# SENATE BILL NO. 142–SENATORS D. HARRIS, SCHEIBLE, FLORES, DONATE; DALY AND LANGE

SUMMARY—Enacts the Homeless Persons' Bill of Rights. (BDR 38-195)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact. Effect on the State: Yes.

AN ACT relating to homelessness; enacting the Homeless Persons' Bill of Rights; authorizing certain civil actions; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

#### **Legislative Counsel's Digest:**

This bill enacts the Homeless Persons' Bill of Rights. Section 3 of this bill requires that a person experiencing homelessness be entitled to the same rights, privileges and benefits afforded to a resident of this State who is not experiencing homelessness. Section 3 also provides that a person experiencing homelessness is entitled to certain specific rights. Section 4 of this bill authorizes a court to award declaratory and injunctive relief, actual damages, reasonable attorney's fees and any other appropriate legal or equitable relief to a prevailing plaintiff who alleges a violation of these rights.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** Chapter 428 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto the provisions set forth as sections 2, 3 and 4 of this act.

Sec. 2. Section 3 of this act may be cited as the Homeless Persons' Bill of Rights.

Sec. 3. 1. A person experiencing homelessness is entitled to the same rights, privileges and benefits afforded to a resident of this State who is not experiencing homelessness, including, without limitation, the right to:





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(a) Be treated with fairness and respect for his or her privacy and dignity.

(b) Be free from intimidation, harassment and abuse.

- (c) Use and move freely in or on public places, including, without limitation, public sidewalks, government buildings, public parks and public transportation vehicles.
  - (d) Equal treatment by state or local governmental agencies.
  - (e) Have access to necessary emergency medical services.
- (f) Register to vote and vote in accordance with state election laws.
- (g) A reasonable expectation of privacy in his or her personal property, regardless of his or her location or the location of the property, to the same extent as a person who is not experiencing homelessness has the right to a reasonable expectation of privacy in any personal property located inside his or her residence.

(h) Be free from:

(1) Discrimination by an employer on the basis of his or her inability to provide the employer with a permanent mailing address or an address other than the address of a homeless shelter or the address of another person or entity that provides social services for persons experiencing homelessness.

(2) The unauthorized disclosure of his or her personally

identifiable information.

- 2. This section must not be construed to authorize a person who is experiencing homelessness to engage in conduct that violates any state or local law, ordinance or regulation.
- 3. As used in this section, "personally identifiable information" means information that may be used to identify a person including, without limitation, the name, address, telephone number, date of birth or social security number of a person.
- Sec. 4. A person experiencing homelessness may bring a civil action in a court of competent jurisdiction for a violation of section 3 of this act to seek any or all of the following relief:
  - 1. Declaratory and injunctive relief.
  - 2. Actual damages.

3. Reasonable attorney's fees.

4. Any other legal or equitable relief that the court deems appropriate.
