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14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
15	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 24-100.4, as
16	last amended by Section 1, Chapter 277, O.S.L. 2016 (70 O.S. Supp.
17	2020, Section 24-100.4), is amended to read as follows:
18	Section 24-100.4 A. Each district board of education shall
19	adopt a policy for the discipline of all children attending public
20	school in that district, and for the investigation of reported
21	incidents of bullying. The policy shall provide options for the
22	discipline of the students and shall define standards of conduct to
23	which students are expected to conform. The policy shall:
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Specifically address bullying by students at school and by
 electronic communication, if the communication is specifically
 directed at students or school personnel and concerns bullying at
 school;

2. Contain a procedure for reporting an act of bullying to a
school official or law enforcement agency, including a provision
that permits a person to report an act anonymously. No formal
disciplinary action shall be taken solely on the basis of an
anonymous report;

10 3. Contain a requirement that any school employee that has 11 reliable information that would lead a reasonable person to suspect 12 that a person is a target of bullying shall immediately report it to 13 the principal or a designee of the principal;

14 4. Contain a statement of how the policy is to be publicized 15 including a requirement that:

a. an annual written notice of the policy be provided to
 parents, guardians, staff, volunteers and students,
 with age-appropriate language for students,

b. notice of the policy be posted at various locations
within each school site, including but not limited to
cafeterias, school bulletin boards, and administration
offices,

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- c. the policy be posted on the Internet website for the
 school district and each school site that has an
 Internet website, and

- d. the policy be included in all student and employee handbooks;

5. Require that appropriate school district personnel involved
in investigating reports of bullying make a determination regarding
whether the conduct is actually occurring;

9 6. Contain a procedure for providing timely notification to the 10 parents or guardians of a victim of documented and verified bullying 11 and to the parents or guardians of the perpetrator of the documented 12 and verified bullying;

13 7. Identify by job title the school official responsible for14 enforcing the policy;

15 8. Contain procedures for reporting to law enforcement all 16 documented and verified acts of bullying which may constitute 17 criminal activity or reasonably have the potential to endanger 18 school safety;

9. Require annual training for administrators and school employees as developed and provided by the State Department of Education in preventing, identifying, responding to and reporting incidents of bullying;

23 10. Provide for an educational program as designed and
24 developed by the State Department of Education and in consultation

with the Office of Juvenile Affairs for students and parents in preventing, identifying, responding to and reporting incidents of bullying;

4 11. Establish a procedure for referral of a person who commits
5 an act of bullying to a delinquency prevention and diversion program
6 administered by the Office of Juvenile Affairs;

- 7 12. Address prevention by providing:
- 8 a. consequences and remedial action for a person who
 9 commits an act of bullying,
- consequences and remedial action for a student found 10 b. 11 to have falsely accused another as a means of 12 retaliation, reprisal or as a means of bullying, and 13 a strategy for providing counseling or referral to с. 14 appropriate services, including guidance, academic 15 intervention, and other protection for students, both 16 targets and perpetrators, and family members affected 17 by bullying, as necessary;
- 18 13. Establish a procedure for:

a. the investigation, determination and documentation of all incidents of bullying reported to school officials,

b. identifying the principal or a designee of the
 principal as the person responsible for investigating
 incidents of bullying,

1 reporting the number of incidents of bullying, and с. determining the severity of the incidents and their d. potential to result in future violence;

4 14. Establish a procedure whereby, upon completing an 5 investigation of bullying, a school may recommend that available community mental health care, substance abuse or other counseling 6 7 options be provided to the student, if appropriate; and

15. Establish a procedure whereby a school may request the 8 9 disclosure of any information concerning students who have received 10 mental health, substance abuse, or other care pursuant to paragraph 11 14 of this subsection that indicates an explicit threat to the 12 safety of students or school personnel, provided the disclosure of 13 the information does not violate the requirements and provisions of 14 the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, the Health 15 Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, Section 2503 16 of Title 12 of the Oklahoma Statutes, Section 1376 of Title 59 of 17 the Oklahoma Statutes, or any other state or federal laws regarding 18 the disclosure of confidential information.

19 In developing the policy, the district board of education в. 20 shall make an effort to involve the teachers, parents, 21 administrators, school staff, school volunteers, community 22 representatives, local law enforcement agencies and students. The 23 students, teachers, and parents or guardian of every child residing 24 within a school district shall be notified by the district board of

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education of its adoption of the policy and shall receive a copy upon request. The school district policy shall be implemented in a manner that is ongoing throughout the school year and is integrated with other violence prevention efforts.

5 C. The teacher of a child attending a public school shall have 6 the same right as a parent or guardian to control and discipline 7 such child according to district policies during the time the child 8 is in attendance or in transit to or from the school or any other 9 school function authorized by the school district or classroom 10 presided over by the teacher.

11 D. Except concerning students on individualized education plans 12 (IEP) pursuant to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act 13 (IDEA), P.L. No. 101-476, the State Board of Education shall not 14 have authority to prescribe student disciplinary policies for school 15 districts or to proscribe corporal punishment in the public schools. 16 The State Board of Education shall not have authority to require 17 school districts to file student disciplinary action reports more 18 often than once each year and shall not use disciplinary action 19 reports in determining a school district's or school site's 20 eligibility for program assistance including competitive grants.

E. <u>1.</u> The board of education of each school district in this state shall have the option of adopting a dress code for students enrolled in the school district. The board of education of a school district shall also have the option of adopting a dress code which

1	includes school uniforms. Any board of education which adopts a
2	dress code for students shall ensure the dress code has a reasonable
3	connection with the educational function entrusted to the school
4	board. The dress code shall prohibit race discrimination based on
5	natural hair or hairstyles. The dress code shall not discriminate
6	against a student's hair color; hair length; headwear, including but
7	not limited to headwraps, durags or scarves; religious headwear,
8	including but not limited to hijabs or niqabs; or any other
9	hairstyle or headwear that is directly tied to the cultural, ethnic
10	or religious identity of a student.
11	2. As used in this subsection:
12	a. "race" includes, but is not limited to, ancestry,
13	color, ethnic group identification and ethnic
14	background, including traits historically associated
15	with race including but not limited to hair texture
16	and protective hairstyles, and
17	b. "protective hairstyles" includes, but is not limited
18	to, braids, locks and twists.
19	F. The board of education of each school district in this state
20	shall have the option of adopting a procedure that requires students
21	to perform campus-site service for violating the district's policy.
22	G. The State Board of Education shall:
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1	1. Promulgate rules for periodically monitoring school
2	districts for compliance with this section and providing sanctions
3	for noncompliance with this section;
4	2. Establish and maintain a central repository for the
5	collection of information regarding documented and verified
6	incidents of bullying; and
7	3. Publish a report annually on the State Department of
8	Education website regarding the number of documented and verified
9	incidents of bullying in the public schools in the state.
10	SECTION 2. This act shall become effective November 1, 2021.
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
