) Prepare a written report which includes, without limitation, 28 recommendations based on the survey conducted pursuant to 29 paragraph (d) and any other recommendations concerning the 30 instruction and curriculum in courses of study in science, 31 technology, engineering and mathematics in public schools in this 32 State and, on or before January 31 of each odd-numbered year, 33 submit a copy of the report to the State Board of Education, the 34 Board of Regents of the University of Nevada, the Governor and 35 the Director of the Legislative Counsel Bureau for transmittal to the 36 Legislature;

3. The Council or a subcommittee of the Council may seek the input, advice and assistance of persons and organizations that have knowledge, interest or expertise relevant to the duties of the Council.

The State Board of Education and the Board of Regents of 27 the University of Nevada shall consider the plans developed by the 28 Advisory Council on Science, Technology, Engineering and 29 Mathematics pursuant to paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of subsection 1 and the written report submitted pursuant to paragraph (g) of 30 31 subsection 1. 20 **Sec. 5.** NRS 360.752 is hereby amended to read as follows:

21 A person who intends to locate or expand a 360.752 1. 22 business in this State may apply to the Office of Economic 23 Development pursuant to this section for a partial abatement of the 24 tax imposed on the new or expanded business pursuant to chapter 25 361 of NRS.

26 2. The Office of Economic Development shall approve an 27 application for a partial abatement pursuant to this section if the 28 Office makes the following determinations:

29 (a) The business is in one or more of the industry sectors for 30 economic development promoted, identified or otherwise approved 31 by the Governor's Workforce [Investment] Development Board 32 described in NRS 232.935. (b) The business is consistent with:

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(1) The State Plan for Economic Development developed by

35 the Executive Director of the Office of Economic Development pursuant to subsection 2 of NRS 231.053; and 36

37 (2) Any guidelines adopted by the Executive Director of the 38 Office to implement the State Plan for Economic Development.

(c) Not later than 1 year after the date on which the application 39 40 was received by the Office, the applicant has executed an agreement with the Office which must: 41

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(1) Comply with the requirements of NRS 360.755;

43 (2) Require the business to submit to the Department the 44 reports required by paragraph (c) of subsection 1 of NRS 218D.355;





1 (3) State the agreed terms of the partial abatement, which 2 must comply with the requirements of subsection 4;

3 (4) State the date on which the abatement becomes effective, 4 as agreed to by the applicant and the Office, which must not be 5 earlier than the date on which the Office received the application and not later than 1 year after the date on which the Office approves 6 7 the application;

8 (5) State that the business will, after the date on which a 9 certificate of eligibility for the abatement is issued pursuant to subsection 5, continue in operation in this State for a period 10 specified by the Office, which must be at least 5 years, and will 11 12 continue to meet the eligibility requirements set forth in this 13 subsection; and

14 (6) Bind the successors in interest of the business for the 15 specified period.

16 (d) The business is registered pursuant to the laws of this State 17 or the applicant commits to obtain a valid business license and all 18 other permits required by the county, city or town in which the 19 business operates.

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(e) The business does not receive:

21 (1) Any funding from a governmental entity, other than any 22 private activity bonds as defined in 26 U.S.C. § 141; or

23 (2) Any real or personal property from a governmental entity 24 at no cost or at a reduced cost.

25 (f) The average hourly wage that will be paid by the business to 26 its new employees in this State is at least 100 percent of the average statewide hourly wage or the average countywide hourly wage, 27 28 whichever is less, as established by the Employment Security 29 Division of the Department of Employment, Training and 30 Rehabilitation on July 1 of each fiscal year.

31 (g) The business will offer a health insurance plan for all full-32 time employees that includes an option for health insurance 33 coverage for dependents of those employees, or will abide by all 34 applicable provisions of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care 35 Act, Public Law 111-148, or both, and the benefits the business 36 offers to its employees in this State will meet the minimum 37 requirements for benefits established by the Office.

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(h) The business meets the following requirements:

39 (1) The business makes a capital investment of at least 40 \$1,000,000 in a program of the University of Nevada, Reno, the 41 University of Nevada, Las Vegas, or the Desert Research Institute to 42 be used in support of research, development or training related to 43 the field of endeavor of the business.

44 (2) The business will employ 15 or more full-time employees for the duration of the abatement. 45





1 (3) The business will employ two or more graduate students 2 from the program in which the capital investment is made on a part-3 time basis during years 2 through 5, inclusive, of the abatement.

