8	An Act relating to telecommunications; amending 17 O.S. 2011, Section 139.109, as last amended by
9	Section 2, Chapter 182, O.S.L. 2014 (17 O.S. Supp. 2014, Section 139.109), which relates to the Oklahoma
10	Universal Service Fund; requiring certain requests for reimbursement within certain time period;
11	authorizing Corporation Commission to establish fines for violations; and declaring an emergency.
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14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
15	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 17 O.S. 2011, Section 139.109, as
16	last amended by Section 2, Chapter 182, O.S.L. 2014 (17 O.S. Supp.
17	2014, Section 139.109), is amended to read as follows:
18	Section 139.109. A. There is hereby created within the
19	Corporation Commission the "Oklahoma E911 Emergency Service Fund".
20	Beginning September 1, 1997, each local exchange telecommunications
21	service provider shall annually contribute fifty cents (\$0.50) per
22	retail local exchange access line to the Oklahoma E911 Emergency
23	Service Fund until the total amount contributed by all providers to
24	the Fund equals Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000.00). The

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1 contribution amount for each service provider shall be based upon the number of retail local exchange access lines of that service 2 provider in service on July 1 of each applicable year. The Oklahoma 3 E911 Emergency Service Fund shall be administered by the Corporation 4 5 Commission and used to defray the cost of purchasing and installing equipment for enhanced 911 emergency systems across the state. 6 Preference for funding shall be given first to those systems 7 established in areas of the state which do not have access to 911 8 9 emergency service before July 1, 1997, and second to areas of the 10 state which do not have access to enhanced 911 emergency services. Funding from the E911 Emergency Service Fund shall not be used for 11 ongoing operating costs of any emergency telephone service system. 12 To qualify for funding, the emergency telephone service system shall 13 have been or be in the process of being approved as provided for in 14 the Nine-One-One Emergency Number Act. Local exchange 15 telecommunications service providers serving fifteen percent (15%) 16 or more of the access lines in the state may not apply for recovery 17 of the contributions made to the E911 Emergency Service Fund from 18 the Oklahoma Universal Service Fund created in Section 139.106 of 19 this title. All monies in the Oklahoma E911 Emergency Service Fund 20 shall be expended only for the purposes set forth in this 21 subsection. 22

B. There is hereby created within the Oklahoma Department ofCareer and Technology Education the "Oklahoma Telecommunications

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1 Technology Training Fund". Beginning September 1, 1997, each local exchange telecommunications service provider shall annually 2 contribute seventy-five cents (\$0.75) per retail local exchange 3 access line to the Oklahoma Telecommunications Technology Training 4 5 Fund until the total amount contributed by all providers to the Fund equals Seven Million Dollars (\$7,000,000.00). The contribution 6 amount for each service provider shall be based upon the number of 7 retail local exchange access lines of that service provider in 8 The Oklahoma 9 service on July 1 of each applicable year. 10 Telecommunications Technology Training Fund shall be administered by 11 the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education working in conjunction with OneNet, and shall be used to provide statewide 12 training of teachers and school administrators in the most effective 13 use of telecommunications and distance learning technology for the 14 enhancement of education throughout the state. Local exchange 15 telecommunications service providers serving fifteen percent (15%) 16 or more of the access lines in the state may not apply for recovery 17 of the contributions made to the Oklahoma Telecommunications 18 Technology Training Fund from the Oklahoma Universal Service Fund 19 created in Section 139.106 of this title. All monies in the 20 Oklahoma Telecommunications Technology Training Fund shall be 21 expended only for the purposes set forth in this subsection. 22

C. The following services are hereby declared to be SpecialUniversal Services and such services shall be provided only after

1 funding for the Oklahoma Universal Service Fund is implemented as 2 set forth in Section 139.101 et seq. of this title:

Each not-for-profit hospital in the state shall, upon
written request, receive one incoming, toll-free phone number and up
to a total of five access lines, free of charge, to allow incoming,
toll-free calls from any location within the geographic area served
by the hospital;

2. Each not-for-profit hospital, county health department, 8 9 city-county health department, not-for-profit mental health and 10 substance abuse facility as defined in Section 139.102 of this title 11 and federally qualified health center in this state shall, upon 12 written request, receive, free of charge, one telecommunications line or wireless connection sufficient for providing such 13 telemedicine, clinical and health consultation services as the 14 15 entity's telemedicine equipment and service applications require. The telecommunications carrier shall be entitled to reimbursement 16 from the Oklahoma Universal Service Fund for providing the line or 17 connection. In no case, however, shall reimbursement from the fund 18 be made for an Internet subscriber fee or charges incurred as a 19 result of services accessed via the Internet; 20

