10	accreditation of schools; modifying circumstances under which accreditation cannot be withdrawn or
11	denied for failure to meet certain media program standards; directing certain prohibition to cease
12	once per-pupil expenditures are equal to or more than certain regional average expenditure as reported by
13	the National Center for Education Statistics; directing the State Board of Education to report
14	whether expenditures have reached certain level by certain date; modifying circumstances under which the
15	State Board of Education cannot assess certain penalties; directing certain prohibition to cease
16	once per-pupil expenditures are equal to or more than certain regional average expenditure as reported by
17	the National Center for Education Statistics; directing the State Board of Education to report
18	whether expenditures have reached certain level by certain date; amending 70 O.S. 2011, Section 3-167,
19	as last amended by Section 2, Chapter 253, O.S.L. 2016 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 3-167), which
20	relates to advisory councils; modifying circumstances under which school districts are exempt from certain
21	advisory council requirements; directing certain prohibition to cease once per-pupil expenditures are
22	equal to or more than certain regional average expenditure as reported by the National Center for
23	Education Statistics; directing the State Board of Education to report whether expenditures have reached
24	certain level by certain date; amending 70 O.S. 2011,

1 Section 16-111, as last amended by Section 3, Chapter 253, O.S.L. 2016 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 16-111), which relates to textbook adoption; modifying 2 circumstances under which school districts are exempt 3 from certain textbook adoption requirements; directing certain prohibition to cease once per-pupil expenditures are equal to or more than certain 4 regional average expenditure as reported by the 5 National Center for Education Statistics; directing the State Board of Education to report whether 6 expenditures have reached certain level by certain date; providing an effective date; and declaring an 7 emergency. 8 9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA: 10 11 SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 3-104.4, as 12 last amended by Section 27, Chapter 42, O.S.L. 2017 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 3-104.4), is amended to read as follows: 13 Section 3-104.4. A. On or before February 1, 1991, the State 14 15 Board of Education shall adopt standards for the accreditation of the public schools in this state according to the requirements of 16 this act, to be effective as set forth in this act. 17 The accreditation standards shall incorporate the curricular standards 18 established pursuant to Section 11-103.6 of this title. The 19 accreditation standards shall equal or exceed the accreditation 20 standards for schools promulgated by the North Central Association 21 of Colleges and Schools to the extent that the standards are 22 23 consistent with an academic results oriented approach to 24 accreditation, excluding those standards which deal with affective

behavior to the extent the adoption of the standards does not conflict with state statute. The accreditation adopted by the State Board shall encompass accreditation for elementary schools, middle schools, junior high schools, and high schools. The accreditation standards shall be made available for public inspection at the offices of the State Department of Education.

7 в. Standards for accreditation adopted by the State Board of Education shall include standards relating to the provision of 8 9 school counselors to the public school children of this state. The 10 State Board of Education shall require each local school district to 11 provide information regarding the number of counselors serving each 12 school site, the duties of all such counselors including all administrative duties, the number of students served by each 13 counselor, and information regarding the number of counselors 14 15 employed per elementary school, middle school, junior high school and high school. 16

17 C. Except as otherwise provided by subsection A of this section 18 with regard to curricular standards, as a condition of receiving 19 state accreditation pursuant to this act:

High schools shall meet the accreditation standards not
 later than June 30, 1995; and

22 2. Elementary, middle and junior high schools shall meet the
 23 accreditation standards not later than June 30, 1999.

Schools shall thereafter continue to meet the accreditation
 standards as a condition of continued accreditation. Nothing herein
 shall be construed as preventing changes to the adopted standards by
 the State Board of Education pursuant to the Administrative
 Procedures Act.

D. If one or more school sites fails to receive accreditation
as required pursuant to this section by the dates set forth in
subsection C of this section or subsequently loses accreditation,
the State Board of Education shall close the school and reassign the
students to accredited schools within the district or shall annex
the district to one or more other districts in which the students
can be educated in accredited schools.

Standards for accreditation adopted by the State Board of 13 Ε. Education shall include standards relating to the provision of 14 15 educational services provided in partial hospitalization programs, day treatment programs, day hospital programs, residential treatment 16 programs and emergency shelter programs for persons between the ages 17 of three (3) and twenty-one (21) years of age. The accreditation 18 standards shall apply to onsite and offsite educational services 19 provided by public school districts or state-accredited private 20 schools. The accreditation standards shall provide for warnings, 21 probation or nonaccredited status for schools that fail to meet the 22 standards. Each school which is providing or is required to provide 23 educational services for students placed in a program as described 24

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1 in this subsection shall be actively monitored by the State 2 Department of Education. The Department shall determine on an 3 ongoing basis if the educational program and services are in compliance with the accreditation standards. The Department shall 4 5 investigate a complaint of failure to provide educational services within ten (10) days of receiving the complaint. If the Department 6 determines that a school has failed to comply with the accreditation 7 standards the Department shall report the recommended warning, 8 9 probation or nonaccredited accreditation status to the State Board 10 of Education within sixty (60) days. If a school does not take 11 action to comply with the accreditation standards within ninety (90) 12 days after a report is filed by the Department, the Board shall 13 withdraw accreditation for the school.

