14	Supp. 2018, Section 21-102.1), which relates to powers and duties of the Board; allowing the Board to
15	approve or disapprove certain corrective action plans; modifying minimum standards for schools;
16	requiring submission of certain corrective action plan; requiring submission of certain correspondence;
17	allowing the Board to require a school to suspend certain enrollments if certain corrective action plan
18	is not adhered to; requiring the development of certain optional training; providing for site visits;

16	c. of an entity by way of the provision of documentation

19	recognized by the U.S. Department of Education;
20	5. 6. "Branch" means an additional location, separate facility,
21	or satellite to a main school that is defined by the organizational,
22	geographic, or legal characteristics of the entities;
23	6. <u>7.</u> "Business" means skills including but not limited to
24 2 -	administration, customer relations, finance, human resources,

1 leadership, management, marketing or strategic planning used to run 2 a for-profit or not-for-profit entity;

³ 7.8. "Combines" means offering within the same catalog, ⁴ website or other form of publication or advertisement in such a way ⁵ to convey that the entity makes available more than one type or ⁶ level of training or education;

⁷ <u>8. 9.</u> "Contact hour" means a period of time defined by a ⁸ school, seminar or workshop such as fifty (50) minutes which may ⁹ differ from a clock hour that will always be sixty (60) minutes in ¹⁰ length;

¹¹ 9. <u>10.</u> "Correspondence course" means a form of instruction for ¹² which a student receives lessons or assignments from a private ¹³ school by means of postal or other couriers;

¹⁴ 10. <u>11.</u> "Distance education" means education or training ¹⁵ provided outside the traditional classroom by use of electronic ¹⁶ mediums, including but not limited to online or virtual education, ¹⁷ e-learning or computer-based, -aided or -assisted instruction;

¹⁸ <u>11. 12.</u> "General education" means education to complete a ¹⁹ student's secondary education recognition providing instruction not ²⁰ specific to any single occupation or vocation;

²¹ <u>12. 13.</u> "Industrial" means related to manufacturing or other ²² labor which may or may not require skilled trade licensing; ²³

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¹ <u>13. 14.</u> "Occupation" or "vocation" means employment, either
² full-time, part-time, by contract or on a consulting basis, for
³ which a person earns remuneration;

⁴ 14. <u>15.</u> "Postgraduate certificate" means an advanced
⁵ certification earned following a student's receipt of an associate,
⁶ bachelor, master or doctorate degree that qualifies the individual
⁷ for specialized career advancement or job assignments;

⁸ <u>15. 16.</u> "Postsecondary education" means a program that requires ⁹ a student to have a high school diploma, high school equivalency ¹⁰ certificate or requires that the person be beyond the age of ¹¹ compulsory education;

¹² 16. <u>17.</u> "Primarily in the business of" means that an entity earns twenty percent (20%) or more of its gross revenue from providing a program(s) of instruction, as documented by certified public-accountant-prepared financial statements that are attested to as a true and correct statement of financial condition by an entity owner(s);

18 17. 18. "Profession" or "professional" means those occupations 19 or vocations relating to such fields of employment that generally 20 require an advanced degree or for which an individual must pass 21 extensive prelicensing testing. Examples include but are not 22 limited to attorneys and certified professional accountants. 23 Professions may or may not require ongoing continuing education that

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¹ may be subject to the authority or jurisdiction of an alternate ² state agency;

³ <u>18. 19.</u> "Program", "program of study" or "program of ⁴ instruction" means a body of organized instruction that leads to a ⁵ degree, certificate, diploma or other recognized educational ⁶ credential, or provides transferable skills applicable to a ⁷ business, professional, trade or vocational-technical or industrial ⁸ occupation or vocation;

9 <u>19.</u> <u>20.</u> "Public" means an entity that is established as a 10 governmental entity;

