The amount of \$367,665 from the allocation made pursuant to subsection 3 of section 2.7 of chapter 455, Statutes of 4 5 Nevada 2019, at page 2791, approved by the Interim Finance 6 Committee in Fiscal Year 2019-2020 for the State Department of Conservation and Natural Resources for the purposes set forth in 7 section 2.3 of chapter 455, Statutes of Nevada 2019, at page 2791, 8 9 which was subsequently transferred to the Division of Forestry budget account during Fiscal Year 2019-2020, may be transferred 10 within the Division of Forestry budget account from one fiscal year 11 12 to the other, for the support of costs directly related to the four 13 positions approved for wildfire prevention, restoration and long-14 term planning efforts, and does not revert to the Contingency Account created by NRS 353.266.