F. State Board accreditation regulations shall provide for warnings and for assistance to schools and school districts whenever there is reason to believe a school is in danger of losing its state accreditation.

G. The State Board shall provide assistance to districts in considering the possibility of meeting accreditation requirements through the use of nontraditional means of instruction. The State Board shall also assist districts in forming cooperatives and making arrangements for the use of satellite instruction or other instructional technologies to the extent that use of such instructional means meets accreditation standards.

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H. 1. Accreditation shall not be withdrawn from or denied nor
shall a penalty be assessed against a school or school district for
failing to meet the media materials and equipment standards and
media program expenditure standards as set forth in the
accreditation standards adopted by the Board.

The provisions of paragraph 1 of this subsection shall cease 6 2. 7 to be effective during a fiscal year immediately following a fiscal year that the state financial support of public schools provides an 8 9 amount once state per-pupil expenditures are equal to or more than 10 Three Thousand Two Hundred Ninety-one Dollars and sixty cents (\$3,291.60) per weighted average daily membership as calculated 11 12 pursuant to Section 18-200.1 of this title and reported to school districts by the State Department of Education on the initial 13 tentative State Aid allocation notice the regional average per-pupil 14 15 expenditure as defined by Section 1-124 of this title in public 16 elementary and secondary schools for the most current year for which 17 data is available, as reported by the National Center for Education Statistics annually and funds are provided. For purposes of this 18 subsection, the regional average expenditure shall consist of the 19 current per-pupil expenditures as defined by Section 1-124 of this 20 title in public elementary and secondary schools in unadjusted 21 dollars for each of the following states: Arkansas, Colorado, 22 Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico and Texas. By February 1 of each year, 23 the State Board of Education shall report whether the expenditure 24

1 <u>level has been reached based on information reported annually by the</u> 2 National Center for Education Statistics.

3 3. If the amount set and calculated as provided for in
4 paragraph 2 of this subsection is reduced by one percent (1%) or
5 more as reported to school districts by the Department on the
6 initial tentative State Aid allocation notice for the following
7 fiscal year, the provisions of paragraph 2 of this subsection shall
8 cease to be effective and the provisions of paragraph 1 of this
9 subsection shall continue to be effective.

I. 1. The State Board shall not assess a financial penalty against any school district which is given a deficiency in accreditation status during any fiscal year as provided for in this subsection.

The provisions of paragraph 1 of this subsection shall cease 2. 14 15 to be effective during a fiscal year immediately following a fiscal 16 year that the state financial support of public schools provides an amount once state per-pupil expenditures are equal to or more than 17 Three Thousand Two Hundred Ninety-one Dollars and sixty cents 18 (\$3,291.60) per weighted average daily membership as calculated 19 pursuant to Section 18-200.1 of this title and reported to school 20 districts by the State Department of Education on the initial 21 tentative State Aid allocation notice the regional average per-pupil 22 expenditure as defined by Section 1-124 of this title in public 23 elementary and secondary schools for the most current year for which 24

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1 data is available, as reported by the National Center for Education 2 Statistics annually and funds are provided. For purposes of this 3 subsection, the regional average expenditure shall consist of the 4 current per-pupil expenditures as defined by Section 1-124 of this 5 title in public elementary and secondary schools in unadjusted dollars for each of the following states: Arkansas, Colorado, 6 7 Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico and Texas. By February 1 of each year, the State Board of Education shall report whether the expenditure 8 9 level has been reached based on information reported annually by the 10 National Center for Education Statistics. 11 3. If the amount set and calculated as provided for in 12 paragraph 2 of this subsection is reduced by one percent (1%) or more as reported to school districts by the Department on the 13 initial tentative State Aid allocation notice for the following 14 15 fiscal year, the provisions of paragraph 2 of this subsection shall cease to be effective and the provisions of paragraph 1 of this 16 subsection shall continue to be effective. 17 J. Accreditation shall not be withdrawn from or denied, nor 18 shall a penalty be assessed against, a school district for complying 19 with this section. 20 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 3-167, as 21 last amended by Section 2, Chapter 253, O.S.L. 2016 (70 O.S. Supp. 22 2018, Section 3-167), is amended to read as follows: 23 24

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Section 3-167. A. 1. The State Board of Education shall exempt all school districts from or waive any policy, rule or law which requires school districts to form, convene, or participate in any advisory council or committee, including but not limited to the requirement to convene an advisory council when preparing the school improvement plan as set forth in Section 5-117.4 of this title.

