Research Analysis

The Senate amendments to HB 2824 transfers all employees, powers, functions and duties of the Oklahoma State Board of Examiners for Long-Term Care Administrators to the State Department of Health. The measure empowers the Commissioner of Health to determine the qualifications, skill, and fitness of any person to serve as a long-term care administrator. The measure requires the Department to give an administrator who the Department has determined has violated the Long-Term Care Administrator Licensing Act an opportunity to participate in an independent informal dispute resolution process of the case. The Department may contract with an impartial third party or use an impartial panel to make a final determination of a potential violation. The measure also recodifies various provisions relating to the State Board.

The measure repeals:

Fiscal Analysis

HB 2824 transfers all employees, powers, functions and duties of the Oklahoma State Board of Examiners for Long-Term Care Administrators to the State Department of Health. Additionally, the measure would require each person licensed or certified as a long-term care administrator to pay an annual license or certification fee to be deposited to the Long-Term Care Revolving Fund, now under control by the State Department of Health. This licensing fee would result in minimal revenue generated for the Department.
