17	the National Center for Education Statistics; directing the State Board of Education to report
18	whether expenditures have reached certain level by certain date; amending 70 O.S. 2011, Section 3-167,
19	as last amended by Section 2, Chapter 253, O.S.L. 2016 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 3-167), which
20	relates to advisory councils; modifying circumstances under which school districts are exempt from certain
	advisory council requirements; directing certain prohibition to cease once per-pupil expenditures are

1 111), which relates to textbook adoption; modifying circumstances under which school districts are exempt 2 from certain textbook adoption requirements; directing certain prohibition to cease once per-pupil 3 expenditures are equal to or more than certain regional average expenditure as reported by the 4 National Center for Education Statistics; directing the State Board of Education to report whether 5 expenditures have reached certain level by certain date; providing an effective date; and declaring an 6 emergency. 7 8 9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA: 10 SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 3-104.4, as 11 last amended by Section 27, Chapter 42, O.S.L. 2017 (70 O.S. Supp. 12 2018, Section 3-104.4), is amended to read as follows: 13 Section 3-104.4. A. On or before February 1, 1991, the State 14 Board of Education shall adopt standards for the accreditation of 15 the public schools in this state according to the requirements of 16 this act, to be effective as set forth in this act. The 17 accreditation standards shall incorporate the curricular standards 18 established pursuant to Section 11-103.6 of this title. The 19 accreditation standards shall equal or exceed the accreditation 20 standards for schools promulgated by the North Central Association 21 of Colleges and Schools to the extent that the standards are 22 consistent with an academic results oriented approach to 23 accreditation, excluding those standards which deal with affective 24 behavior to the extent the adoption of the standards does not _ _

¹ conflict with state statute. The accreditation adopted by the State ² Board shall encompass accreditation for elementary schools, middle ³ schools, junior high schools, and high schools. The accreditation ⁴ standards shall be made available for public inspection at the ⁵ offices of the State Department of Education.

6 Β. Standards for accreditation adopted by the State Board of 7 Education shall include standards relating to the provision of 8 school counselors to the public school children of this state. The 9 State Board of Education shall require each local school district to 10 provide information regarding the number of counselors serving each 11 school site, the duties of all such counselors including all 12 administrative duties, the number of students served by each 13 counselor, and information regarding the number of counselors 14 employed per elementary school, middle school, junior high school 15 and high school.

16 C. Except as otherwise provided by subsection A of this section 17 with regard to curricular standards, as a condition of receiving 18 state accreditation pursuant to this act:

19 1. High schools shall meet the accreditation standards not 20 later than June 30, 1995; and

21 2. Elementary, middle and junior high schools shall meet the 22 accreditation standards not later than June 30, 1999.

Schools shall thereafter continue to meet the accreditation
standards as a condition of continued accreditation. Nothing herein

¹ shall be construed as preventing changes to the adopted standards by ² the State Board of Education pursuant to the Administrative ³ Procedures Act.

D. If one or more school sites fails to receive accreditation
as required pursuant to this section by the dates set forth in
subsection C of this section or subsequently loses accreditation,
the State Board of Education shall close the school and reassign the
students to accredited schools within the district or shall annex
the district to one or more other districts in which the students
can be educated in accredited schools.

11 Standards for accreditation adopted by the State Board of Ε. 12 Education shall include standards relating to the provision of 13 educational services provided in partial hospitalization programs, 14 day treatment programs, day hospital programs, residential treatment 15 programs and emergency shelter programs for persons between the ages 16 of three (3) and twenty-one (21) years of age. The accreditation 17 standards shall apply to onsite and offsite educational services 18 provided by public school districts or state-accredited private 19 The accreditation standards shall provide for warnings, schools. 20 probation or nonaccredited status for schools that fail to meet the 21 standards. Each school which is providing or is required to provide 22 educational services for students placed in a program as described 23 in this subsection shall be actively monitored by the State 24 Department of Education. The Department shall determine on an _ _

1 ongoing basis if the educational program and services are in 2 compliance with the accreditation standards. The Department shall 3 investigate a complaint of failure to provide educational services 4 within ten (10) days of receiving the complaint. If the Department 5 determines that a school has failed to comply with the accreditation 6 standards the Department shall report the recommended warning, 7 probation or nonaccredited accreditation status to the State Board 8 of Education within sixty (60) days. If a school does not take 9 action to comply with the accreditation standards within ninety (90) 10 days after a report is filed by the Department, the Board shall 11 withdraw accreditation for the school.

F. State Board accreditation regulations shall provide for warnings and for assistance to schools and school districts whenever there is reason to believe a school is in danger of losing its state accreditation.

16 G. The State Board shall provide assistance to districts in 17 considering the possibility of meeting accreditation requirements 18 through the use of nontraditional means of instruction. The State 19 Board shall also assist districts in forming cooperatives and making 20 arrangements for the use of satellite instruction or other 21 instructional technologies to the extent that use of such 22 instructional means meets accreditation standards.

H. 1. Accreditation shall not be withdrawn from or denied nor shall a penalty be assessed against a school or school district for

¹ failing to meet the media materials and equipment standards and ² media program expenditure standards as set forth in the ³ accreditation standards adopted by the Board.