4 (4) The business submits with its application for a partial 5 abatement:

6 (I) A letter of support from the institution in which the 7 investment is made, which is signed by the chief capital 8 administrative officer of the institution and the director or chair of 9 the program or the appropriate department, and which includes, without limitation, a summary of the financial and other resources 10 the business will provide to the program and an agreement that the 11 12 institution will provide to the Office periodic reports, at such times 13 and containing such information as the Office may require, 14 regarding the use of those resources; and

15 (II) A letter of support which is signed by the chair of the 16 board of directors of the regional economic development authority within whose jurisdiction the institution is located and which 17 includes, without limitation, a summary of the role the business will 18 19 play in diversifying the economy and, if applicable, in achieving the broader goals of the regional economic development authority for 20 21 economic development and diversification.

22 (i) In lieu of meeting the requirements of paragraph (h), the 23 business meets the following requirements:

24 (1) The business makes a capital investment of at least 25 \$500,000 in the Nevada State College or an institution of the 26 Nevada System of Higher Education other than those set forth in 27 subparagraph (1) of paragraph (h), to be used in support of college 28 certification or in support of research or training related to the field 29 of endeavor of the business.

(2) The business will employ 15 or more full-time employees 30 31 for the duration of the abatement.

32 (3) The business will employ two or more students from the 33 college or institution in which the capital investment is made on a 34 full-time basis during years 2 through 5, inclusive, of the abatement.

35 (4) The business submits with its application for a partial 36 abatement:

37 (I) A letter of support from the college or institution in 38 which the capital investment is made, which is signed by the chief 39 administrative officer of the college or institution and which 40 includes, without limitation, a summary of the financial and other 41 resources the business will provide to the program and an agreement 42 that the college or institution will provide to the Office periodic 43 reports, at such times and containing such information as the Office 44 may require, regarding the use of those resources; and





1 (II) A letter of support which is signed by the chair of the 2 board of directors of the regional economic development authority 3 within whose jurisdiction the college or institution is located and 4 which includes, without limitation, a summary of the role the 5 business will play in diversifying the economy and, if applicable, in 6 achieving the broader goals of the regional economic development 7 authority for economic development and diversification.

8 3. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection 2, the Office 9 of Economic Development:

(a) Shall furnish to the board of county commissioners of each
affected county a copy of each application for a partial abatement
pursuant to this section.

(b) Shall not consider an application for a partial abatement
pursuant to this section unless the Office has requested a letter of
acknowledgment of the request for the abatement from any affected
county, school district, city or town.

17 (c) Shall not approve an application for a partial abatement pursuant to this section unless the abatement is approved or deemed 18 19 approved as described in this paragraph. The board of county commissioners of each affected county must approve or deny the 20 21 application not later than 30 days after the board of county 22 commissioners receives a copy of the application as described in 23 paragraph (a). If the board of county commissioners does not 24 approve or deny the application within 30 days after the board of 25 county commissioners receives a copy of the application, the 26 application shall be deemed approved.

(d) May, if the Office determines that such action is necessary

(1) Fifty percent of the amount of the taxes imposed on the

36 (2) Fifty percent of the amount of the capital investment by37 the business,

38 \rightarrow whichever amount is less;

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(b) The duration of the abatement must be for 5 years; and

40 (c) The abatement applies only to the business for which the 41 abatement was approved pursuant to this section and the property 42 used in connection with that business.

43 5. If the Office of Economic Development approves an 44 application for a partial abatement pursuant to this section, the





1 Office shall immediately forward a certificate of eligibility for the 2 abatement to:

(a) The Department;

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(b) The Nevada Tax Commission; and

5 (c) If the partial abatement is from the property tax imposed 6 pursuant to chapter 361 of NRS, the county treasurer of the county 7 in which the business will be located.

6. An applicant for a partial abatement pursuant to this section or an existing business whose partial abatement is in effect shall, upon the request of the Executive Director of the Office of Economic Development, furnish the Executive Director with copies of all records necessary to verify that the applicant meets the requirements of subsection 2.

7. If an applicant for a partial abatement pursuant to this section fails to execute the agreement described in paragraph (c) of subsection 2 within 1 year after the date on which the application was received by the Office, the applicant shall not be approved for a partial abatement pursuant to this section unless the applicant submits a new application.

8. If a business whose partial abatement has been approved pursuant to this section and is in effect ceases to meet the requirements set forth in subsection 2 or ceases operation before the time specified in the agreement described in paragraph (c) of subsection 2:

25 (a) The business shall repay to the county treasurer the amount 26 of the partial abatement that was allowed pursuant to this section 27 before the failure of the business to comply unless the Nevada Tax 28 Commission determines that the business has substantially complied 29 with the requirements of this section. Except as otherwise provided 30 in NRS 360.232 and 360.320, the business shall, in addition to the 31 amount of the partial abatement required to be paid pursuant to this 32 subsection, pay interest on the amount due at the rate most recently 33 established pursuant to NRS 99.040 for each month, or portion thereof, from the last day of the month following the period for 34 35 which the payment would have been made had the partial abatement 36 not been approved until the date of payment of the tax.