¹¹ 20. <u>21.</u> "Seminar" or "workshop" means a program of instruction ¹² <u>including but not limited to topics of continuing education</u> that ¹³ results in business, professional, or vocational-technical knowledge ¹⁴ that applies to one or more occupations or vocations but will not ¹⁵ provide degree credit hours, a certificate or a diploma;

¹⁶ <u>21. 22.</u> "Solicitor" means a representative of a private school ¹⁷ that leaves the physical facility of the school to attend job fairs, ¹⁸ career days or other activities to market to new students or to ¹⁹ attempt to secure new student enrollments;

20 <u>22.</u> <u>23.</u> "Technical" means those skills that are unique to 21 certain occupations or vocations;

22 <u>23.</u> <u>24.</u> "Trade" means a skilled trade including but not limited 23 to electrical, plumbing, and heating and air conditioning (HVAC),

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¹ that requires an individual to maintain a state or municipal ² license; and

³ <u>24. 25.</u> "Tuition" means a financial charge made for the ⁴ provision of education or training, regardless of the term assigned ⁵ to the monetary or other exchange.

6 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY Section 2, Chapter 276, O.S.L.
7 2014 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 21-101.1), is amended to read as
8 follows:

9 Section 21-101.1. The term "private school" shall not include 10 the following which are exempt from licensing by the Oklahoma Board 11 of Private Vocational Schools:

12 1. Barber schools, beauty schools or other schools which are 13 exclusively regulated or licensed pursuant to the provisions of any 14 school-licensing law of this state, although such school may choose 15 to apply to secure a license for state authorization from the Board;

16 2. Any form of flight instruction subject to regulations 17 promulgated by the Federal Aviation Administration;

18 3. Parochial, private or other nonpublic schools offering
 19 programs of general education accredited or approved by the State
 20 Board of Education, the State Board of Career and Technology
 21 Education or the State Regents for Higher Education;

4. Education or training, as approved by the Board, provided and paid for by:

a. an employer for its own employees,

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- b. a professional organization, as approved by the Board,
 for its members,
- 3 c. a parochial, denominational, eleemosynary school or 4 institution, which is sectarian in nature and uniquely 5 useful for and intrinsic to the propagation of a faith 6 or the pursuit of the mission of the school or 7 institution as approved by the Board, or
- 8 d. an entity supported by taxation of a local or state
 9 source;

10 5. Education or training, as approved by the Board, which 11 offers instruction solely in the field of an avocation, hobby, 12 recreation or entertainment, as approved by the Board;

6. Professional prelicensing programs or continuing education programs when an alternate state agency maintains complete authority or jurisdiction over the right to offer or certify such a program, regardless if the other agency mandates the subject matter of the program;

18 7. Postgraduate certificates offered or provided by a school 19 that has approval for that specific program issued by another state 20 agency or an accrediting agency approved by the Board;

8. If a private school combines training or education that is both licensed and not licensed by another state agency, licensing by the Board will be required for the entity's combined programs. However, the Board will defer to the other state agency on matters

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1 contained in the other agency's regulations and will refrain from 2 establishing conflicting requirements. Matters to be governed by 3 the other state agency may include but are not limited to 4 curriculum, testing or certification completion. The Board may 5 require a private school to document its approval by any other state 6 agency or an accrediting organization; and 7 9. Seminars or workshops offered by an entity that: 8 a. is not primarily in the business of providing programs 9 of instruction, 10 provides instruction to advance the personal b. 11 development or general, transferable skills of a 12 participant, and 13 offers aggregate clock or contact hours of no more с. 14 than twenty-four (24) clock or defined contact hours 15 per calendar quarter of the calendar year; 16 10. An entity that offers only a degree(s) and has and 17 maintains proper approval by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher 18 Education; and 19 11. An entity that is based outside of Oklahoma, maintains 20 regional or national accreditation by an accrediting organization 21 approved by the U.S. Department of Education, does not offer degrees 22 and provides all of its training through mechanism(s) of distance 23 education. 24

