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6 AS INTRODUCED

7 An Act relating to schools; directing the State Board
8 of Education to adopt a certain United States History
9 program and assessment; requiring United States
10 History courses to include the study of certain
11 documents; listing the documents; amending 70 O.S.
12 2011, Section 1210.703, which relates to financial
13 incentives awarded to schools under the Oklahoma
Advanced Placement Incentive Program; prohibiting the
awarding of grants or expenditure of money for any
Advanced Placement United States History course until
certain conditions are met; providing for
codification; providing an effective date; and
declaring an emergency.

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16 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

17 SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
18 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 11-103.12 of Title 70, unless
19 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

20 A. By the 2015-2016 school year, the State Board of Education
21 shall identify and adopt a United States History program and
22 corresponding test which school districts shall offer in lieu of the
23 Advanced Placement United States History course and test. The
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1 program and test shall not contradict or conflict with the subject
2 matter standards for United States History adopted by the Board.

3 B. Any United States History course offered in schools in the
4 state, including Honors and Advanced Placement courses shall include
5 as part of the primary instruction the appropriate grade-level study
6 of the following foundational and historical documents:

7 1. Organic documents from the pre-Colonial, Colonial,
8 Revolutionary, Federalist and post-Federalist eras of the United
9 States;

10 2. The major principles in the Federalist Papers;

11 3. The writings, speeches, documents and proclamations of the
12 Founders and Presidents of the United States;

13 4. Founding documents of the United States that contributed to
14 the foundation or maintenance of the representative form of limited
15 government, the free-market economic system and American
16 exceptionalism;

17 5. Objects of historical significance that have formed and
18 influenced the United States legal or governmental system and that
19 exemplify the development of the rule of law including, but not
20 limited to, the Magna Carta, the Mecklenburg Declaration, the Ten
21 Commandments and the Justinian Code;

22 6. United States Supreme Court decisions;

23 7. Acts of the United States Congress, including the published
24 text of the Congressional Record;

1 8. United States treaties;

2 9. Other documents, writings, speeches, proclamations and
3 recordings related to the history, heritage and foundation of the
4 United States, including but not limited to:

5 a. the Declaration of Independence,

6 b. the United States Constitution and its amendments,

7 c. the Mayflower Compact,

8 d. the Bill of Rights,

9 e. the Articles of Confederation,

10 f. the Virginia Plan,

11 g. the Northwest Ordinance,

12 h. the national motto,

13 i. the national anthem,

14 j. the sermon known as "A Model of Christian Charity" by
15 John Winthrop,

16 k. the sermon known as "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry
17 God" by Jonathan Edwards,

18 l. the Give Me Liberty or Give Me Death speech made by
19 Patrick Henry,

20 m. the letter known as "Remember the Ladies" by Abigail
21 Adams,

22 n. the writing titled "Common Sense, Section III:
23 Thoughts on the Present State of American Affairs" by
24 Thomas Paine,

- 1 o. the essay "Federalist No. 10" by James Madison,

11 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 1210.703, is
12 amended to read as follows:

13 Section 1210.703 A. Contingent upon the provision of
14 appropriated funds designated for the Oklahoma Advanced Placement
15 Incentive Program, the State Board of Education is hereby authorized
16 to award schools:

17 1. A one-time equipment and/or instructional materials grant
18 for the purpose of providing an advanced placement course, based on
19 criteria established by the Department. Schools which receive the
20 grants shall:

- 21 a. offer the advanced placement courses beginning the
22 school year following receipt of the grant,
23 b. provide the College Board training within one (1) year
24 of the grant award, including at least a one-week

1 summer institute. Teachers shall be encouraged to
2 attend annual follow-up training, and

3 c. make available advanced placement examinations to all
4 students taking the course for which a grant has been
5 awarded;

6 2. Additional grants to school sites demonstrating successful
7 implementation, as defined by the State Board of Education, of the
8 courses for which the first grants were awarded. Schools may
9 qualify for additional grants a minimum of four (4) years after
10 receiving a grant award;

11 3. Subsidized training for advanced placement courses,
12 preadvanced placement courses, or International Baccalaureate
13 courses in a form, manner and time prescribed by the Department;

14 4. One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for each score of three or
15 better on an advanced placement test or four or better on an
16 International Baccalaureate examination; provided, these funds shall
17 be used for the purpose of Advanced Placement Program development;

18 5. For those students who demonstrate financial need as defined
19 by the College Board or the International Baccalaureate
20 Organization, a share of the advanced placement or International
21 Baccalaureate test fee;

22 6. For those students who take more than one advanced placement
23 or International Baccalaureate test in one (1) year, a share of the
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1 advanced placement test or International Baccalaureate fee in a
2 manner prescribed by the Board; and

3 7. Grants for the purpose of developing an advanced placement
4 vertical team based on criteria established by the Board.

5 B. Upon completion of the test, the State Department of
6 Education shall obtain from the College Board and the International
7 Baccalaureate Organization a list of students in Oklahoma who scored
8 a three or higher on the advanced placement test or a four or higher
9 on the International Baccalaureate test. Financial incentives for
10 schools provided in this section shall be awarded at the beginning
11 of the next school year following the school year in which the test
12 was taken.

13 C. Any new expenditure authorized pursuant to Section 1210.701
14 et seq. of this title shall be contingent upon the availability of
15 funds.

16 D. Beginning with the 2015-2016 school year, the Board shall
17 not award any grants to school districts or make any expenditure of
18 state funds as authorized pursuant to this section for equipment,
19 instructional materials, course development, professional
20 development or training, examination awards or examination
21 scholarships for the Advanced Placement United States History course
22 until the College Board changes the framework for the course and
23 reverts back to the course framework and examination that were used
24 prior to the 2014-2015 school year.

1 SECTION 3. This act shall become effective July 1, 2015.

2 SECTION 4. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
3 of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is hereby
4 declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
5 be in full force from and after its passage and approval.

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
