11	A Concurrent Resolution recognizing May as Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month; recognizing
12	the Asian American and Pacific Islander community in Oklahoma; and celebrating the contributions of Asian
13	Americans and Pacific Islanders to the history of Oklahoma and the United States.
14	Oklanoma and the onited states.
15	
16	WHEREAS, May is recognized by the United States Congress as
17	Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month, honoring the contributions
18	and paying tribute to generations of Asian Americans and Pacific
19	Islanders (AAPI) who have made our state and nation their home; and
20	WHEREAS, Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month is celebrated in
21	May to commemorate the immigration of the first Japanese to the
22	United States in May of 1843; and

WHEREAS, May also marks the anniversary of the completion of the
transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869. The majority of those
who laid the tracks were Chinese immigrants; and

WHEREAS, the Chinese were the first Asian group to settle in Oklahoma, living in the Guthrie Territory after the Land Run of 1889; and

7 WHEREAS, the Japanese population quickly grew in Oklahoma in the 8 1920s and '40s, and during World War II, several fought for the 9 United States including four sons of Kutaro Nishimuta, a farmer in 10 Payne County. His sons served in the U.S. Army 442nd Regimental 11 Unit, an all-Japanese outfit and one of the most decorated units in 12 the war; and

WHEREAS, nearly three percent of all Oklahomans identify as Asian American or Pacific Islander, citing origins in Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, Vietnam, Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands; and

WHEREAS, Oklahoma City is home to "Little Saigon", the Asian District made up of the state's largest population of Asian descendants, predominately Vietnamese. Visitors flock to the district each year to experience the international cuisine, culture, and shopping; and

WHEREAS, Asian American and Pacific Islander citizens have made
a tremendous impact on our state and nation, serving in vital roles

1	as state and national leaders, starting businesses, making
2	breakthroughs in science and technology, serving in our military,
3	excelling in sports, arts, education, and more.
4	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
5	OF THE 1ST SESSION OF THE 59TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE, THE SENATE
6	CONCURRING THEREIN:
7	THAT the month of May is recognized by the Oklahoma State
8	Legislature as Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month.
9	THAT the Oklahoma Legislature recognizes the contributions of
10	Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders to the history of Oklahoma and
11	the United States.