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1 SECTION 3. AMENDATORY Section 4, Chapter 276, O.S.L. 2 2014 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 21-102.1), is amended to read as 3 follows: 4 Section 21-102.1. The Oklahoma Board of Private Vocational 5 Schools is authorized to: 6 1. Appoint and fix the compensation of a director who: 7 shall employ and fix the duties and compensation of a. 8 such clerical or other assistants as are reasonably 9 necessary to effectuate the provisions of this act, 10 and 11 may execute contracts on behalf of the Board; b. 12 Promulgate rules to include but not be limited to the 2. 13 implementation of minimum standards for the operation of private 14 schools and the requirements for application of a school, seminar or 15 workshop for a license of state authorization; 16 3. 2	authorization or other licensing upon determination that such school
3	meets the standards fixed by the Board;
4	5. Prescribe, except as is otherwise provided by law and
5	subject to the provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act, such
6	penalties as it may deem proper for the enforcement of this act, not
7	to exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00);
8	6. Fix minimum standards through promulgation of rules for
9	private schools, which shall include standards for:
10	a. courses of instruction and training,
11	b. qualifications of instructors,
12	<u>c.</u> financial stability,
13	<u>d.</u> advertising practices, and
14	e. refund of tuition and fees paid by students for
15	courses of instruction or training not completed, and

4	7. Require a school to submit and implement and OBPVS-approved
5	corrective action plan to resolve compliance or operational issues
6	identified by the OBPVS staff;
7	8. Require a licensing applicant or a licensed school to report
8	and provide copies to the OBPVS within five (5) business days after
9	receipt of or sending correspondence to the U.S. Department of
10	Education, a federal or state agency or an accrediting organization
11	approved by the U.S. Department of Education or the Board. The
12	correspondence to be copied to the OBPVS shall include but not be
13	limited to mass communication master documents mandated to be issued
14	by an applicant or a school, potential adverse actions or
15	correspondence in which financial, leadership or other conditions
16	may result in loss of accreditation, funding or school closure;
17	9. Require the school to suspend new enrollments in one or more
18	programs when an approved corrective action plan is not adhered to
19	and require the school to submit a teach-out agreement to the OBPVS,
20	to increase a school's surety bond or certificate of deposit amount,
21	to present a letter of credit payable to the Board or to comply with
22	conditions approved by the Board;
23	<u>10.</u> Where possible, to regulate degrees offered by distance
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education, make use of the State Regents for Higher Education's

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1 interstate reciprocity agreements to create a more efficient and 2 cost-effective means of the regulation of private schools;

³ 8. <u>11.</u> Make use of interstate reciprocity agreements that ⁴ reasonably satisfy the Board's minimum standards to approve state ⁵ authorization or other license application, if such agreements ⁶ become available for other programs the Board approves for state ⁷ authorization or other license;

8 9. 12. Require an entity to repay any fees charged to the Board 9 by a financial institution or the State Treasurer for a returned 10 check or other failed form of payment;

¹¹ 10. <u>13.</u> Develop <u>and present mandatory</u> annual compliance ¹² training to emphasize standards relating to the operation of a ¹³ school and relicensing processes, and require attendance by a ¹⁴ representative of each school, seminar, or workshop;

¹⁵ <u>11.</u> <u>14.</u> Develop and present or arrange for the presentation of optional training for schools to emphasize continuing development of school personnel and processes and address emerging issues;

¹⁸ <u>15.</u> Provide all licensing forms free of charge via one or more ¹⁹ electronic means, but shall charge for the pick up or mailing of a ²⁰ hard-copy licensing application packet to a person requesting ²¹ information about private school licensing requirements;

22 <u>12. 16.</u> Certify an electronic record or the printing of an
23 electronically stored record as an original, subject to approval by

