13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

There is hereby appropriated to the State Board of SECTION 1. 14 Education from any monies not otherwise appropriated from the 15 General Revenue Fund of the State Treasury for the fiscal year 16 beginning July 1, 2023, the sum of Five Hundred Million Dollars 17 (\$500,000,000.00) for the financial support of public schools. 18 These monies shall be used to implement the provisions of Section 2 19 20 of this act and to provide student supports. Monies appropriated pursuant to this section shall not be used to provide a bonus or 21 salary increase to an administrator, as defined by Section 6-101.3 22 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes. 23

1 SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 2 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 18-114.15 of Title 70, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: 3 A. If a school district intends to provide retirement benefits to a teacher such that the teacher's salary would be less than the 6 amounts set forth in the minimum salary schedule specified in 7 subsection A of this section, the district shall be required to 8 9 provide written notification to the teacher prior to his or her 10 employment or, if already employed by the district, no later than thirty (30) days prior to the date the district elects to provide 11 12 retirement benefits such that the teacher's salary would be less than the minimum salary schedule. 13

Any of the degrees referred to in this section shall be from С. 14 a college recognized by the State Board of Education. The Board 15 shall accept teaching experience from out-of-state school districts 16 that are accredited by the State Board of Education or appropriate 17 state accrediting agency for the districts. The Board shall accept 18 teaching experience from out-of-country schools that are accredited 19 or otherwise endorsed by the appropriate national or regional 20 accrediting or endorsement authority. Out-of-country certification 21 documentation in a language other than English shall be analyzed by 22 an educational credential evaluation service in accordance with 23 industry standards and guidelines and approved by the State 24

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Department of Education. The person seeking to have credit granted for out-of-country teaching experience shall be responsible for all costs of the analysis by a credential evaluation service. The Board shall accept teaching experience from primary and secondary schools that are operated by the United States Department of Defense or are affiliated with the United States Department of State.

D. For the purpose of state salary increments and retirement, no teacher shall be granted credit for more than five (5) years of active duty in the military service or out-of-state or out-ofcountry teaching experience as a certified teacher or its equivalent. Nothing in this section shall prohibit boards of education from crediting more years of experience on district salary schedules than those allowed for state purposes.

E. The State Board of Education shall recognize, for purposes of certification and salary increments, all the years of experience of a:

Certified teacher who teaches in the educational program of
 the Department of Corrections, beginning with fiscal year 1981;

Vocational rehabilitation counselor under the Department of
 Human Services if the counselor was employed as a certified teacher
 by the State Department of Education when the Division of Vocational
 Rehabilitation was transferred from the State Board of Career and
 Technology Education or the State Board of Education to the Oklahoma
 Public Welfare Commission on July 1, 1968;

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3. Vocational rehabilitation counselor which were completed
 while employed by the Department of Human Services if such counselor
 was certified as a teacher or was eligible for certification as a
 teacher in Oklahoma;

4. Certified teacher which were completed while employed by the
Child Study Center located at University Hospital, if the teacher
was certified as a teacher in Oklahoma; and

5. Certified school psychologist or psychometrist which were completed while employed as a doctoral intern, psychological assistant, or psychologist with any agency of the State of Oklahoma if the experience primarily involved work with persons of school- or preschool-age and if the person was, at the time the experience was acquired, certified as, or eligible for certification as, a school psychologist or psychometrist.

F. The provisions of this section shall not apply to teachers who have entered into postretirement employment with a public school in Oklahoma and are still receiving a monthly retirement benefit.

G. If a person employed as certified personnel, as defined in Section 26-103 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes, by a school district during the 2022-2023 school year was receiving a salary above the step level indicated by the State Minimum Salary Schedule for the 2022-2023 school year, the person shall receive a salary increase amount equal to the amount indicated in subsection A for the step level indicated for the person, provided they remain

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employed by the same district, unless the hours or the duties of the
 certified personnel are reduced proportionately.

