AN ACT making an appropriation for the creation and maintenance of school gardens for certain Title I schools; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Assembly Bill No. 337 of the 77th Session of the Nevada Legislature was adopted in order to strongly encourage each school to establish and participate in programs, including a school garden program, in order to promote the consumption of fresh fruits and vegetables by children.

23456 This bill appropriates money to provide for the creation and maintenance of programs that provide school gardens for Title I schools.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. 1. There is hereby appropriated from the State 1 General Fund to the State Department of Agriculture for the cost of 2 creating and maintaining programs for school gardens that meet the 3 requirements of subsection 2: 4

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2 shall allocate the money appropriated by subsection 1 to schools which meet the requirements of subsection 3 to provide at the school 3 a program for a school garden which meets the requirements set 4 5 forth in subsection 4. 3. For a school to receive an allocation of money pursuant to 6 7 subsection 2, the school must be a Title I school as defined in 8 NRS 385A.040. 9 4. For a school to receive an allocation of money to provide a 10 program for a school garden pursuant to subsection 2, the program 11 must. 12 (a) Create and maintain a school garden at the school. 13 (b) Have a curriculum that: 14 (1) Is tailored to pupils of the appropriate grade levels at the 15 school: 16 (2) Is written specifically for Nevada and the desert 17 environment of Nevada: 18 (3) Complies with the standards of content and performance 19 for a course of study in science adopted by the State Board of Education pursuant to NRS 389.520; 20 (4) Uses experiential learning or project-based learning to 21 teach science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics; 22 (5) Is designed with the assistance of teachers and other 23 24 educational personnel with experience at the appropriate grade 25 levels at the school; and 26 (6) Involves supervised learning experiences for the pupils at 27 the school in a classroom and an outdoor garden. (c) Provide the school with assistance from members of the 28 29 community, including, without limitation, trained educators, local 30 farmers and local chefs. 31 (d) Provide pupils with the: (1) Ability to operate a farmer's market to sell the produce 32 33 from the school garden; and (2) Opportunity to have a local chef or employee of a school 34 35 who works in food services demonstrate how to cook a meal using 36 the produce grown from the school garden. (e) Establish garden teams comprised of teachers and, if such 37 38 persons are available, parents and members of the community. Each 39 garden team shall meet at least once each month. 40 (f) Require any local nonprofit community-based or 41 organization which will provide services to implement the program for a school garden to have at least 2 years of experience 42 43 implementing such a program. 44 5. Money allocated pursuant to subsection 2 may be used by a 45 school to: SB167

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Subject to the limitations of subsection 6, the Department

1 2 (a) Provide professional development for teachers regarding the:

(1) Use of a school garden to teach pupils with disabilities;

3 (2) Development and implementation of science, technology, 4 engineering, arts and mathematics curricula that incorporate the use 5 of a school garden; and

6 (3) Development and implementation of a food safety plan 7 designed to ensure that food grown in a school garden is properly 8 handled and safe to sell and consume;

9 (b) Pay for any travel expenses associated with the attendance of 10 a teacher at any training or conference relating to school gardens; 11 and

12 (c) Pay for the costs of a conference regarding school gardens 13 held in this State.

6. Pursuant to subsection 2, a school may receive an allocation of not more than \$10,000 for the Fiscal Year 2017-2018 and not more than \$5,000 for the Fiscal Year 2018-2019.

17 7. Any balance of the sums appropriated by subsection 1 remaining at the end of the respective fiscal years must not be 18 committed for expenditure after June 30 of the respective fiscal 19 years by the entity to which the appropriation is made or any entity 20 to which money from the appropriation is granted or otherwise 21 transferred in any manner, and any portion of the appropriated 22 money remaining must not be spent for any purpose after 23 September 21, 2018, and September 20, 2019, respectively, by 24 25 either the entity to which the money was appropriated or the entity to which the money was subsequently granted or transferred, and 26 27 must be reverted to the State General Fund on or before September 21, 2018, and September 20, 2019, respectively. 28 29 **Sec. 2.** This act becomes effective on July 1, 2017.

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
