1 ENGROSSED SENATE BILL NO. 531 By: Pugh of the Senate 2 and 3 Miller of the House 4 5 [ schools - Rewarding Student Outcomes Act -6 codification - effective date ] 7 8 9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA: A new section of law to be codified 10 SECTION 1. NEW LAW in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 18-202.2 of Title 70, unless 11 12 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: 13 This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Rewarding Α. Student Outcomes Act". The purpose of the act shall be to create an 14 outcomes-based college, career, and military readiness incentive 15 program for school districts, charter schools, and virtual charter 16 schools in this state. 17 As used in this act: 18 в. "College, career, and military readiness" means a graduating 19 1. senior who accomplishes any of the following during a time period 20 established by the State Department of Education: 21 scores the silver level or above on the ACT WorkKeys 22 a. assessment, 23 earns an industry credential, 24 b.

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1 с. achieves a benchmark score on the ACT, SAT, or another 2 assessment designated by the State Department of Education, 3 d. scores a 3, 4, or 5 on an Advanced Placement 4 5 examination, scores a 4, 5, 6, or 7 on an International 6 e. Baccalaureate examination, 7 f. earns transcripted college credit while still in high 8 9 school through concurrent or dual enrollment, g. achieves a passing score set by the applicable 10 military branch on the Armed Services Vocational 11 12 Aptitude Battery, or h. is accepted for enlistment in the United States Armed 13 Forces; 14 2. "Economically disadvantaged" shall have the same meaning as 15 provided for in Section 18-109.5 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma 16 17 Statutes; and 3. "Not economically disadvantaged" means a student who does 18 not qualify for free- or reduced-price meals under the National 19 School Lunch Act. 20 C. Beginning with the 2025-2026 school year and each school 21 year thereafter, the State Department of Education shall determine 22 and inform each school district, charter school, and virtual charter 23 school of the number of graduating seniors who met the college, 24

1 career, and military readiness standards defined in subsection B of 2 this section for each of the following cohorts for each school site 3 for the preceding school year:

Annual graduates who are economically disadvantaged; and 4 1. 5 2. Annual graduates who are not economically disadvantaged. Beginning with the 2025-2026 school year and each school 6 D. 1. year thereafter, the State Department of Education shall determine 7 and inform each school district, charter school, and virtual charter 8 9 school the minimum number of annual graduates in each of the cohorts identified in subsection C of this section who must demonstrate 10 college, career, and military readiness in order for the school 11 12 district, charter school, or virtual charter school to be eligible for a Rewarding Student Outcomes Act bonus. 13

To qualify for a Rewarding Student Outcomes Act bonus, the 2. 14 school district, charter school, or virtual charter school shall 15 have at least a one percent (1%) increase in the number of annual 16 graduates in a cohort identified in subsection C of this section who 17 demonstrate college, career, and military readiness above the number 18 of graduates for the preceding school year. A qualifying school 19 district, charter school, and virtual charter school shall be 20 eligible for a Rewarding Student Outcomes Act bonus in the following 21 amounts: 22

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a. One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) per
 graduate if the annual graduate is economically
 disadvantaged, and

b. Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) per graduate if the
annual graduate is not economically disadvantaged.
SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 1210.545, is
amended to read as follows:

Section 1210.545. A. Except as otherwise provided, as part of 8 9 the accountability system developed as provided for in Section 1210.541 of this title, the State Board of Education shall prepare 10 annual reports of the results of the Oklahoma School Testing Program 11 12 which describe student achievement in the state, and each school site, pursuant to the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 13 (ESEA) as reauthorized by P.L. No. 114-95, also known as the Every 14 Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), and any related federal regulations. 15 The annual report as required pursuant to subsection A of 16 Β. this section shall identify school sites as having one of the 17 following grades for each indicator, separately, and by a single 18 overview grade of all indicators, defined according to rules of the 19 State Board of Education: 20

"A" means schools making excellent progress;
 "B" means schools making above average progress;
 "C" means schools making satisfactory progress;

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4. "D" means schools making less than satisfactory progress;
 and

5. "F" means schools failing to make adequate progress.

C. Each school that has students who are tested and included in
the school grading system as provided for in this section shall
receive a school grade, except as follows:

7 1. A school shall not receive a school grade if the number of 8 students tested and included in the school grading system is less 9 than the minimum sample size necessary for statistical reliability 10 and prevention of the unlawful release of personally identifiable 11 student data. The State Board of Education is directed to establish 12 the lowest minimum sample size necessary to meet the requirements of 13 this paragraph; and

2. The academic performance of students who are enrolled fulltime in an online program that is offered by a school district or charter school that is not the district of residence or is not located in the district of residence of the student shall be reported separately by the school district or charter school and shall not be included when determining the grade of the school site or charter school.