SECTION 3. There is hereby appropriated to the Rewarding Excellent Educators Revolving Fund created in Section 4 of this act from any monies not otherwise appropriated from the General Revenue Fund of the State Treasury for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, the sum of Thirty Million Dollars (\$30,000,000.00).

SECTION 4. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 18-126 of Title 70, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

There is hereby created in the State Treasury a revolving fund 12 for the State Board of Education to be designated the "Rewarding 13 Excellent Educators Revolving Fund". The fund shall be a continuing 14 fund, not subject to fiscal year limitations, and shall consist of 15 all monies received by the State Board of Education from state 16 appropriations. All monies accruing to the credit of the fund are 17 hereby appropriated and may be budgeted and expended by the State 18 Board of Education for the purpose of implementing the provisions of 19 Section 5 of this act. Expenditures from the fund shall be made 20 upon warrants issued by the State Treasurer against claims filed as 21 prescribed by law with the Director of the Office of Management and 22 Enterprise Services for approval and payment.

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1SECTION 5.NEW LAWA new section of law to be codified2in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 18-126.1 of Title 70, unless3there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

A. For the purposes of this act:

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1. "Eligible teacher" means a certified person employed on a
 full-time basis by a school district to serve as a teacher,
 supervisor, counselor, librarian, or certified or registered nurse;
 and

9 2. "Eligible support employee" means a full-time employee of a school district as determined by the standard period of labor which 10 is customarily understood to constitute full-time employment for the 11 type of services performed by the employee who is employed a minimum 12 of one hundred seventy-two (172) days and who provides those 13 services, not performed by professional educators or certified 14 teachers, which are necessary for the efficient and satisfactory 15 functioning of a school district and shall not include adult 16 education instructors or adult coordinators employed by technology 17 center school districts. 18

B. The State Department of Education shall create the Rewarding
Excellent Educators Grant Program for the purpose of providing grant
funds to school districts to implement qualitative bonus pay plans
for eligible teachers and eligible support employees.

C. To receive grant funds, a school district board of educationshall approve and submit to the State Department of Education a

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qualitative bonus pay plan to reward high-performing eligible teachers and eligible support employees. The plan shall include, but not be limited to, the following components:

Student growth, as defined by the school district board of
 education;

- 6 2. Peer evaluations;
- 7 3. Administrator evaluations;
- 8 4. Mentorship participation; and

9 5. Participation in extra responsibilities or duties.

D. The State Department of Education shall award grant funds to school districts from the Rewarding Excellent Educators Revolving Fund created in Section 4 of this act on a first-come, first-served basis until funds appropriated pursuant to Section 3 of this act are exhausted.

E. Grants awarded pursuant to this section shall be used to provide one-time bonuses to eligible teachers and eligible support employees. No more than ten percent (10%) of a school district's eligible teachers and eligible support employees may be provided one-time bonuses for the school year. No bonus shall exceed Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00).

21 SECTION 6. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 18-200.1, as 22 last amended by Section 2, Chapter 488, O.S.L. 2021, is amended to 23 read as follows:

1 Section 18-200.1. A. Beginning with the 2022-2023 school year, and each school year thereafter, each school district shall have its 2 initial allocation of State Aid calculated based on the state 3 dedicated revenues actually collected during the preceding fiscal 4 5 year, the adjusted assessed valuation of the preceding year, and the weighted average daily membership for the school district of the 6 preceding school year. Each school district shall submit the 7 following data based on the first nine (9) weeks, to be used in the 8 9 calculation of the average daily membership of the school district: 10 1. Student enrollment by grade level; Pupil category counts; and 11 2. 12 3. Transportation supplement data. On or before December 30, the State Department of Education 13 shall determine each school district's current year allocation 14 pursuant to subsection D of this section. The State Department of 15 Education shall complete an audit, using procedures established by 16 the Department, of the student enrollment by grade level data, pupil 17 category counts, and transportation supplement data to be used in 18 the State Aid Formula pursuant to subsection D of this section by 19 December 1 and by January 15 shall notify each school district of 20 the district's final State Aid allocation for the current school 21 year. The January payment of State Aid and each subsequent payment 22 for the remainder of the school year shall be based on the final 23 State Aid allocation as calculated in subsection D of this section. 24

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Except for reductions made due to the assessment of penalties by the State Department of Education according to law, the January payment of State Aid and each subsequent payment for the remainder of the school year shall not decrease by an amount more than the amount that the current chargeable revenue increases for that district.

