7	An Act relating to schools; amending 70 O.S. 2011, Section 1210.545, as last amended by Section 2,
8	Chapter 163, O.S.L. 2014 (70 O.S. Supp. 2014, Section 1210.545), which relates to the annual reports of the
9	Oklahoma School Testing Program; modifying description of purpose of the annual reports; adding
10	student achievement results and performance descriptions from certain schools to annual reports;
11	providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

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14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
15	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 1210.545, as
16	last amended by Section 2, Chapter 163, O.S.L. 2014 (70 O.S. Supp.
17	2014, Section 1210.545), is amended to read as follows:
18	Section 1210.545 A. As part of the <u>education</u> accountability
19	system developed <u>as a way to inform Oklahoma taxpayers,</u> as provided
20	for in Section 1210.541 of this title, the State Board of Education
21	shall prepare annual reports of the results of the Oklahoma School
22	Testing Program which describe student achievement in the state and
23	each school site. The reports shall also include student
24	achievement results of schools that directly or indirectly receive

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1 revenue from the state for the financial support of public schools 2 including schools participating in the Lindsey Nicole Henry 3 Scholarships for Students with Disabilities Program. The Board 4 shall prescribe the design and content of the reports, which shall 5 include, without limitation, descriptions of the performance of all schools participating in the Oklahoma School Testing Program and all 6 7 of the major student populations as determined by the Board, and shall also include the median scores of all eligible students who 8 9 scored at or in the lowest twenty-fifth percentile of the state in 10 the previous school year. The reports shall also include student 11 performance descriptions of schools that directly or indirectly 12 receive revenue from the state for the financial support of public 13 schools. The confidentiality of individual student records shall be 14 preserved as required by law.

B. The annual report as required pursuant to subsection A of this section shall identify school sites as having one of the following grades, defined according to rules of the State Board of Education:

19 1. "A" means schools making excellent progress;

20 2. "B" means schools making above average progress;

21 3. "C" means schools making satisfactory progress;

4. "D" means schools making less than satisfactory progress;and

5. "F" means schools failing to make adequate progress.

C. Each school that has students who are tested and included in
 the school grading system as provided for in this section shall
 receive a school grade, except as follows:

A 1. A school shall not receive a school grade if the number of students tested and included in the school grading system is less than the minimum sample size necessary for statistical reliability and prevention of the unlawful release of personally identifiable student data. The State Board of Education is directed to establish the lowest minimum sample size necessary to meet the requirements of this paragraph;

A school that serves any combination of students in 12 kindergarten through grade three which does not receive a school 13 grade because the students are not tested and included in the school 14 grading system shall receive the school grade designation of a 15 feeder pattern school identified by the State Department of 16 Education and verified by the school district. A school feeder 17 pattern exists if at least sixty percent (60%) of the students in 18 the school serving a combination of students in kindergarten through 19 grade three are scheduled to be assigned to the graded school; and 20 3. The academic performance of students who are enrolled full-

time in an online program that is offered by a school district or charter school that is not the district of residence or is not located in the district of residence of the student shall be reported separately by the school district or charter school and

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shall not be included when determining the grade of the school site
 or charter school.

3 D. The grade of a school shall be based on a combination of: 4 Fifty percent (50%) on whole school performance, as measured 1. 5 by allocating one point for each student who scores proficient or advanced on the criterion-referenced tests and end-of-instruction 6 7 tests administered under Section 1210.508 of this title and 8 alternative test scores administered to students pursuant to Section 9 1210.523 of this title divided by the number of students taking the 10 tests;

11 2. Twenty-five percent (25%) on whole school growth, as 12 measured by allocating one point for each student who improves 13 proficiency levels or improves substantially within a proficiency 14 level on criterion-referenced tests and end-of-instruction tests 15 administered under Section 1210.508 of this title divided by the 16 number of students taking the tests; and

17 3. Twenty-five percent (25%) on growth in the bottom quartile 18 of students, as measured by allocating one point for each student in 19 the bottom quartile who improves proficiency levels or improves 20 substantially within a proficiency level on criterion-referenced 21 tests and end-of-instruction tests administered under Section 22 1210.508 of this title divided by the number of students taking the 23 tests.

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1 In addition to the components outlined in subsection D of Ε. 2 this section, the following bonus points shall be considered in determining the grade of a school site: 3 4 For schools comprised of high school grades: 1. 5 a. five points for meeting the criteria for an "A" for the high school graduation rate of the school, as 6 7 defined by rules adopted by the Board, b. one point for meeting the criteria for an "A" for 8 9 performance or participation of students in College 10 Board Advanced Placement courses, International 11 Baccalaureate courses, concurrent enrollment courses, Advanced International Certificate of Education 12 13 courses, or the achievement of students on national 14 industry certification, as defined by rules adopted by 15 the Board, 16 one point for meeting the criteria for an "A" for с. 17 participation or performance in SAT tests administered 18 by the College Board or the American College Test 19 (ACT), as defined by rules adopted by the Board, 20 d. one point for meeting the criteria for an "A" for the 21 high school graduation rate of students who scored at 22 limited knowledge or unsatisfactory on the eighth-23 grade criterion-referenced tests in reading and 24 mathematics,

1 as valid data becomes available, one point for the e. 2 performance of students on the end-of-instruction tests administered under Section 1210.508 of this 3 4 title, as defined by rules adopted by the Board, and 5 f. one point for the growth or decline in the components listed in subparagraphs a through e of this paragraph 6 7 from year to year, as defined by rules adopted by the Board; 8 9 2. For schools comprised of middle school grades: two points for meeting the criteria for an "A" for the 10 a. 11 drop-out rate of the school, as defined by rules 12 adopted by the Board, 13 b. two points for meeting the criteria for an "A" for the 14 percentage of students who are taking higher level 15 coursework at a satisfactory or higher level, as 16 defined by rules adopted by the Board, and 17 six points for meeting the criteria for an "A" for с. 18 attendance, as defined by rules adopted by the Board; 19 and 20 3. For schools comprised of elementary school grades, ten 21 points for meeting the criteria for an "A" for attendance, as 22 defined by rules adopted by the Board.

