7	An Act relating to contracts; creating the Grocery
8	Store Checkout Station Act; declaring legislative findings; defining terms; providing restriction on
9	the number of self-service checkout stations; implementing traditional checkout station
10	requirement; providing discount to customers; proscribing conduct when a customer is accused of
11	theft; providing the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry the power to enforce
12	restrictions; implementing severability clause; providing for noncodification; providing for
13	codification; and providing an effective date.
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16	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
17	SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law not to be
18	codified in the Oklahoma Statutes reads as follows:
19	The Legislature finds and declares that:
20	1. Self-service checkout stations essentially turn customers
21	into unpaid employees and allows grocery store retailers to decrease
22	labor costs and actual customer service;
23	2. The general public is untrained, therefore self-service
24	checkout machines shall first be investigated for failures or

malfunctions before customers are arrested and/or charged with misdemeanor or felony theft;

- 3. Some groceries have multiple barcodes or barcodes that do not scan properly at a self-service checkout station. Certain groceries, including produce and meat, typically need to be weighed and manually entered into the self-checkout machine using a code provided to the customer on a small sticker. There is great potential for a customer to accidentally type in the wrong code by accident;
- 4. Self-service checkout stations require grocery stores to heavily rely on part-time employees, positions which do not provide retail workers with a living wage or access to benefits;
- 5. Self-service checkout stations contribute to retail workers feeling devalued and adds efficiency pressures on workers; and
- 6. Grocery stores allow longer lines at traditional checkout stations staffed by an employee to encourage customers to use the self-service checkout stations.
- SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1030 of Title 15, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Grocery Store Checkout Station Act".

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SECTION 3. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1031 of Title 15, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

As used in the Grocery Store Checkout Station Act:

- 1. "Groceries" means:
 - a. any raw or processed food or beverage intended for human consumption. For the purpose of this definition, groceries does not include alcoholic beverages,
 - b. prescription and over-the-counter drugs and related personal care and hygiene items when sold by a retailer that also sells food and beverages, or
 - c. miscellaneous household maintenance items such as laundry detergent and dishwashing soap, when sold by a retailer that also sells food and beverages;
- 2. "Grocery store" means a business in the State of Oklahoma that earns the majority of its gross income from the retail sale of groceries;
- 3. "Retail sale" means the sale of groceries to a consumer for use or consumption, and not for the purpose of resale;
- 4. "Self-service checkout station" means a designated area where customers use a machine or device, typically with a touchscreen interface or barcode scanner, that allows the customer

to independently scan, bag, and pay for their groceries without the assistance of an employee of the grocery store; and

5. "Traditional checkout station" means a designated area at a grocery store where an employee of the grocery store scans the groceries selected by the customer, places them in a bag for the customer's convenience, and handles the payment transaction. The purpose of a traditional checkout station is to facilitate a smooth and efficient process for customers to complete their purchases.

SECTION 4. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1032 of Title 15, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

Grocery stores with self-service checkout stations shall have a minimum of one (1) traditional checkout station available at all times per each self-service checkout station.

SECTION 5. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1033 of Title 15, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

Grocery stores shall provide the customer a twenty percent (20%) discount on groceries when the customer uses a self-service checkout station to complete his or her payment transaction. For the purposes of this section, the customer is to receive the twenty percent (20%) discount regardless of whether the customer required employee assistance at the self-checkout station to complete his or her payment transaction.

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SECTION 6. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1034 of Title 15, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

If a grocery store employee accuses a customer of theft then an arrest shall not be made or any further transactions attempted at the self-service checkout station where the accused customer completed his or her transaction until the mechanic of the machine conducts an examination of the self-service checkout machine for malfunctions.

- SECTION 7. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1035 of Title 15, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:
- A. The Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry shall have primary authority to enforce the restrictions of this act.
- B. The Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry shall enact rules as necessary to implement this act, including a penalty matrix that imposes increasing fines for multiple violations made by the same grocery store at different locations.
- C. Any Oklahoma resident may file a complaint with the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry alleging a violation of this act, free from fear of retaliation.

- D. Any employee alleging retaliation by his or her employer for making a complaint alleging violations of this act may bring a cause of action in district court.
- E. Any Oklahoma consumer alleging a violation of this act may file a complaint with the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry.
- SECTION 8. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1036 of Title 15, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

If any one or more provisions, sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or words of this act or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is found to be unconstitutional, the same is hereby declared to be severable and the balance of this act shall remain effective notwithstanding such unconstitutionality. The Legislature hereby declares that it would have passed this act, and each provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or word thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more provisions, sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or words be declared unconstitutional.

SECTION 9. This act shall become effective November 1, 2024.

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