7 2. The provisions of paragraph 1 of this subsection shall cease to be effective during a fiscal year immediately following a fiscal 8 9 year that the state financial support of public schools provides an 10 amount once state per-pupil expenditures are equal to or more than 11 Three Thousand Two Hundred Ninety-one Dollars and sixty cents 12 (\$3,291.60) per weighted average daily membership as calculated pursuant to Section 18-200.1 of this title and reported to school 13 districts by the State Department of Education on the initial 14 15 tentative State Aid allocation notice the regional average per-pupil expenditure as defined by Section 1-124 of this title in public 16 17 elementary and secondary schools for the most current year for which data is available, as reported by the National Center for Education 18 Statistics annually and funds are provided. For purposes of this 19 subsection, the regional average expenditure shall consist of the 20 current per-pupil expenditures as defined by Section 1-124 of this 21 title in public elementary and secondary schools in unadjusted 22 dollars for each of the following states: Arkansas, Colorado, 23 Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico and Texas. By February 1 of each year, 24

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1 the State Board of Education shall report whether the expenditure 2 level has been reached based on information reported annually by the 3 National Center for Education Statistics. 3. If the amount set and calculated as provided for in 4 5 paragraph 2 of this subsection is reduced by one percent (1%) or more as reported to school districts by the Department on the 6 initial tentative State Aid allocation notice for the following 7 fiscal year, the provisions of paragraph 2 of this subsection shall 8 9 cease to be effective and the provisions of paragraph 1 of this 10 subsection shall continue to be effective. School districts shall not be exempted from forming, 11 Β. 12 convening or participating in an advisory council or committee if required by federal law or regulation. 13 70 O.S. 2011, Section 16-111, as SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 14 last amended by Section 3, Chapter 253, O.S.L. 2016 (70 O.S. Supp. 15 2018, Section 16-111), is amended to read as follows: 16 Section 16-111. A. Except as otherwise provided for in 17 subsection E of this section, the superintendent of schools of each 18 school district in the state shall appoint a local textbook 19 committee consisting of not fewer than three nor more than nine 20 members. Each committee shall have one lay member, with the 21 remainder of the members being teachers employed in the public 22 schools of the district, a majority of whom shall be classroom 23 The superintendent of schools or a designee who shall be 24 teachers.

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a principal or a curriculum specialist shall serve as chairperson of
 the local textbook committee.

3 Upon the written request of any duly appointed local Β. textbook coordinator, the publisher of a textbook selected by the 4 5 State Textbook Committee shall furnish at least one examination copy of the textbook and the teacher edition of the textbook, if one is 6 7 published, and a copy of software for purposes of complete demonstration and review, if available, to the school district so 8 9 that the local textbook committee may examine any or all new 10 adoptions in the subjects taught or to be taught in schools in the district. 11

12 C. Except as otherwise provided for in subsection E of this section, on or before a date to be fixed by the State Board of 13 Education, each local textbook committee shall adopt textbooks from 14 15 the multiple list selected by the State Textbook Committee in a manner as shall be prescribed by the State Board of Education. Each 16 local textbook committee shall serve without compensation and shall 17 cease to exist when local adoptions have been completed and shall be 18 replaced by another local textbook committee appointed in the same 19 manner as provided for in this section. 20

D. Except as otherwise provided for in subsection E of this section, on or before a date to be fixed by the State Board of Education, the superintendent of each school district shall submit to the State Board of Education a textbook plan outlining the

1 estimated number of textbooks needed by the school district and the 2 total amount of money to be expended by the district for textbooks 3 including the allocated funds and any additional supplemental funds to be expended. The superintendent or textbook coordinator 4 5 appointed by the superintendent, shall place orders from the proper depository or depositories for all of the textbooks needed as 6 7 outlined in the textbook plan by the district for the ensuing year. The superintendent of a school district or textbook coordinator may 8 9 order any textbooks placed on the official multiple textbook list. If the order exceeds the allocation for each school district as 10 provided in Section 16-114a of this title any additional funds 11 12 expended shall be reported on the statement of expenditures for the 13 district.

E. 1. If a school district makes the election as provided for in subsection B of Section 16-114a of this title, the district shall not be required to appoint a local textbook committee, adopt textbooks, submit a textbook plan, or expend money on the purchase of textbooks during any fiscal year as provided for in this subsection.

2. The provisions of paragraph 1 of this subsection shall cease