4 2. The provisions of paragraph 1 of this subsection shall cease 5 to be effective during a fiscal year immediately following a fiscal 6 year that the state financial support of public schools provides an 7 amount once state per-pupil expenditures are equal to or more than 8 Three Thousand Two Hundred Ninety-one Dollars and sixty cents 9 (\$3,291.60) per weighted average daily membership as calculated 10 pursuant to Section 18-200.1 of this title and reported to school 11 districts by the State Department of Education on the initial 12 tentative State Aid allocation notice the regional average 13 expenditure per pupil in average daily attendance in public 14 elementary and secondary schools for the most current year for which 15 data is available, as reported by the National Center for Education 16 Statistics annually in the Digest of Education Statistics and funds 17 are provided. 8 cease to be effective and the provisions of paragraph 1 of this

I. 1. The State Board shall not assess a financial penalty against any school district which is given a deficiency in accreditation status during any fiscal year as provided for in this subsection.

14 2. 22	SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 3-167, as
23	last amended by Section 2, Chapter 253, O.S.L. 2016 (70 O.S. Supp.
24 27	2018, Section 3-167), is amended to read as follows:

Section 3-167. A. 1. The State Board of Education shall exempt all school districts from or waive any policy, rule or law which requires school districts to form, convene, or participate in any advisory council or committee, including but not limited to the requirement to convene an advisory council when preparing the school improvement plan as set forth in Section 5-117.4 of this title.

7 2. The provisions of paragraph 1 of this subsection shall cease 8 to be effective during a fiscal year immediately following a fiscal 9 year that the state financial support of public schools provides an 10 amount once state per-pupil expenditures are equal to or more than 11 Three Thousand Two Hundred Ninety-one Dollars and sixty cents 12 (\$3,291.60) per weighted average daily membership as calculated 13 pursuant to Section 18-200.1 of this title and reported to school 14 districts by the State Department of Education on the initial 15 tentative State Aid allocation notice the regional average 16 expenditure per pupil in average daily attendance in public 17 elementary and secondary schools for the most current year for which 18 data is available, as reported by the National Center for Education 19 Statistics annually in the Digest of Education Statistics and funds 20 are provided. If the amount set and calculated as provided for in 6 paragraph 2 of this subsection is reduced by one percent (1%) or 7 more as reported to school districts by the Department on the 8 initial tentative State Aid allocation notice for the following 9 fiscal year, the provisions of paragraph 2 of this subsection shall 10 cease to be effective and the provisions of paragraph 1 of this 11 subsection shall continue to be effective. 12 School districts shall not be exempted from forming, Β. 13 convening or participating in an advisory council or committee if 14 required by federal law or regulation. 15 SECTION 3. 70 O.S. 2011, Section 16-111, as AMENDATORY 16 last amended by Section 3, Chapter 253, O.S.L. 2016 (70 O.S. Supp. 17 2018, Section 16-111), is amended to read as follows: 18 Section 16-111. A. Except as otherwise provided for in 19 subsection E of this section, the superintendent of schools of each 20 school district in the state shall appoint a local textbook 21 committee consisting of not fewer than three nor more than nine 22 members. Each committee shall have one lay member, with the 23 remainder of the members being teachers employed in the public 24 schools of the district, a majority of whom shall be classroom _ _

¹ teachers. The superintendent of schools or a designee who shall be ² a principal or a curriculum specialist shall serve as chairperson of ³ the local textbook committee.

4 B. Upon the written request of any duly appointed local 5 textbook coordinator, the publisher of a textbook selected by the 6 State Textbook Committee shall furnish at least one examination copy 7 of the textbook and the teacher edition of the textbook, if one is 8 published, and a copy of software for purposes of complete 9 demonstration and review, if available, to the school district so 10 that the local textbook committee may examine any or all new 11 adoptions in the subjects taught or to be taught in schools in the 12 district.

13 C. Except as otherwise provided for in subsection E of this 14 section, on or before a date to be fixed by the State Board of 15 Education, each local textbook committee shall adopt textbooks from 16 the multiple list selected by the State Textbook Committee in a 17 manner as shall be prescribed by the State Board of Education. Each 18 local textbook committee shall serve without compensation and shall 19 cease to exist when local adoptions have been completed and shall be 20 replaced by another local textbook committee appointed in the same 21 manner as provided for in this section.

D. Except as otherwise provided for in subsection E of this section, on or before a date to be fixed by the State Board of Education, the superintendent of each school district shall submit

1 to the State Board of Education a textbook plan outlining the 2 estimated number of textbooks needed by the school district and the 3 total amount of money to be expended by the district for textbooks 4 including the allocated funds and any additional supplemental funds 5 to be expended. The superintendent or textbook coordinator 6 appointed by the superintendent, shall place orders from the proper 7 depository or depositories for all of the textbooks needed as 8 outlined in the textbook plan by the district for the ensuing year. 9 The superintendent of a school district or textbook coordinator may 10 order any textbooks placed on the official multiple textbook list. 11 If the order exceeds the allocation for each school district as 12 provided in Section 16-114a of this title any additional funds 13 expended shall be reported on the statement of expenditures for the 14 district.

E. 1. If a school district makes the election as provided for in subsection B of Section 16-114a of this title, the district shall not be required to appoint a local textbook committee, adopt textbooks, submit a textbook plan, or expend money on the purchase of textbooks during any fiscal year as provided for in this subsection.

5	of the public peace, health or safety, an emergency is hereby
6	declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
7	be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
