SUMMARY—Urges Congress to enact legislation requiring the transfer of lands available for disposal under the Recreation and Public Purposes Act and other public lands by the Federal Government. (BDR R-190)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION—Urging Congress to enact legislation requiring the transfer of lands identified as available for disposal under the Recreation and Public Purposes Act and other public lands by the Federal Government

WHEREAS, The Federal Government manages and controls more than 635 million acres of land heavily concentrated in 12 western states, including roughly 85 percent of all land in the State of Nevada; and

WHEREAS, Federal agencies face difficult challenges in managing those lands in Nevada and elsewhere; and

WHEREAS, The ability of local governmental entities to develop infrastructure, community facilities, natural resources and economic activities on federal land may be onerous, time-consuming or proscribed; and

WHEREAS, Leasing federal lands substantially restricts the use of those lands, threatens county and city projects by creating uncertainties about longevity and hampers county and city infrastructure by compounding complex management issues; and



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WHEREAS, The Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act of 1998, Public Law 105-263, 112 Stat. 2343, which requires the Secretary of the Interior to sell or transfer certain lands around Las Vegas and has provided millions of dollars to the State for the benefit of local school children, communities, infrastructure, wildlife habitat and recreationists, is substantially limited in the lands to which it applies; and

WHEREAS, The Bureau of Land Management is currently revising the Las Vegas Field Office Resource Management Plan intended to guide future decisions regarding the use, management and disposal of thousands of acres of federal land surrounding the city; and

WHEREAS, Although federal lands may be disposed of in compliance with federal laws, including the Recreation and Public Purposes Act, 43 U.S.C. §§ 869 et seq., those federal lands are routinely not transferred to local governmental entities, leaving many strategically located parcels of land interspersed with, or adjacent to, locally owned lands that are underutilized or completely undeveloped; and

WHEREAS, Community leaders, nonprofit organizations, private entities and residents of this State have expressed the belief that federal lands in and around cities and counties in this State can and should be used more effectively; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, JOINTLY, That Congress is urged to enact legislation requiring the Secretary of the Interior to transfer any lands identified as potentially available for disposal by the Federal Government under the Recreation and Public Purposes Act to this State or a local governmental entity in which those lands are located upon submission of a request to transfer those lands; and be it further

RESOLVED, That Congress is urged to enact legislation to require the transfer of all other public lands available for disposal, in accordance with applicable law, to this State or a local governmental or nonprofit entity to enable the beneficial use of those lands; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Secretary of the Senate prepare and transmit a copy of this resolution to the Vice President of the United States as the presiding officer of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, each member of the Nevada Congressional Delegation, the Governor, the Chief of the United States Forest Service, the Regional Forester of the Intermountain Region of the United States Forest Service, the Director of the Bureau of Land Management and the Field Manager of the Las Vegas Field Office of the Bureau of Land Management; and be it further





RESOLVED, That this resolution becomes effective upon passage.