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1	the Oklahoma Archives and Records Commission and when in accordance
2	with the record retention and destruction policy of the Board;
3	13. 17. Conduct announced or unannounced site visits to an
4	applicant or licensed school or seminar, including joint visits with
5	an accrediting organization or federal or state agency;
6	18. Invoice a travel fee to conduct site visits to an
7	applicant, school, seminar or workshop;
8	<u>19.</u> Collect or require the submission of data, including but
9	not limited to:
10	a. admissions,
11	b. certification scores or passage rates,
12	c. complaints or grievances,
13	d. enrollment,
14	e. funding,
15	f. graduation,
16	g. job longevity or retention,
17	h. job placement, and
18	i. data required to be reported to the U.S. Department of
19	Education, any state or federal agency or an
20	accrediting organization, and
21	j. other data, as necessary, to carry on the mission or
22	duties of the Board, or to assist in the state's
23	workforce development initiatives; and
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¹ <u>14. 20.</u> Carry out such other duties as necessary to provide ² state authorization for private vocational schools, seminars, and ³ workshops and such other schools that make offerings of courses or ⁴ programs as permitted by this act.

5 SECTION 4. AMENDATORY Section 9, Chapter 276, O.S.L. 6 2014 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 21-105.2), is amended to read as 7 follows:

8 Section 21-105.2. After A. To obtain an initial license, a 9 school, seminar or workshop either voluntarily decides to cease 10 offering all programs of instruction or is required to do so through 11 proper enforcement of this act or the Oklahoma Board of Private 12 Vocational Schools' minimum standards, the entity shall, before 13 closure is complete, provide the Board with its appropriate 14 arrangement for the permanent retention of students' records shall 15 designate an appropriate official to begin and continue to maintain 16 student academic records or transcripts by: 17 1. Maintaining at least one physical copy in a fireproof

18 container;

¹⁹ <u>2. Using documented electronic means to maintain records off-</u> 20 <u>premises; or</u>

21 <u>3. Establishing a special purpose surety bond in an amount of</u> 22 <u>not less than Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) in favor of the</u> 23 <u>OBPVS and to be used by the OBPVS after the school closes to have</u> 24 <u>student academic records and transcripts retrieved, recovered,</u>

1 digitized by a commercial third-party vendor to maintain the 2 records. After digitization of hard copies from a closed school is 3 performed and verified, the hard copy records may be destroyed by 4 any means that ensures student privacy is protected by the 5 commercial entity. 6 B. As part of its license renewal application, a school, 7 seminar or workshop shall annually submit documentation that its 8 student academic record plan including any applicable surety bond is 9 current. 10 SECTION 5. 70 O.S. 2011, Section 21-106, as AMENDATORY 11 amended by Section 10, Chapter 276, O.S.L. 2014 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018, 12 Section 21-106), is amended to read as follows: 13 Section 21-106. A. A license issued pursuant to this act shall 14 expire annually on June 30. Such license shall be renewed annually 15 with the complete renewal application and any and all appropriate 16 fees due prior to expiration annually on or before June 1. Licenses 17 shall be renewed by the Oklahoma Board of Private Vocational Schools 18 if the Board determines that such school remains in compliance with 19 the standards or other requirements set by the Board. The license 20 of any school licensed by the Board to provide postsecondary 21 education or other limited offering may be revoked if the school is 22 found to be in violation of the Oklahoma Statutes, the minimum 23 standards established by the Board, or if an accreditation 24

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1 organization or other governmental entity's approval, material to 2 the continuity of the school, is revoked.

B. If a school is accredited by an accrediting organization approved by the U.S. Department of Education for multiple years, a sustained license may be obtained annually during the period of the multi-year accreditation.

7 <u>C.</u> A license of a school shall not be effective unless the 8 private school has filed with the Board a corporate surety bond or a 9 certificate of deposit in a manner and in an amount as is required 10 by the Board.