F. Student test data used in determining school grades shallinclude:

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The aggregate scores of all eligible students enrolled in
 the school who have been administered the criterion-referenced tests
 and end-of-instruction tests administered under Section 1210.508 of
 this title; and

5 2. For schools comprised of high school grades, the data listed 6 in paragraph 1 of this subsection, and the following data as the 7 State Department of Education determines the data are valid and 8 available:

- 9 a. the high school graduation rate of the school as
 10 calculated by the Department,
- 11 b. the participation rate of all eligible students 12 enrolled in the school in College Board Advanced 13 Placement courses whether taught at a high school, a 14 technology center school, or a regional site of the 15 Oklahoma School of Science and Mathematics, 16 International Baccalaureate courses, concurrent 17 enrollment courses, Advanced International Certificate 18 of Education courses, courses or sequence of courses 19 leading to national industry certification identified 20 pursuant to rules adopted by the Board, courses or 21 sequence of courses granted cooperative college 22 alliance credit taken at a technology center school, 23 and science, technology, engineering and mathematics
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courses taken at a regional site of the Oklahoma School of Science and Mathematics,

- c. the aggregate scores of all eligible students enrolled
 in the school in College Board Advanced Placement
 courses whether taught at a high school, a technology
 center school, or a regional site of the Oklahoma
 School of Science and Mathematics, International
 Baccalaureate courses, and Advanced International
 Certificate of Education courses,
- 10d.earning of college credit by all eligible students11enrolled in the school in concurrent enrollment12programs as provided for in Section 628.13 of this13title and in cooperative college alliance courses14taken at a technology center school,
- e. earning of a national industry certification
 identified pursuant to rules adopted by the Board,
 f. the aggregate scores of all eligible students enrolled
 in the school in reading, mathematics, and other
 subjects as measured by the SAT test administered by
 the College Board and the ACT,
- g. the high school graduation rate of all eligible students enrolled in the school who scored at limited knowledge or unsatisfactory on the eighth-grade criterion-referenced tests in reading and mathematics,

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- h. the performance of students on statewide end-of instruction tests administered under Section 1210.508
 of this title, and
- 4 i. the growth or decline in the data components listed in
 5 subparagraphs a through h of this paragraph from year
 6 to year.

G. Grades shall be calculated by combining the points earned for whole school performance, whole school growth and growth in the bottom quartile of students, measured pursuant to subsection D of this section, and any bonus points earned pursuant to subsection E of this section. Grades shall be assigned based on the following scale:

13 1. Ninety-seven percent (97%) to one hundred percent (100%) = 14 A+;

15 2. Ninety-three percent (93%) to ninety-six percent (96%) = A; 16 3. Ninety percent (90%) to ninety-two percent (92%) = A-; 17 4. Eighty-seven percent (87%) to eighty-nine percent (89%) = 18 B+;

19 5. Eighty-three percent (83%) to eighty-six percent (86%) = B; 20 6. Eighty percent (80%) to eighty-two percent (82%) = B-; 21 7. Seventy-seven percent (77%) to seventy-nine percent (79%) = 22 C+; 8. Seventy-three percent (73%) to seventy-six percent (76%) =

23 8. Seventy-three percent (/3%) to seventy-six percent (/6%) =
24 C;

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9. Seventy percent (70%) to seventy-two percent (72%) = C-;
 10. Sixty-seven percent (67%) to sixty-nine percent (69%) = D+;
 11. Sixty-three percent (63%) to sixty-six percent (66%) = D;
 12. Sixty percent (60%) to sixty-two percent (62%) = D-; and
 13. Fifty-nine percent (59%) and below = F.

The annual report shall identify the performance of each 6 Η. 7 school as having improved, remained the same, or declined. This school improvement rating shall be based on a comparison of the 8 9 student and school performance data of the current year to the 10 previous year data. Schools that improve at least one grade level 11 are eligible for school recognition as established by the Board 12 through the accountability system developed pursuant to Section 13 1210.541 of this title.

14 The State Department of Education shall annually develop, in I. 15 collaboration with school districts and the Office of Educational 16 Quality and Accountability, a school site report card to be 17 delivered to parents throughout each school district. The report 18 card shall include the grade for the school, information regarding 19 school improvement, an explanation of school performance as 20 evaluated in accordance with the Elementary and Secondary Education 21 Act of 2001 (ESEA), P.L. No. 107-110, also known as the No Child 22 Left Behind Act of 2001, and indicators of return on investment. 23 The report card for each school site shall be published annually by 24 the Department on its website, and every school district shall

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1 provide the school site report card to the parent or guardian of 2 each student enrolled in the school site. 3 The Legislature may factor in the performance of schools in J. 4 calculating any performance-based funding policy that is provided to 5 public school districts. 6 Κ. The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules to 7 implement the provisions of this section. SECTION 2. This act shall become effective July 1, 2015. 8 9 SECTION 3.
