1 STATE OF OKLAHOMA 2 1st Session of the 55th Legislature (2015) 3 HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 1012 By: Scott 4 5 6 7 AS INTRODUCED 8 A Concurrent Resolution memorializing Congress to oppose the Trans-Pacific Partnership; making findings 9 regarding potential adverse consequences of the Trans-Pacific Partnership; requesting Congress to 10 deny Trade Promotion Authority; and directing distribution. 11 12 13 WHEREAS, the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) would create 14 international laws and regulations which have the potential to 15 supersede United States laws and regulations concerning matters such 16 as homeland security, intellectual property and copyrights, labor 17 and wages, food safety, the Internet, military, environment and 18 national security; and 19 WHEREAS, the TPP would create international tribunals whose 20 rulings could conflict with judgments rendered by the highest courts 21 of the state and federal governments contrary to the interests of 22 consumers, employers, employees and all residents in Oklahoma and

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throughout the United States; and

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WHEREAS, the TPP could have an adverse impact on the Oklahoma and United States economy; and

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WHEREAS, the TPP's over 1,000 pages of international laws and regulations have the potential to cause complications for trade and commerce by businesses and consumers in Oklahoma and throughout the United States and could interfere with concepts of free trade rather than promoting it; and

WHEREAS, although the United States Constitution (Article 1, Section 8) grants exclusive power to Congress "to regulate commerce with foreign nations," the President has secretly negotiated the TPP for several years without congressional involvement or oversight; and

WHEREAS, although the TPP is over 1,000 pages, and has been unavailable for review, the President has requested Trade Promotion Authority (TPA) to "fast track" the TPP by limiting Congressional debate and prohibiting congressional amendments, contrary to the responsibility of Congress "to regulate commerce with foreign nations."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

OF THE 1ST SESSION OF THE 55TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE, THE SENATE

CONCURRING THEREIN:

THAT Congress should not grant Trade Promotion Authority to the President.

THAT Congress should not approve the Trans-Pacific Partnership.

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THAT Congress should direct the President to withdraw from and cease Trans-Pacific Partnership membership and negotiations or request that the President and the Executive Office of the President, including the United States Trade Representative, to conduct the negotiations in keeping with the requirements of the United States Constitution and with the primary goal of protecting the citizens of the United States as well as protecting the business interests of United States business enterprises.

THAT copies of this resolution be distributed to the Office of the President of the United States, the Office of the United States

Trade Representative, the United States Secretary of State and to each member of the Oklahoma Congressional Delegation.

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