11 C. D. Private schools or applicants shall pay the following 12 base fees to the Board:

13 1. One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) <u>Two Thousand</u> 14 <u>One Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$2,160.00)</u> per license shall be paid to 15 <u>the Board</u> for the issuance of an initial license for a school, 16 seminar, or workshop to provide postsecondary education or other 17 vocational-technical education or training pursuant to the 18 provisions of this act;

19 2. Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) Five Hundred Forty Dollars 20 (\$540.00) shall be paid for the initial license of each new branch. 21 A branch's renewal fee shall be based on the tuition it collected;

3. For each renewal of a license, a fee based on the tuition collected by a school, workshop or seminar from residents of Oklahoma or other persons present in Oklahoma, as shown in the

18	Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) <u>A review fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00)</u>
19	shall be paid in addition to the review fee provided for in
20	paragraph 5 of this subsection whenever a main or branch private
21	school changes location; and
22	7. One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) One Hundred Eighty Dollars
23	(\$180.00) shall be paid by each school to the Board for attendance
24	at a school workshop or webinar by the school's required personnel,

1 although one person may attend to represent multiple, related
2 schools;

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3	8. Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for a half-day and Three
4	Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for a full day of optional training; and
5	9. Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) by each school, seminar or workshop
6	for the review of each revised or replacement enrollment agreement,
7	including single enrollment agreements to be used by multiple
8	related entities.
9	$\frac{D}{D}$. If the annual licensing renewal application is not
10	complete on or before the first day of June each year, the fee for
11	license renewal shall become delinquent and the license shall not be
12	renewed except upon payment of an additional late fee. Late fees
13	shall be determined based upon the school's past history of
14	submitting late filings. The appropriate late fees shall be paid in
15	full prior to the Board's issuance of a renewal license in the
16	following amounts:
17	1. Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) for a first violation;
18	2. Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for a second violation within
19	ten (10) years of the first late filing, whether consecutive or not;
20	and
21	3. One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for a third violation

22 within ten (10) years of the first late filing, whether consecutive
23 or not.

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1	Each violation beyond the third shall result in the school,
2	seminar or workshop being required to seek new or initial licensure
3	and only after payment of the full fee for a new license.
4	E. <u>F.</u> Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) for each license application
5	packet, although packets provided by one or more electronic means
6	shall be free of charge.
7	G. In-state site visit fees shall be charged as follows for the
8	purpose of reviewing compliance with minimum standards or
9	contractual agreements, facility inspection, complaint investigation
10	or to join an accrediting organization, the U.S. Department of
11	Education or another state or federal agency with the organization
12	or agency's site visit to an applicant, school, seminar or workshop:
13	1. Two Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$225.00) per day when the
14	site visit does not require overnight lodging;
15	2. Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$450.00) per day if overnight
16	lodging is required; and
17	3. Travel fees to multiple entities on the same day may be
18	apportioned or prorated when each visit involves on-site time of

G. I. All fees, penalties and fines collected by the Board
 pursuant to the provisions of this act shall be deposited with the
 State Treasurer for credit to the Oklahoma Board of Private
 Vocational Schools Revolving Fund.

5 SECTION 6. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 21-108, is 6 amended to read as follows:

7 Section 21-108. A. A license or permit issued or renewed under 8 the provisions of this act may, after reasonable notice to the 9 private school and an opportunity to be heard, be revoked by the 10 Oklahoma Board of Private Vocational Schools for a failure of the 11 private school to maintain the accreditation or the minimum 12 standards fixed by the Board by which such private school obtained 13 its license, or to maintain the bond required by Section 6 21-106 of 14 this act title, or for a violation of any of the rules and 15 regulations pertaining to minimum standards of the Board.

16 <u>B.</u> No license or permit issued under this act shall be 17 transferable.

18 <u>C. When an OBPVS-approved corrective action plan fails as</u> 19 <u>determined by the OBPVS staff, the Board shall have the authority,</u> 20 <u>following a public hearing, to require the school to suspend new</u> 21 <u>enrollments in one or more programs, submit to the OBPVS and</u> 22 <u>implement a teach-out agreement, increase a surety bond or</u> 23 <u>certificate of deposit requirements, present a letter of credit</u> 24 <u>payable to the Board or take other action against the licensee.</u>

2	SECTION 8. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
3	of the public peace, health or safety, an emergency is hereby
4	declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