(b) The applicable institution of higher education is entitled to
 keep the entire capital investment made by the business in that

16 2. An advisory technical skills committee established pursuant 17 to paragraph (a) of subsection 1 shall meet regularly to:

(a) Provide input on updates to the comprehensive needs 18 19 assessment conducted pursuant to 20 U.S.C. § 2354;

(b) Review the instructional supplies, equipment and operation 20 21 of the program of career and technical education to determine its 22 effectiveness in preparing pupils enrolled in the program to enter the 23 workforce, apprenticeships or college and meet the needs of 24 businesses and industries in the region concerning their workforce;

25 (c) Advise the school district regarding credentials that are 26 valuable in relevant industries and trends in such industries:

27 (d) Provide technical assistance to the school district in 28 designing and revising as necessary the curriculum for the program 29 of career and technical education to meet the standards prescribed 30 by the State Board: and

31 (e) In cooperation with businesses, industries, employer associations and employee organizations in the community, develop 32 33 work-based learning experiences for pupils enrolled in the program of career and technical education. 36 The meetings of an advisory technical skills committee are 3. not subject to the provisions of chapter 241 of NRS. 37

The members of an advisory technical skills committee 38 4. 39 serve without compensation.

40 **Sec. 7.** NRS 388.392 is hereby amended to read as follows:

41 388.392 1. Of state money appropriated for use in a fiscal 42 year for programs of career and technical education, the State Board shall not use more than 7.5 percent to provide leadership and 43 44 training activities in that fiscal year.





1 2. Before allocating state money, if any, to provide leadership 2 and training activities, the State Board shall:

42 (5) Includes for all participating customers any other 43 applicable charges including, without limitation, the universal 44 energy charge, franchise fees, the renewable energy program rate 45 and base tariff general rates, except that the Commission may

demonstrated, without limitation, by a notarized statement of the
employee that he or she is a resident of this State;

16 (j) Provide for a mechanism for the host sites of community-17 based solar resources to receive compensation from the utility for 18 the use of such site;

(k) Provide for the use of a combination of new and other renewable energy facilities, which may be either utility scale or community-based solar resources, that were submitted to the Commission for approval after May 1, 2018, and that were not placed into operation before April 1, 2020;

(1) Provide for an application and selection process for eligible
 customers to participate in the program;

26 (m) Ensure reasonable and equitable participation by eligible 27 customers within the service area of the electric utility;

(n) Ensure that eligible customers are able to participate in the
 program regardless of whether the customer owns, rents or leases
 the customer's premises;

(o) Require that:

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32 (1) Twenty-five percent of the capacity of the program, as 33 provided in subsection 1, be reserved for low-income eligible 34 customers;

(2) Twenty-five percent of the capacity of the program, as
 provided in subsection 1, be reserved for disadvantaged businesses
 and nonprofit organizations; and

(3) Fifty percent of the capacity of the program, as provided
in subsection 1, be reserved for eligible customers who are fully
bundled residential customers who own, rent or lease their residence
and who certify in a statement which satisfies the requirements

- 43 (g) "Eligible customer" means:

(1) A fully bundled general service customer; or

(2) A fully bundled residential customer of a utility.



(h) "Fully bundled customer" means a customer of an electric
 utility who receives energy, transmission, distribution and ancillary
 services from an electric utility.

4 (i) "Fully bundled general service customer" means a fully 5 bundled customer who is a nonresidential customer with a kilowatt-6 hour consumption that does not exceed 10,000 kilowatt-hours per 7 month.

8 (j) "Fully bundled residential customer" means a fully bundled 9 customer who is a single-family or a multifamily residential 10 customer.

(k) "Low-income eligible customer" means a natural person or
household who is a fully bundled residential customer of a utility
and has an income of not more than 80 percent of the area median

Department of Housing and Urban Development.

16 (1) "Solar Energy Zone" means an area identified and designated 17 by the Bureau of Land Management as an area well-suited for 18 utility-scale production of solar energy, and where the Bureau of 19 Land Management will prioritize solar energy and associated 20 transmission infrastructure development.

(m) "Solar resource" means a facility or energy system that uses
 a solar photovoltaic device to generate electricity.

(n) "Solar workforce innovations and opportunity program"

[council] *partnership, if applicable,* in conjunction with potential

Any administrative regulations adopted by an officer or an agency whose name has been changed or whose responsibilities have been transferred pursuant to the provisions of this act to another officer or agency remain in force until amended by the officer or agency to which the responsibility for the adoption of the regulations has been transferred.

Any contracts or other agreements entered into by an officer or agency whose name has been changed or whose responsibilities have been transferred pursuant to the provisions of this act to another officer or agency are binding upon the officer or agency to which the responsibility for the administration of the provisions of the contract or other agreement has been transferred.