The State Department of Education shall retain not less than 6 в. one and one-half percent (1 1/2%) of the total funds appropriated 7 for financial support of schools, to be used to make midyear 8 9 adjustments in State Aid and which shall be reflected in the final 10 allocations. If the amount of appropriated funds, including the one and one-half percent $(1 \ 1/2\%)$ retained, remaining after January 1 of 11 12 each year is not sufficient to fully fund the final allocations, the Department shall recalculate each school district's remaining 13 allocation pursuant to subsection D of this section using the 14 reduced amount of appropriated funds. 15

C. On and after July 1, 1997, the amount of State Aid each 16 district shall receive shall be the sum of the Foundation Aid, the 17 Salary Incentive Aid, and the Transportation Supplement, as adjusted 18 pursuant to the provisions of subsection G of this section and 19 Section 18-112.2 of this title; provided, no district having per 20 pupil revenue in excess of three hundred percent (300%) of the 21 average per pupil revenue of all districts shall receive any State 22 Aid or Supplement in State Aid. 23

The July calculation of per pupil revenue shall be determined by dividing the district's second preceding year's total weighted average daily membership (ADM) into the district's preceding year's total revenues excluding federal revenue, insurance loss payments, reimbursements, recovery of overpayments and refunds, unused reserves, prior expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses, and less the amount of any transfer fees paid in that year.

8 The December calculation of per pupil revenue shall be 9 determined by dividing the district's preceding year's total 10 weighted average daily membership (ADM) into the district's 11 preceding year's total revenues excluding federal revenue, insurance 12 loss payments, reimbursements, recovery of overpayments and refunds, 13 unused reserves, prior expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses, 14 and less the amount of any transfer fees paid in that year.

D. For the 1997-98 school year, and each school year thereafter, Foundation Aid, the Transportation Supplement, and Salary Incentive Aid shall be calculated as follows:

Foundation Aid shall be determined by subtracting the amount
 of the Foundation Program Income from the cost of the Foundation
 Program and adding to this difference the Transportation Supplement.

a. The Foundation Program shall be a district's higher
weighted average daily membership based on the first
nine (9) weeks of the current school year or the
preceding school year of a school district, as

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1 determined by the provisions of subsection A of Section 18-201.1 of this title and paragraphs 1, 2, 3, 2 and 4 of subsection B of Section 18-201.1 of this 3 title, multiplied by the Base Foundation Support 4 5 Level. However, for the portion of weighted membership derived from nonresident, transferred 6 pupils enrolled in online courses, the Foundation 7 Program shall be a district's weighted average daily 8 9 membership of the preceding school year or the first nine (9) weeks of the current school year, whichever 10 is greater, as determined by the provisions of 11 subsection A of Section 18-201.1 of this title and 12 paragraphs 1, 2, 3, and 4 of subsection B of Section 13 18-201.1 of this title, multiplied by the Base 14 Foundation Support Level. 15 The Foundation Program Income shall be the sum of the 16 b. following: 17

18 (1) The adjusted assessed valuation of the current
19 school year of the school district, minus the
20 previous year protested ad valorem tax revenues
21 held as prescribed in Section 2884 of Title 68 of
22 the Oklahoma Statutes, multiplied by the mills
23 levied pursuant to subsection (c) of Section 9 of
24 Article X of the Oklahoma Constitution, if