3. Each public school building wherein classrooms are contained
and each public library in the state shall, upon written request,
receive one incoming, toll-free phone number and up to a total of
five access lines, free of charge, to allow incoming, toll-free

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1 calls from any location within the geographic area served by the 2 school or the public library;

4. Each public school building wherein classrooms are contained 3 and each public library in the state shall, upon written request, 4 5 receive one access line, free of charge, with the ability to connect to an Internet service provider at 1.5Mbps, in the most economically 6 efficient manner for the carrier, or an equivalent dollar credit to 7 be applied by the public school or public library toward similar 8 9 services provided by the same carrier, for the purpose of accessing 10 the Internet. In no case shall the Oklahoma Universal Service Fund 11 reimburse an entity for an Internet subscriber fee or charges incurred as a result of services accessed via the Internet; and 12

5. Each county seat in the state shall, upon written request of the board of county commissioners, receive one incoming, toll-free phone number and up to a total of five access lines, free of charge, to allow incoming, toll-free calls from any location within the geographic area served by the county seat.

D. To the extent Special Universal Services are purchased from a telecommunications service provider by another carrier, the Special Universal Services are for the exclusive use of the not-forprofit hospital, county health department, city-county health department, federally qualified health center, public school, public library or county government. Under no circumstances shall the notfor-profit hospital, county health department, city-county health

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department, federally qualified health center, public school, public
library or county government sell, repackage or share Special
Universal Services with any other entity.

The Corporation Commission shall have authority to 4 Ε. 5 investigate and modify or reject in whole or part a Special Universal Services request under subsection C of this section if the 6 request does not meet the specified criteria, if the Corporation 7 Commission's investigation determines that the entity has not 8 9 provided sufficient justification for the requested services, or if 10 the Corporation Commission determines that granting the request is not in the public interest. 11

12 F. Any request for Special Universal Service reimbursement requested under subsection C (1) or (2) of Section 139.109 shall be 13 filed by the telecommunications service provider within ninety (90) 14 15 days of the Special Universal Service being initially provided. Any 16 request for Special Universal Service reimbursement requested under subsection C (3) or (4) of Section 139.109 shall be filed by the 17 telecommunications service provider within ninety (90) days of the 18 first day of the fiscal year in which the Special Universal Services 19 are to be provided to the requesting public school or library. If 20 no request for reconsideration is filed within fifteen (15) days of 21 the OUSF Administrator's determination as provided in subsection D 22 of Section 139.106, the OUSF Administrator's determination shall be 23 deemed final on the sixteenth day following the OUSF Administrator's 24

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1	determination and the OUSF funding will be paid as provided in the
2	OUSF Administrator's determination without order of the Commission.
3	However, if a request for reconsideration is filed within the time
4	from provided in subsection D of Section 139.106, and if the
5	Commission does not issue a final order addressing the merits of the
6	request as provided in subsection D of Section 139.106, then the
7	request shall be deemed approved on an interim basis as provided in
8	subsection D of Section 139-106. Interim OUSF funding will be paid
9	within thirty (30) days. If the Commission fails to issue a final
10	order addressing the merits of a request for reconsideration within
11	one-hundred twenty (120) days following the OUSF Administrator's
12	determination, the request shall be deemed approved on a permanent
13	basis without order of the Commission and the OUSF funding will be
14	paid within thirty (30) days. A request for reimbursement shall be
15	deemed complete when it is filed with the Commission with a valid
16	contract and an invoice. Additional information may be obtained by
17	the Commission from the recipient of the Special Universal Service,
18	as necessary. Failure of the recipient to provide requested
19	information to be Commission may result in the denial of the funding
20	request. Failure of the recipient to provide requested information
21	to the Commission and/or an adverse decision by the Commission does
22	not relieve the recipient of liability for payment to the
23	telecommunications service provider for the provision of Special
24	Universal Service. The Commission is authorized to establish fines

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1	of up to Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) per day, per violation of
2	rules or orders of the Commission promulgated to implement the
3	provisions of this subsection.
4	SECTION 2. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
5	of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is hereby
6	declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
7	be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
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