D. The State Board of Education may adopt alternate systems of accountability for statewide virtual charter schools, alternative education programs as defined in Section 1210.568 of this title, and

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schools serving only grades prekindergarten or kindergarten through
 two.

E. The grade of a school shall be based on a multimeasures approach to accountability in accordance with the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) as reauthorized by P.L. No. 114-95, also known as the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and any federal regulations that include, but are not limited to, the following indicators:

9 1. Statewide assessments, including the establishment of
10 student performance bands;

11 2. Graduation rates for high schools;

Statewide academic measures for elementary and middle
 schools;

4. English language proficiency for English learners; and
5. At least one additional statewide measure of school quality
or student success, including, but not limited to, school climate,
school safety, student engagement, educator engagement, and/or
advanced coursework and postsecondary readiness.

F. Of the indicators included in subsection E of this section, not less than seventy percent (70%) of the overview grade <u>must shall</u> be given to indicators 1, 2, 3<u>,</u> and 4 and, in the aggregate, with not more than thirty percent (30%) of the grade given to indicator 5.

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G. Further, the grade of an elementary or middle school site
shall include, but not be limited to, a measure of status for
English language arts (ELA), math and science, growth in ELA and
math, English Language Proficiency Assessment (ELPA) progress, and
chronic absenteeism climate surveys administered to students, school
staff, and parents and legal guardians of students enrolled in the
school site.

The grade of a high school site shall include, but not be 8 н. 9 limited to, a measure of status for English language arts (ELA) ELA, 10 math and science status, English Language Proficiency Assessment (ELPA) ELPA progress, graduation rate, chronic absenteeism, and 11 12 postsecondary opportunities, and climate surveys administered to 13 students, school staff, and parents and legal guardians of students enrolled in the school site. For purposes of this section 14 postsecondary opportunities shall include Advanced Placement, 15 International Baccalaureate, dual and concurrent enrollment, 16 internships, mentorships and apprenticeships, and industry 17 certifications be based on the percentage of high school students 18 who meet at least one of the following criteria: 19 1. Achieving a benchmark score on the ACT or SAT; 20 2. Scoring a 3, 4, or 5 on an Advanced Placement examination; 21 3. Scoring a 4, 5, 6, or 7 on an International Baccalaureate 22 examination; 23

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1 <u>4. Scoring the silver level or above on the ACT WorkKeys</u> 2 <u>assessment;</u>

## 3 <u>5. Earning transcripted college credit while still in high</u> 4 <u>school through concurrent or dual enrollment;</u> 5 <u>6. Earning an industry credential; or</u> 6 <u>7. Being accepted for enlistment into the United States Armed</u>

7 Forces.

8 The Board shall adopt a time line for moving from completion of 9 such opportunities to crediting achievement of such opportunities.

10 I. The annual report shall identify the performance of each 11 school as having improved, remained the same, or declined. This 12 school improvement rating shall be based on a comparison of the 13 student and school performance data of the current year to the 14 previous year data.

J. The State Department of Education shall annually develop a 15 school site report card to be delivered to parents or legal 16 quardians throughout each school district. The report card shall be 17 in accordance with the requirements of the Elementary and Secondary 18 Education Act of 1965 (ESEA), as reauthorized and amended by P.L. 19 No. 114-95, also known as the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and 20 includes include the grade for the school, information regarding 21 school improvement, an explanation of school performance, and 22 indicators of return on investment. The report card for each school 23 site shall be published annually by the Department on its website, 24

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1 and every school district shall provide the school site report card 2 to the parent or legal guardian of each student enrolled in the school site. In order to provide information regarding school 3 performance for school report cards issued during the 2016-2017 and 4 5 2017-2018 school year years, the Department shall include an explanation of the changes to the statewide system of student 6 assessments as required in Section 1210.508 of this title and how 7 the transition in assessments may impact school performance. 8 The 9 Department shall issue school report cards using the 2016-2017 school year assessment data that is available. 10 The Legislature may factor in the performance of schools in 11 Κ. 12 calculating any performance-based funding policy that is provided to 13 public school districts. The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules to L. 14 implement the provisions of this section. 15 SECTION 3. This act shall become effective November 1, 2023. 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24

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
