A BILL

To amend section 9.50 of the Revised Code to enact 1
the POW/MIA Remembrance Act requiring the 2
POW/MIA flag to be displayed at certain 3
buildings operated by the state on Armed Forces 4
Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day, 5
National POW/MIA Recognition Day, and Veterans' 6
Day. 7

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That section 9.50 of the Revised Code be 8
amended to read as follows: 9

Sec. 9.50. (A) As used in this section: 10

(1) "POW/MIA flag" means the flag that depicts the profile 11
of a prisoner of war against the background of a prisoner of war 12
camp watchtower. 13

(2) "Public building" means the principal municipal 14
building of each municipal corporation, the principal county 15

building in the county seat of each county, and the state house 16
in Columbus. 17

(3) "Transportation facilities" has the meaning defined in 18
section 5501.01 of the Revised Code. 19

(B) The general assembly hereby encourages the display of 20
the POW/MIA flag during normal business hours at each public 21
building. 22

(C) Except as provided under division (E) of this section, 23
the POW/MIA flag shall be displayed, according to recognized 24
rules and customs, at buildings operated by the state government 25
on all of the following days: 26

(1) The third Saturday in May, known as Armed Forces day; 27

(2) The last Monday in May, known as Memorial day; 28

(3) The fourteenth day of June, known as Flag day; 29

(4) The fourth day of July, known as Independence day; 30

(5) The third Friday in September, known as National 31
POW/MIA Recognition day; 32

(6) The eleventh day of November, known as Veterans' day. 33

(D) As used in divisions (C) and (E) of this section, 34
buildings operated by the state government include all of the 35
following: 36

(1) The building at 25 South Front Street, Columbus; 37

(2) The building at 4200 Surface Road, Columbus; 38

(3) The Frank J. Lausche state office building in 39
Cleveland; 40

(4) The James A. Rhodes state office tower in Columbus; 41

<u>(E) (1) Division (C) of this section does not apply to</u> <u>buildings that do not have an installed flag pole on the</u> <u>effective date of this amendment.</u>	56 57 58
<u>(2) A building operated by the state government may comply</u> <u>with the requirements of division (C) of this section by</u> <u>commencing the display of the flag during normal business hours</u> <u>on a workday before the required display day, and ending the</u> <u>display during normal business hours on a workday following the</u> <u>required display day.</u>	59 60 61 62 63 64
<u>(F) In enacting this section, the general assembly hereby</u> <u>declares and finds all of the following:</u>	65 66
<u>(1) Over two thousand four hundred Americans, including</u> <u>one hundred seventeen from this state, who served in the United</u>	67 68

States armed forces during the war in Indochina are still listed 69
as prisoners of war or missing in action. 70

(2) There is significant evidence that many of these 71
missing Americans are still alive and being held against their 72
will in Indochina. 73

(3) This nation is deeply indebted to its servicemen and 74
servicewomen of all wars and conflicts for their courage and 75
sacrifice and should demonstrate its special commitment to the 76
missing men and women of all wars and conflicts and their 77
families by obtaining the release of those still held prisoner 78
of war and the fullest possible accounting from the responsible 79
governments regarding those Americans listed as missing in 80
action. 81

(4) The POW/MIA flag is a powerful symbol of the plight of 82
these prisoners of war and missing Americans and reminds the 83
public of the commitment this nation must have in determining 84
the fate of its servicemen and servicewomen. Thus, it is 85
appropriate that the POW/MIA flag should be displayed at certain 86
public buildings throughout this state to increase public 87
awareness of the issue of prisoners of war and those missing in 88
action and to gain public support for the efforts of the United 89
States government to resolve this matter. 90

Section 2. That existing section 9.50 of the Revised Code 91
is hereby repealed. 92

Section 3. This act shall be known as the "POW/MIA 93
Remembrance Act." 94