1 applicable, as adjusted in subsection (c) of Section 8A of Article X of the Oklahoma 2 Constitution. For purposes of this subsection, 3 the "adjusted assessed valuation of the current 4 5 school year" shall be the adjusted assessed valuation on which tax revenues are collected 6 during the current school year, and 7 (2) Seventy-five percent (75%) of the amount received 8 9 by the school district from the proceeds of the 10 county levy during the preceding fiscal year, as levied pursuant to subsection (b) of Section 9 of 11 12 Article X of the Oklahoma Constitution, and 13 (3) Motor Vehicle Collections motor vehicle collections, and 14 Gross Production Tax gross production tax, and 15 (4) State Apportionment state apportionment, and 16 (5) (6) R.E.A. Tax tax. 17 The items listed in divisions (3), (4), (5), and (6)18 of this subparagraph shall consist of the amounts 19 actually collected from such sources during the 20 preceding fiscal year calculated on a per capita basis 21 on the unit provided for by law for the distribution 22 of each such revenue. 23

shall be the Salary Incentive Aid of the district. By June 30, 1998, the State Department of Education shall 18 Ε. develop and the Department and all school districts shall have 19 implemented a student identification system which is consistent with 20 the provisions of subsections C and D of Section 3111 of Title 74 of 21 the Oklahoma Statutes. The student identification system shall be 22 used specifically for the purpose of reporting enrollment data by 23 school sites and by school districts, the administration of the 24

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1 Oklahoma School Testing Program Act, the collection of appropriate 2 and necessary data pursuant to the Oklahoma Educational Indicators Program, determining student enrollment, establishing a student 3 mobility rate, allocation of the State Aid Formula, and midyear 4 5 adjustments in funding for student growth. This enrollment data 6 shall be submitted to the State Department of Education in accordance with rules promulgated by the State Board of Education. 7 Funding for the development, implementation, personnel training, and 8 9 maintenance of the student identification system shall be set out in 10 a separate line item in the allocation section of the appropriation bill for the State Board of Education for each year. 11

12 F. 1. In the event that ad valorem taxes of a school district are determined to be uncollectible because of bankruptcy, clerical 13 error, or a successful tax protest, and the amount of such taxes 14 deemed uncollectible exceeds Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) or 15 an amount greater than twenty-five percent (25%) of ad valorem taxes 16 per tax year, or the valuation of a district is lowered by order of 17 the State Board of Equalization, the school district's State Aid, 18 for the school year that such ad valorem taxes are calculated in the 19 State Aid Formula, shall be determined by subtracting the net 20 assessed valuation of the property upon which taxes were deemed 21 uncollectible from the assessed valuation of the school district and 22 the state. Upon request of the local board of education, it shall 23 be the duty of the county assessor to certify to the Director of 24

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Finance of the State Department of Education the net assessed
 valuation of the property upon which taxes were determined
 uncollectible.

In the event that the amount of funds a school district 2. 4 5 receives for reimbursement from the Ad Valorem Reimbursement Fund is less than the amount of funds claimed for reimbursement by the 6 school district due to insufficiency of funds as provided in Section 7 193 of Title 62 of the Oklahoma Statutes, then the school district's 8 9 assessed valuation for the school year that such ad valorem reimbursement is calculated in the State Aid Formula shall be 10 adjusted accordingly. 11

G. 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 18-112.2 of this title, a school district shall have its State Aid reduced by an amount equal to the amount of carryover in the general fund of the district as of June 30 of the preceding fiscal year, that is in excess of the following standards for two (2) consecutive years:

By February 1 the State Department of Education shall send by certified mail, with return receipt requested, to each School 6 District Superintendent school district superintendent, Auditor 7 auditor, and Regional Accreditation Officer regional accreditation 8 9 officer a notice of and calculation sheet reflecting the general fund balance penalty to be assessed against that school district. 10 Calculation of the general fund balance penalty shall not include 11 federal revenue. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of this written 12 notice the school district shall submit to the Department a written 13 reply either accepting or protesting the penalty to be assessed 14 against the district. If a school district does not receive Foundation and/or 10 5. Salary Incentive Aid during the preceding fiscal year, the State 11 12 Board of Education may waive the penalty assessed in this subsection if the penalty would result in a loss of more than forty percent 13 (40%) of the remaining State Aid to be allocated to the school 14 district between April 1 and the remainder of the school year and if 15 the Board determines the penalty will cause the school district not 16 to meet remaining financial obligations. 17

6. Any school district which receives gross production revenue apportionment during the 2002-2003 school year or in any subsequent school year that is greater than the gross production revenue apportionment of the preceding school year shall be exempt from the penalty assessed in this subsection, if the penalty would occur solely as a result of the gross production revenue apportionment, as determined by the State Board of Education.

