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13	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
14	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 1210.508F,
15	is amended to read as follows:
16	Section 1210.508F A. The State Board of Education shall ensure
17	that the reading competencies for elementary teachers are included
18	in the competencies for special education teachers.
19	B. The State Board of Education and the Oklahoma Commission for
20	Teacher Preparation Educational Quality and Accountability in
21	collaboration with the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education
22	shall ensure that all teachers of early childhood education,
23	elementary education, and special education are provided quality
24	training in intervention, instruction, and remediation strategies in

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order to meet the needs of students in kindergarten through third grade who are determined to be at risk of reading difficulties. Ιn addition, quality training shall be provided in multisensory structured language teaching methods in order to meet the needs of students identified as having dyslexia. Quality training shall incorporate the standards of the International Dyslexia Association's guidelines as such are defined in the specific materials created for the purpose of identifying the reading disability dyslexia within the association's research entitled "Dyslexia in the Classroom - what every teacher needs to know".

- c. Beginning with the 2010-2011 school year, all All institutions within The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education that offer elementary, early childhood education, or special education programs approved by the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation Educational Quality and Accountability shall incorporate into those programs the requirement that teacher candidates study the five elements of reading instruction which are phonemic awareness, phonics, reading fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. In addition, teacher candidates shall study multisensory structured teaching methods proven effective for students with dyslexia.
- D. Effective July 1, 2010, teacher candidates enrolled in an institution within The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education in an elementary, early childhood education, or special education program approved by the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation

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    Educational Quality and Accountability shall pass, prior to
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    graduation, a comprehensive assessment to measure their teaching
    skills in the area of reading instruction. The assessment shall be
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    developed and administered by the institutions that offer
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    elementary, early childhood education, or special education programs
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    that lead to certification. The assessment shall measure the
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    knowledge and understanding of the teacher candidate in the teaching
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    of the five elements of reading instruction which are phonemic
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    awareness, phonics, reading fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension.
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    The results of the assessment shall be reported annually by the
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    institution to the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation
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    Educational Quality and Accountability as a part of the required
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    annual report for the institution. The Commission shall include the
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    data in the annual report to the Oklahoma Legislature as required
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    pursuant to Section 6-186 of this title. It is the intent of the
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    Legislature to ensure that teachers graduating from institutions
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    within The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education have the
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    knowledge and skills to effectively teach reading to all children.
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        SECTION 2. This act shall become effective July 1, 2017.
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        SECTION 3. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
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    of the public peace, health or safety, an emergency is hereby
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declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
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    be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
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