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7. Beginning July 1, 2003, school districts that participate in
 consolidation or annexation pursuant to the provisions of the
 Oklahoma School Voluntary Consolidation and Annexation Act shall be
 exempt from the penalty assessed in this subsection for the school
 year in which the consolidation or annexation occurs and for the
 next three (3) fiscal years.

8. Any school district which receives proceeds from a sales tax 7 levied by a municipality pursuant to Section 22-159 of Title 11 of 8 9 the Oklahoma Statutes or proceeds from a sales tax levied by a county pursuant to Section 1370 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes 10 during the 2003-2004 school year or the 2004-2005 school year shall 11 12 be exempt from the penalties assessed in this subsection, if the penalty would occur solely as a result of receiving funds from the 13 sales tax levy. 14

9. Any school district which has an amount of carryover in the general fund of the district in excess of the limits established in paragraph 1 of this subsection during the fiscal years beginning July 1, 2020, July 1, 2021, July 1, 2022, and July 1, 2023, shall not be assessed a general fund balance penalty as provided for in this subsection.

21 10. For purposes of calculating the general fund balance 22 penalty, the terms "carryover" and "general fund balance" shall not 23 include federal revenue.

1 Η. In order to provide startup funds for the implementation of early childhood programs, State Aid may be advanced to school 2 districts that initially start early childhood instruction at a 3 school site. School districts that desire such advanced funding 4 5 shall make application to the State Department of Education no later than September 15 of each year and advanced funding shall be awarded 6 to the approved districts no later than October 30. The advanced 7 funding shall not exceed the per pupil amount of State Aid as 8 9 calculated in subsection D of this section per anticipated Head 10 Start eligible student. The total amount of advanced funding shall be proportionately reduced from the monthly payments of the 11 12 district's State Aid payments during the last six (6) months of the 13 same fiscal year.

I. 1. Beginning July 1, 1996, the Oklahoma Tax Commission, notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, shall report monthly to the State Department of Education the monthly apportionment of the following information:

21 d. gross productions tax collected.

Beginning July 1, 1997, the State Auditor and Inspector's
 Office, notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, shall

report monthly to the State Department of Education the monthly

5. The information reported by the Tax Commission, the State Auditor and Inspector's Office, the county treasurers' offices, and the Commissioners of the Land Office, pursuant to this subsection shall be reported by school district on forms developed by the State Department of Education.

16SECTION 7.AMENDATORY70 O.S. 2021, Section 18-201.1, is17amended to read as follows:

Beginning with the 2020-21 school year, and each school year thereafter, the weighted membership of a school district for calculation of Foundation Aid purposes pursuant to paragraph 1 of subsection D of Section 18-200.1 of this title shall be the sum of the weighted pupil grade level calculation, the weighted pupil category calculation, the weighted district calculation, and the weighted teacher experience and degree

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1 calculation. The weighted membership of a school district for
2 calculation of Salary Incentive Aid purposes pursuant to paragraph 3
3 of subsection D of Section 18-200.1 of this title shall be the sum
4 of the weighted pupil grade level calculation, the weighted pupil
5 category calculation, the weighted district calculation, and the
6 weighted teacher experience and degree calculation.

Beginning with the 2022-2023 school year, the weighted 7 Β. calculations provided for in subsection A of this section shall be 8 9 based on the higher weighted average daily membership of the first nine (9) weeks of the current school year or the preceding school 10 year of a school district, unless otherwise specified. The higher 11 12 of the two (2) weighted average daily memberships shall be used consistently in all of the calculations; however, the weighted 13 calculation for a statewide virtual charter school experiencing a 14 significant decline in membership shall be based on the first nine 15 (9) weeks of the current school year for the statewide virtual 16 charter school. For purposes of this subsection, "significant 17 decline in membership" means equal to or greater than a fifteen 18 percent (15%) decrease in average daily membership from the 19 preceding school year to the average daily membership of the first 20 nine (9) weeks of the current school year. The average daily 21 membership data used for all calculations in paragraphs 1, 2, 3, and 22 4 of this subsection shall be the same as used in the calculation of 23

the State Aid Formula. The weighted calculations provided for in
 subsection A of this section shall be determined as follows:

Except as otherwise provided, multiply the number of pupils 11 12 approved in the school year with the highest average daily 13 membership in each category by the weight assigned to such category and add the totals together to determine the weighted pupil category 14 calculation for a school district. For the 1997-98 school year and 15 subsequent school years, the number to be multiplied by the weight 16 17 assigned to the gifted category in subparagraph g of this paragraph shall be the lesser of (1) the sum of the number of students who 18 scored in the top three percent (3%) on any national standardized 19 test of intellectual ability plus the number of students identified 20 as gifted pursuant to subparagraphs a through d of paragraph 1 of 21 Section 1210.301 of this title, or (2) the sum of the number of 22 students who scored in the top three percent (3%) on any national 23 standardized test of intellectual ability plus eight percent (8%) of 24

The weighted district calculation shall be determined by 4 determining the calculations for each school district for both the 5 small school district formula and the district sparsity - isolation 6 formula, applying whichever is the greater of the calculations of 7 the two formulas and then applying the restrictions pursuant to 8 subparagraph c of this paragraph.

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a. Small school district formula: 529 minus the average daily membership divided by 529 times .2 times total average daily membership.

12 The small school district formula calculation shall apply only to school districts whose highest average daily 13 membership is less than 529 pupils. School districts which 14 are consolidated or annexed after July 1, 2003, pursuant to 15 the Oklahoma School Voluntary Consolidation and Annexation 16 Act shall have the weighted district size calculation for 17 the three (3) school years following the fiscal year in 18 which such consolidation occurred calculated to be the sum 19 of the individual consolidated districts computed as if the 20 consolidation had not taken place. Provided, that the additional square miles 16 allowed for geographical barriers shall not exceed thirty percent 17 (30%) of the district's actual size. 18

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collections for the preceding year of state apportionment, motor vehicle revenue, gross production tax<u>,</u> and R.E.A. tax.

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The December calculation of the projected per pupil 4 5 revenue shall be determined by dividing the higher of the district's first nine (9) weeks of the current 6 school year or the preceding school year's average 7 daily membership (ADM) as weighted by the pupil grade 8 9 level, the pupil category, the district and the teacher experience degree index calculations for 10 projected State Aid into the district's projected 11 12 total revenues including funds for the December calculation of the current year State Aid Formula, net 13 assessed valuation for the current calendar year times 14 thirty-nine (39) mills, county revenues excluding the 15 county four-mills revenue for the preceding year, 16 other state appropriations for the preceding year, and 17 the collections for the preceding year of state 18 apportionment, motor vehicle revenue, gross production 19 20 tax, and R.E.A. tax.

The district's projected total revenues for each calculation shall exclude the following collections for the second preceding year: federal revenue, insurance loss payments, reimbursements, recovery of 1 overpayments and refunds, unused reserves, prior expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses, and other local miscellaneous revenues. 3

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The weighted teacher experience and degree calculation shall 4 4. 5 be determined in accordance with the teacher experience and degree The State Department of Education shall determine an index 6 index. for each state teacher by using data supplied in the school 7 district's teacher personnel reports of the preceding year and 8 9 utilizing the index as follows:

The school district teacher index for each school district shall 19 be determined by subtracting the weighted average state teacher from 20 the weighted average district teacher. Multiply the school district 21 teacher index if greater than zero by .7 and then multiply that 22 product by the sum of the district's weighted pupil grade level 23 calculation provided in paragraph 1 of this subsection and the 24

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weighted pupil category calculation provided in subparagraph m of paragraph 2 of this subsection to determine the weighted teacher experience and degree calculation.
